



March Is World Literacy Month

Cooperating To Support Our Community

The first quarter of 2009 has seen enormous change and adversity in our State, the devastating bushfires have impacted so heavily on our community. The Rotary Bushfire Recovery program continues to assist in the affected areas and this will continue in the coming weeks, months and years.

Within our District damage in Eaglehawk and Redesdale / Barfold is very significant and the fire at Eaglehawk has particular status as it occurred within 2kms of Bendigo's CBD. The fire areas in D9790 are the most seriously damaged, while damage in the D9820 areas of Bunyip / Labertouche, Churchill - Jeeralang and Callignee / Koornalla is also very serious.

The five Districts in Victoria are cooperating closely to implement Bushfire Recovery activities and with the D9800 Bushfire Recovery Fund now amounting to more than \$300,000 support will be provided on the basis of "greatest need" and *The Four-Way Test* which will help to determine how funds should be allocated. I encourage clubs to leverage the impact of funds made available by providing labour and technical expertise. Make contact with Rotary clubs that are in or near to the fire affected areas in order establish relationships that can lead to cooperative projects. As the colder weather sets in and the immediate memory of the fires fades, the affected communities will benefit from outside, visible support.

Next week, Mev Connell, our District's Bushfire Recovery Committee Chair and I will be meeting with Christine Nixon, Head of the Victorian Bushfire Recovery Authority and it is hoped we can also meet with the leadership group of the Red Cross Bushfire Appeal so we can establish how Rotary can best fit into the overall State-wide Bushfire Recovery effort.

In such adverse times, we as Rotarians, need to set an example, take a leadership stance and share the responsibility for helping to rebuild a prosperous community that will support generations to come.

The Rotary Club of Southbank will be helping to support our District's efforts in Bushfire recovery with their lunch on 16 April. I urge you to take part and encourage friends and family to attend. London bomb survivor, Gill Hicks, and, Christine Nixon, will inspire and uplift you as they share with you how the dream of a better future can be made real. I hope you can make it.

Congratulations to the Rotary Club of Richmond's new Paul Harris Fellow – Simon Baker.

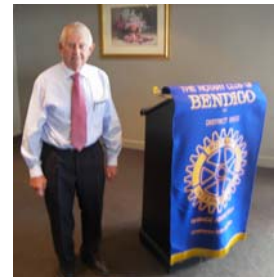


New Member

Rotary Wheel-away: ARH's - The Great Australian Bike Ride Launch

Bikes of all styles and standards, with their lurex-clad, helmeted riders atop, wheeled their way into the Treasury Gardens, Melbourne, from 11.30am onwards on Saturday, 21 March, on the Launch Ride for Rotary. 60 were about to take part in the most ambitious bike ride ever held in Australia - Australian Rotary Health's 'The Great Australian Bike Ride'. 200 and more were showing their support by riding in groups with the participants from different points of Melbourne and surrounds – Mornington, Mordialloc, Strathmore, Darebin (RC Moonee Valley) Glen Iris (RC Glen Eira), Werribee and Altona, with rides co-ordinated by those Clubs.

D9800 Rotary Clubs, including Altona, Keilor, Richmond and Werribee, were represented by some of their fitter peddling members and friends. Richmond Rotary had a contingent of five riders. Included were Rotarian Simon Marriott, with young son Patrick as a passenger, Simon's brother Mark, with his two little sons in a bike buggy attached and niece, Ruby, in the kid's seat on the back of the bike. Friends of Richmond Rotary, Frank Belunze, Mark Pitman and Krissey O'Riley joined in too. They'd all set off together earlier from Strathmore in a bunch of approximately 15 other riders - having first ridden there from Richmond! The weather was just right. The Treasury Gardens were glorious and green. The blue awnings were erected with the familiar symbols of Rotary, ARH and The Great Australian Bike Ride all proudly displayed, adding colour to this perfect setting.





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The Rotary Clubs of Boronia, Lilydale, Albert Park, Prahran and Richmond combined ably to assemble riders and feed lunch to everyone who attended – approximately 350 to 400. Hamburgers and onions were cooked on three separate mobile Club barbeques. Individual lunch bags contained a piece of fruit cake (cut and ‘Gladwrapped’ by a Richmond Rotary team at the previous Thursday night working bee), fresh fruits and a bottle of water - all packed by three Clubs in production-line-style in the gardens that Saturday morning.



The Great Australian Bike Ride is a nine stage ride around the country, ending the October 10 in Melbourne, the birthplace of Australian Rotary Health. Riders are accompanied by highly visible Bike Ride buses. As well as visiting all Rotary Districts and as many Rotary Clubs as possible, community events will be organised by Clubs during the ride. The oldest participating ‘wheel racer’ at 81 is from the Bathurst Cycle Club, NSW. He is sponsored by the Rotary Club of Bathurst. Stages 1 and 2 are Melbourne to Hobart and down the West Coast, and return. The bikes were transported overnight to Tasmania on the Spirit of Tasmania while the riders flew from Tullamarine!

The nine stages, once completed, will have taken in most of the coast line of Australia. Some are staying the journey, with others joining in and leaving along the way – together on the road fundraising for mental health as well as encouraging good health and fitness.

At 1.30pm some brief formalities and speeches followed in the Treasury Gardens. (Not on the Parliament steps as previously planned as a political demonstration was taking place there at that time!) ARH Director, PDG Judy Nettleton introduced the ARH Chairman, PDG Terry Lees, who had flown down from Cairns for the launch. He in turn welcomed CEO Joy Gillett and the MLA for Essendon, Judy Maddigan, along with the ARH Board members present - PDG Terry Grant, PDG Phil Lacey and PDG Ron Pickford.

A special mention was also made of the major organiser of the event, PDG Dick White, who had also organised the previous around Australia Winnebago tour, raising funds for ARH – what a glutton for punishment he is! ARH is the lucky, and appreciative, beneficiary of his many talents and energies.

Then, with police holding back the traffic in Lansdowne Street, East Melbourne, Judy Maddigan cut the official ribbon and the riders wheeled out of Treasury Gardens and away on their unique fundraising Aussie cycling adventure. (Shown on the Channel 9 evening news of Saturday, 21 March.)

Marketing Tip - Rotary... Why PR and Advertising?

Two years ago at a Rotary Conference in Brighton, England more than 2,000 Rotarians were shown this slide.

This iconic slide silenced the Rotarians. It shocked everyone who saw it.

My understanding is that it was taken in the Sudan. Actually where it was taken didn't matter then and it doesn't matter now..

In my Rotary position I spend many hours each week speaking with Rotarians from all parts of Europe. When I bring up the subject of Public Relations...PR/Advertising/ Marketing..call it what you will, some will say “ We don't need PR “, others say “ Why do we need to advertise what we do ? “ , “ We don't want to go into marketing, we don't need it “.

Others take an opposite view so not everyone needs to be converted.

So, let's concentrate on those who are in one of the most dangerous places on the planet....a corporate, organisational comfort zone. They don't want to change; they don't see the need to change, and some simply cannot be bothered to change. They all want things to stay as they are. It's comfortable that way.

Some years ago I learned from a management guru's writing the proverbial story of ‘ the Frog.’

If you put a frog in temperate water it is happy. It can swim around and catch food. If you slowly turn up the temperature of the water the frog enjoys it. It becomes sleepy and relaxed. It is now in deadly danger. It hasn't noticed that its environment has started to change. Turn the temperature up a bit more and the frog is so comfortable





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that it falls asleep. Turn it up once more and the frog dies because the water is too hot. It died because it didn't notice or do anything as its environment changed.

Rotary. Everything around us is changing by the day. Our work practices, our social environment, our economic environment. Change is everywhere....and we cannot stop it. Why should we?

As Rotarians perhaps we have to challenge ourselves. Is there a danger that we could be in our own comfort zone? The frog died because it didn't notice the change in its environment and react to that change....we cannot allow that to happen to Rotary.

Many clubs may be perfectly happy not to change. They may wish things to stay as they are.

Thomas L.Friedman - three-time Pulitzer prizewinning author - says in his book " Hot, Flat and Crowded " on climate change...." If we want things to stay the same then we have to change now ."

Twenty years ago I interviewed a 94 year-old man. He was very active and happy. I asked him the secret of being his activity and happiness and he said " When you get up in the morning....put your boots on...not your slippers."

Metaphorically maybe there are Rotarians, Clubs, and Districts who think they've "done it all" , "seen it all before", " been there " etc . Maybe they're actually tired and metaphorically we should encourage them to put their Rotary boots on instead of their Rotary slippers.

So what does this have to do with the boy in Sudan ? Well, we know that more than 28,000 children die each day on this planet, our planet, from preventable causes....that is one every three seconds. As Rotarians can we really say " we've done enough ", " seen it all before ", " heard all this years ago ", etc.

Of course we cannot. We have to tell the world what Rotary is and what Rotary does. Not to pump up membership or for fund-raising...but to let city councils, regional councils, Governments and World organizations know what Rotary is and what Rotary does. Once they know this then we can ask them to join with us and help us stop children like the boy in the Sudan from dying. We want to make dreams real....for this little boy his life was a nightmare of pain, hunger, fatigue and despair. He didn't even have the chance to dream.

Next time Rotarians say we don't need to advertise, to tell the world who we are and what we do...tell them about the boy and the vulture. Bill Gates Foundation, the World Health Organization etc knew about Rotary before they agreed to work with us. They knew because they had seen us in action and had read who we were and what we did.

There was a truce in the fighting in Afghanistan to allow children to be immunized against polio. That happened because the warring factions knew who we were and what we did.....that's why we need PR/ Advertising and Marketing.....the alternative is our comfort zone...and that is not a good
