She is an experienced peace and conflict studies academic and practitioner with a commitment to working collaboratively to translate research into policy and practice in conflict prevention and peacebuilding in the Indo Pacific region

Tania has taught on postgraduate peace and conflict studies programs with Australian and international universities.

Tania's expertise as an analyst and facilitator has been engaged through a range of government and non-government organisations and stakeholders in the areas of peacebuilding, political affairs and community engagement: including by the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade, Victorian Government Department of Premier and Cabinet, Australian Multicultural Foundation and international peacebuilding organisations including the Centre for Peace and Conflict Studies and Conciliation Resources.

Tania's research is located in the political sciences, specialising in peace and conflict studies, she has a background in psychology and ongoing interest in trauma-informed collective approaches to peacebuilding.

Tania was District 9800's first Rotary Peace Fellow, being selected for a Master's in Public Administration (Peace and Conflict Studies) at ICU in Tokyo (2002-2004). She received a Research Higher Degree Scholarship from the University of Queensland for her PhD (2009-2013).

Tania has been named an "Emerging Leader" of China and Australasia by Griffith and Peking Universities (2009) and a "Leader of the next Generation" by the Swiss 'Stars' Foundation in Penglai, China (2010). In 2013 she was made a Paul Harris Fellow for her peace work in Asia.
