

DG's Weekly Message

The monthly cycle of Rotary themes continues and February is World Understanding Month in the Rotary Calendar. This theme is significant every year but in this Rotary year of **Peace through Service**, the theme takes on extra significance.

Of course February is also the month in which Rotary's birthday is celebrated and on 23 February Rotary will celebrate the 108th anniversary of its founding. That day has been declared World Understanding and Peace Day.



In this year of Peace through Service it would be great to see all clubs making a feature of the significance of that day on their meeting closest to the 23rd February. This is a great opportunity to hold a club forum

on peace and what peace means. Even a few thoughts about peace during your meeting might provide the spark that provides us with renewed inspiration and the motivation to continue work in support of the theme.

I have previously written about peacemaking becoming an early core objective of Rotary. Delegates at the 1914 Convention adopted a resolution calling for a peace conference and called upon all clubs to be advocates for peace. Sadly those actions failed to prevent the outbreak of World War I. Nevertheless Rotary had defined peacemaking as being at the core of its values. Arch Klumph, architect of The Rotary Foundation, making a visit to the UK immediately after that dreadful war proclaimed to British Rotarians that he envisioned the part that Rotary could play by creating "a mighty team to preserve peace, justice and honour among the nations of the world". In 1922 the Rotary Convention ratified a proposal to incorporate peacemaking into Rotary's constitution and bylaws. Interestingly this is also when Rotary's name was officially changed to Rotary International and Rotary could indeed legally proclaim itself to have as its objective to aid in the advancement of "international peace and goodwill".

Peace Through Service

So much of what we do as Rotary and Rotarians supports this objective even though we do not necessarily think of it as such. Our humanitarian programs are very much at the heart of alleviating the causes of conflict and war.

In fact the first of The Rotary Foundation's six Areas of Focus is about peace and conflict resolution. The other 5 areas of focus relate to disease prevention and treatment, water and sanitation, maternal and child health, basic education and literacy and finally economic and community development do provide an ideal recipe for achieving peace in our world.

Of course Rotary does not just beaver away in the background. So often we are called upon to take leadership roles or take on the role without being asked, such as in polio eradication.

Rotary's peacemaking leadership was recognised in its role in the formation of the United Nations after World War II and UNESCO before that. The UN universal declaration of Human Rights drew on the resolution of the Rotary International Havana Convention in 1940 as its framework.

When the UN Charter was finalised in 1945, Rotary was at the forefront of the action. Rotary was invited as an observer organisation but 23 Rotarians guided agendas, arranged translations, mediated and suggested wording for resolutions. Rotary continues to assist the UNO at the highest level of consultative status.

Despite the lofty ideals and objective of the United Nations Organisation, Rotary continues to provide a more pragmatic and independent approach to peacemaking and Rotary as an organisation is at the forefront of creating world understanding through its own programs.

Successive Rotary leaders looked for ways to extend Rotary's leadership in peacemaking. The need was clearly there and well expressed by Chuck Keller, RI President in 1987-89. Chuck said "Keep three central truths in mind: First, service to others is the essence of Rotary, the very foundation of our unity. Second, this unity is stronger than the enormous diversity that surrounds us. And third, peace is the single greatest imperative of our time". It is not surprising that Rotary's theme in Chuck Keller's year as RI President was Rotarians – United in Service – dedicated to Peace. This is very similar to our current theme 25 years on.

It is rather fitting therefore that after 25 years we have a similar theme and we are returning to Albury for the first time in 25 years for our District Conference.

We will be connecting with our theme at the conference and you will now have seen a list of some of the stellar speakers we will be having at the Conference. I'm pleased to announce that we will also have Tania Miletic speaking at our Conference. Tania was our very first candidate to the very first intake of Rotary Peace Scholars. She studied at the International Christian University in Japan thereby creating the perfect circle with the theme from our Rotary International President Sakuji Tanaka. I know you will be impressed with what Tania has to say to us.

We are continuing our support for the peace theme by supporting the Peace Forums that have been arranged by RI President Sakuji. Our District was pleased to join with the Rotary Clubs of Point Gellibrand, Keilor and Tullamarine to substantially support the attendance of 2 students from Aitken College to the Peace Forum that has just concluded in Hawaii. Ashlee Crane and Jacqueline Craven attended where amongst other speakers they had the privilege of hearing Nobel Peace laureate Aung San Suu Kyi, who was also honoured with the Hawaii Peace Award for her longstanding pursuit of democracy through peaceful, nonviolent means. Suu Kyi told the attendees that absolute peace is an unattainable goal, but one that we must nevertheless continue to endeavour toward. She said that democratic institutions are necessary to guarantee human rights.

"The kind of peace we want is very simple. We want permanent peace," said Suu Kyi. She also noted that young people have an important role to play.

In keeping with this objective I can also confirm that our District will support the attendance of up to 8 young people (aged 18 – 35) to the last of the three forums to be held in Hiroshima on 17 - 18 May this year. Details will be announced very shortly. Our District team will be supported by our Chair of the Rotary World Peace Fellows Committee, Bob Fels and Tania Miletic to ensure that our team gets full value from their participation.

There is indeed a lot going on in Rotary as club activity ramps up after our summer break but we also have a lot to think about. We have the bottom half of our nation in flames and the top half being washed away by floods. Both will need our support and I'm sure it will be forthcoming.

Finally, a reminder to those who have yet to register that there are less than two weeks available until the close of conference registration. We are still holding good rooms but understandably the motels would like us to release unsold rooms as soon as possible. A conference needs more than speakers to be successful – it needs you! I have no hesitation in saying that you will have a great experience in Albury and it will be time and money well invested. Our conference is all about the total experience. **Rotary – it's amazing.**

Dr Mark Ellis (Rotary Club of Glenferrie) was named a Member in the General Division (AM) for significant service to medicine in





PP Terry Rolleston (Rotary Club of Glenferrie, left) was named the City of Boroondara Citizen of the Year




Rob, a Rotarian, has raised more than \$250,000 for polio eradication by circumnavigating Australia in an inflatable boat.

WORLD of DIFFERENCE

A group of humanitarians have just returned from Cambodia. Members of Rotary Club of Chelsea, Rotary Club of Brighton joined non Rotarians on a "World of Difference" tour. We donated and volunteered our way from Siem Reap down South through Battambang, Phnom Phen, Kampong Speu province and Kampong Som province. Contrasts between remote rural very poor villages and schools were sharp compared with well supported and resourced projects that Rotary has injected funds in to.

We cycled, tuk-tuked, and bussed around the country distributing lots of love. This was appreciated as much as the \$10,000 of donations (spent in the local Cambodian economy) and bags of items from DIK warehouse we shared. One participant commented "the people are so poor – very moving. It must be terrible not to have food. One little boy had his own little vegetable plot – he was so proud". In this particular village we donated enough vegetable seed for 20 families for a whole year.



We also provided 10 brand new bicycles for children. These were the first they had even owned. The children were over 12 years of age and all had previously had to walk over 10 kms each way to school each day in temperatures over 30 and sometimes over 35 degrees...and with no water!

In this village basic medications were donated and a local person continues to be taught to administer these effectively. This is working really well. Previously pneumonia and other serious infections were rife in the village. Between emergency food donations, water sanitation and the medicines the 800 villagers are healthy. Days were interspersed with Khmer tourism experiences.

Our very special guide is Rithy Ann. An exceptional man and now Rotarian with the Rotary Club of Phnom Penh, Rithy's vast knowledge and personal past made the tour experience unique. We were able to observe what previous tours have achieved and help with planning the upcoming "Eye Sight Testing Tour" which is scheduled for March 2013.Comfortable accommodation and delicious Khmer meals made coming home after a hard day's work very appealing. Rithy is guest speaker at District 9800 conference 2013.

Registrations are now open for Know Your Numbers 2013. Did you know that there are 60,000 strokes in Australia each year?

Many people would not know that stroke is Australia's second biggest killer (33% of all people who have a stroke die within the first year) and a leading cause of disability amongst adults.

Run in conjunction with the National Stroke Foundation the aim of the Know Your Numbers campaign is to raise awareness of High Blood Pressure as one of the major risk factors for stroke.


A registration form has been sent to all clubs via the Community Service directors, which must be completed and submitted to the NSF by 8th March.

Clubs can assist by orgainising a day to run a BP testing station in their community. The tests are conducted on an automatic testing machine which can be purchased or supplied by a club member or health professional in the community.

The preference is for this to occur during May or September each year as it coincides with National Stroke Week. Other dates during the year are also acceptable.

It's easy to organize, is well supported and promotes your club in the community whilst performing a vital activity. Hopefully we can recruit some new Rotary clubs in 2013.

AUSTRALIAN ROTARY HEALTH

Rotary Reduces the Impact of Mental Health through Ian Scott Scholarships

Donations from Rotary clubs around Australia will be supporting eight new Ian Scott Scholarships in 2013 where PhD students researching various aspects of mental health will receive \$29,000 per year for up to 3.5 years. Topics include the ways depression and anxiety affect the treatment of chronic pain, new treatments for schizophrenia and improving diet to treat mental health.



One Ian Scott Scholar, Edith Holloway, will be introducing and evaluating a therapy to manage depressive symptoms for people with vision impairment at Australia's largest low vision rehabilitation setting, Vision Australia. She will begin her PhD research this year at the Centre for Eye Research Australia, Department of Ophthalmology, University of Melbourne.

"This research is really important because the incidence of depression is higher among people with vision impairment compared to the general population and can significantly affect their daily functioning and feelings of independence," Ms Holloway says.

If this program is found to be effective in reducing depressive symptoms, it can be used in other chronic health areas as well like heart disease and diabetes.

In addition, Australian Rotary Health will be funding six continuing Ian Scott Scholars.

Founder of the Australian Rotary Health Research Fund, Ian Laurence Scott (1933-2001) joined Rotary in 1973 in Victoria and served with distinction in many Rotary Clubs throughout NSW and Victoria. Whilst a member of the Rotary Club of Mornington in Victoria, Ian was inspired to found Australian Rotary Health in 1981 to identify the cause of 'Cot Death'.

Australian Rotary Health Ian Scott PhD Scholarships were introduced in 2000 to honour and recognise Ian's service to Rotary and mankind.

On Saturday 26th January 2013 Glenferrie Rotarian Terry Rolleston was presented with his "Boroondara Citizen of the Year "award for his dedication and endeavors in community work within the City of Boroondara.

Terry (obviously a dedicated Rotarian) with great support from his dear wife Helen and a strong committee ran the Boroondara Farmers Market from it's inception in 2003 until recently when ill health persuaded him to step back.

The Farmers Market is held every third (and fifth) Saturday on Patterson Reserve Auburn Road Hawthorn. It averages 70 stalls and is visited by an average of 2000 people . Glenferrie Rotary Club is assisted by members of the Boroondara Foundation in manning this event . Depending on numbers it averages between \$7 & \$8 thousand dollars each Market Day. These funds are distributed to both local and international charitable organizations approved by Rotary International.



Terry is also very involved with Parkinson's Victoria and assists in organizing the annual " Walk in the Park". This fund raiser is very successful and is rewarded with tens of thousands of dollars being donated.

Terry has been a Rotarian since 1993 and was President of the Glenferrie Club in 1999/2000. As most Rotarians would know -- sapphires are not given out like " candy at a fete". The President at the time thinks long and hard about these recognitions and each of Terry's recognitions triggered a spontaneous standing ovation.

In every position within the Club Terry has been innovative and motivational and Rotary has always been the beneficiary.

"Well done that man" -- and that man is Terry Rolleston.

The shella asked me if I wanted my steak with salad or vegetables....

What if newspaper editors sacked their restaurant reviewers and employed truck drivers to write them instead?

There'd be less of this:

... the tiramisu is a studied but respectful deconstruction ... mains are artfully strewn ... the decent-enough \$54 rib eye steak comes with a sauce (red wine) that I think we paid extra for. ... It's Texas meets Chiang Mai ... comes with mustard ice-cream ... the purist in me is screaming ... truffled butter with the house-baked rolls, an amuse bouche, a predessert palate cleanser ... fish is a better bet if food miles are an issue ... Aztec-inspired dishes informed by his recent six-week field trip ... the menu doesn't follow the typical gradient of antipasti, zuppa, primi piatti, but respects its spirit by moving on to braised goat from the wood oven.



And more of this:

Bimbo's is one of the old-timers among the eating places along the Hume Highway. It's at Bargo, about 60 miles out of Sydney. The roadhouse is close to the

highway but there's a huge parking area alongside, and getting off the road is no problem. Day or night, you'll always find a couple of rigs parked there.

Into Bimbo's I waltzed. The restaurant is big, much bigger than you'd reckon from the outside. There were eight blokes in blue singlets demolishing T-bones when I arrived and yet the joint seemed empty. I counted seats for 58 at 26 tables. Everything looked bright and clean. The tables were Formica and chrome and the floor was vinyl squares.

It was in the middle of the day and the room was good and airy, helped by the big windows. They give you a clear view of the highway and the parking lot, so you're the first to know if someone tries to knock off your rig.

A pleasant woman with big brown eyes and arched eyebrows came up and gave me the menu. She reminded me of the mother of an old girlfriend of mine and I didn't know whether to feel hungry or guilty.

Anyhow the menu was huge. The sheila was back in a flash, because speed is what Bimbo's is all about, but you'd need to do a course in speed reading to get through all the items. There must be a hundred of them. I had time to see you could get breakfast food and two soups, and she was saying What would you like. By golly she reminded me of my girlfriend's old woman, except she knew what I would like and did her darndest to see I didn't get it. Still, that was a lot of miles ago.

I said What's your best steak and she said T-bone and solved a lot of problems. I'd joined another bloke at the table and he was a bit more fastidious. "They serve Chinese meals," he said brightly and then ordered a salmon salad, which shows you the sort of mind he must have.

The sheila asked me if I wanted my steak with salad or vegetables, and I said salad. So she brought vegetables. She even acted like that other sort! With the meal came a huge helping of peas, diced carrots and mashed potatoes burying the T-bone.

The steak was tough. I tried to cut it without much luck and the cove opposite gave me his knife, which had a bit of edge left on it. It was better, but I had to work hard on the meat. Still, there was plenty of it. You'd never starve at Bimbo's. The Chinese food fancier did better with his salmon salad. He got a whole tin of red salmon on his plate and enough salad to suggest the cook was trying to clear the refrigerator so he could put the beer in. He finished the salmon a long time before I knocked off my last bit of steak. It was tasty but just didn't like the idea of being sliced or chewed. The steak cost \$1.70 and the salmon salad \$1.50.

I had a milk shake for 22 cents and a double ice cream with flavouring for 15 cents. Both items were good and the ice cream acted like cold putty, filling the grooves the meat had cut in my throat.

Maybe I just struck a bad day. I'll go back, because everything else I liked, and just to be reminded of an old flame gave me something to think about for the rest of the journey.

Bimbo's, Bargo. 24 hour service. Toilets. Shower block. Parking – huge area. Distillate. Ice. TV. Motel accommodation alongside. No juke box. Not air conditioned.


Letters to the Editor

I believe all organisations including Rotary need to change over time, and the change I'd like to see in this definition is removal of the words "business and professional".


I'd like to believe that these days Rotary is open to all who share our commitments as defined by the rest of the definition.



DG's Weekly Message

Among many initiatives established by RI President Sakuji Tanaka in his year of Peace Through Service, are the signature Peace Forums that are being staged over the course of the Rotary year.

The Peace Forums will achieve far more than encouraging and promoting peace. They will also promote awareness of Rotary, what it stands for and what it does.

The venues chosen for these forums are remembered for the devastation that was suffered in World War II and in many ways they define our images of war. Berlin, where the first forum was staged and Hiroshima, which will be the venue for the last forum. were all but obliterated. Hiroshima and another Japanese city, Nagasaki stands as stark testimony to the terrors of nuclear warfare. The death and destruction experienced by those two cities by small capacity nuclear weapons (by today's standards) should be all the persuasion that the human race needs to ensure that this never happens again.

The second Peace Forum was staged in Honolulu, whose destruction was limited compared with Berlin and Hiroshima but transformed World War II into a truly global conflict. Importantly, although each of the cities selected was heavily affected by the events of World War II, their rebuilding and transformation means that they

also represent the healing power of sustainable peace between nations. That is what Rotary is about.



Last week your District announced the support that will be provided to clubs to assist a significant group of younger people to attend the Peace Forum in Hiroshima. I know that many clubs are keen to propose suitable candidates to be selected for this team but I would encourage all clubs to use this opportunity as a positive way of promoting peace within the club and the community. It is also a way to connect or reconnect with young future leaders in our communities and it is also a positive way to enhance Rotary awareness.

In the last Networker I mentioned that as a District we also supported two students from

The three-day forum held in Berlin last November was the largest Rotary event staged in Germany since the RI Convention in Munich 25 years ago. The forum had more than 1,800 attendees including Rotaractors, Rotary Peace Fellows, exchange students and Rylarians joining Rotarians and community leaders.

At the conclusion of the Berlin Forum, a "Peace Declaration" was issued. The full declaration is HERE, but I think it is worthwhile to highlight the vision for action developed at that Forum:

• Encourage your national leaders to emphasize peaceful conflict resolution practices and avoid resorting to war.

• Reject the notion of enemies. Actively befriend people from countries that have traditionally had adversarial relationships with your own country.

• Reach out to marginalized groups in your community, such as ethnic or religious minorities, and develop new friendships and partnerships.

• Work to empower those who live in places that lack political stability and the rule of law, as these areas are the most susceptible to conflict.

• Connect with others to make a difference. There are Rotary clubs in more than 200 countries and geographical areas, working in more than 34,000 communities worldwide. Join us in advancing Peace Through Service.

Rotary, through its Peace Scholars program, provides the wherewithal to achieve many of these objectives in a sustained and sustainable manner but we as individual Rotarians have the capacity to make a real difference. Rotary Clubs and Rotarians lead efforts in our local communities to reach out to minority and refugee groups in our communities with meaningful strategies to integrate them into our communities.

Every international project that Rotary clubs initiate or partner in, either directly, through RAWCS, ROMAC, Interplast or through Foundation grants make a significant contribution to removing the typical causes of conflict. By helping to eradicate polio, providing clean drinking water, helping with sanitation and by addressing illiteracy, we are chipping away at inequities that should not exist and thereby helping to make a real difference towards sustainable peace in the world.

Some projects are small, funded by a DDF grant to the club, or large such as our District's Vocational Training Team to Timor Leste. Shortly our fourth VTT team will make the journey to rural areas of Timor Leste to provide refresher courses for midwives and doctors working in these remote areas. The Training Team deals with the major causes of maternal and neonatal mortality and provides hands-on training to make a real difference in reducing the grim statistics of a country with one of the highest maternal and child death rates in the world.

As with many of Rotary's programs the benefits extend beyond the immediate goals. The VTT has refined and developed a delivery program model that can be taken to developing countries around the world.

We are fortunate to have as Rotarians in our District world renowned practitioners to develop and implement the program. Professor Jeremy Oats (RC Melbourne) and Professor Sue McDonald (RC North Balwyn) with the other team participants have indeed made a significant difference to the lives of women and children in this fledgling nation. This is "Peace Through Service" in action.

The VTT is one of many projects, many of which just happen, almost in the background. We will be showcasing club activities through the annual cluster reviews at our District Conference in Albury but we will also have some special guests who will share their experiences on the ground in developing countries. Peter Gray is an Aussie who now spends his life rescuing kids from unspeakable situations in Cambodia. He is a Rotarian and President of RC Phnom Penh. He will be joined by Rithy Pahn who has experienced tragedy and rebirth in his life. All of his family were murdered by the Khmer Rouge. He was raised in a monastery by Buddhist monks and learned 6 languages, a deep historical and political knowledge of his country, and a quest to help his "poor people". He has continued educating himself and has degrees in teaching and agriculture. Rithy makes his living as a tour guide but beyond his family's needs all his income goes to helping his "poor people". Rithy has now become a Rotarian because through Rotary he can leverage his personal contribution to a peaceful future.

This is one of the many fabulous presentations that we will have the opportunity to experience at Albury. The amazing story of Rotary and Rotarians in action in Cambodia is only one of the many fantastic aspects of our Conference in Albury because Rotary is amazing.

We are still accepting bookings for the Conference and we still have good rooms available so – See you in Albury.

BILL GATES and MONEY

Bill Gates, one of world's richest men, says he has no use of money World, Posted on Jan 19, 2013 at 09:52pm IST

London: William Henry 'Bill' Gates with an estimated wealth of \$65 billion is as rich as two Kenyas, three Trinidads and a dozen Montenegros but is now engaged in the process of ridding himself of all the money in the hope of extending the lives of others less fortunate than himself. Having already given away \$28 billion, the 57-year-old Microsoft co-founder now intends to eradicate polio, the British newspaper Telegraph reported.

But even at the age of 57, Gates is a restless man and wants something more. Gates and his wife Melinda have so far given away \$28 billion via their charitable foundation, more than \$8 billion of it to improve global health.

"We're focused on the help of the poorest in the world, which really drives you into vaccination. You can actually take a disease and get rid of it altogether, like we are doing with polio," Gates told the daily. "Polio's pretty special because once you get an eradication you no longer have to spend money on it. It's just there as a gift for the rest of time." The disease is still endemic in Nigeria, Pakistan and Afghanistan.



There is, however, one obstacle. Islamist groups believe polio vaccination was a front for covert sterilisation and other western evils. "It's not going to stop us succeeding. It does force us to sit down with the Pakistan government to renew their commitments, see what they're going to do in security and make changes to protect the women who are doing God's work and getting out to these children and delivering the vaccine," Gates said.

In 1990, some 12 million children under the age of five died. The figure today is about seven million, or 19,000 per day. According to the UN, the leading causes of death are pneumonia (18 percent), pre-birth complications (14 percent), diarrhoea (11 percent), complications during birth (nine percent) and malaria (seven percent).

The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation will spend \$1.8 billion in the next six years to tackle polio. "All you need is over 90 percent of children to have the vaccine drop three times and the disease stops spreading. The number of cases eventually goes to zero."

She was honored with the Hawaii Peace Award for her longstanding pursuit of democracy through peaceful, nonviolent means. After 20 years of house arrest, Suu Kyi was released in November 2010, and last year was elected to Myanmar's parliament as a member of the pro-democracy opposition party.

She asked Rotarians to empower youth to work as peacemakers. Participants also adopted a declaration recognizing the Green Path to Peace.

moved to Sydney where the impeccable grounding that he received from our district saw him rise to District Governor of his district.

Whilst the black and white photos of the charter nights seemed to portray a very different world, and indeed it was, it also was a grand reminder of the history of achievement of both clubs.

But those old photos also tell us something else. 2013 is very different to 1953 or 1963. The differences the photos reveal – the "de rigeur" of hats for men, heavy suits and dark and gloomy meeting rooms – also remind us that the world was indeed a different place. Most noticeable is the absence of women, not just at meetings but in many of the other activities.

All clubs have moved on. The style of dress at most meetings is much less formal, even on formal occasions, and interpersonal relations are usually conducted on a much less formal basis.

But think of the changes in technology and communications, it is almost another world! Focus was necessarily more local and of course this is still important. But we are now doing important things on a more national and international stage. Back in those days there was no ROMAC, RAWCS, Australian Rotary Health, Interplast, RYLA or many of the familiar programs of The Rotary Foundation.

The community links we once enjoyed have changed. Most clubs had as a member the Town Clerk, the City Engineer, a Bank Manager, the local News Agent. Local Councils have now been subsumed into larger councils and often the executives prefer not to favour one club over another and join none. As an example, my own club (Hawthorn) is in the City of Boroondara as are nine other Rotary clubs including one that is part of another District. Bank Managers these days come and go, seemingly without an opportunity to even unpack and many local business people do not seem to have the option of taking time out from their business.

A major change that has occurred, particularly in metropolitan clubs, is that members are increasingly joining clubs based on their residential location rather than their work location. Indeed areas that were once focussed on factories and manufacturing industry are fast becoming residential. The time and day that a club meets also is really important to many members. For many clubs this means that the model on which the club was chartered might no longer be relevant or appropriate.

Many clubs have already made significant changes to their meeting time. Increasingly clubs that originally met at lunch time have transitioned to evening clubs or sunrise clubs. As an aside, Rotary International discourages the use of terms like lunch or breakfast clubs because the meeting should be more about business or content rather than having a meal as a priority – as enjoyable as that may be. Even with all these changes, most clubs will still have strong links to some of the earlier priorities for the club and these will rightly be appropriate while ever a need exists. Those links should be strengthened and embraced.



On the flip side, all members need to ask themselves if their club is relevant to the community it now serves. If it's not then we have to look at how we make it so. There is a lot of debate about meeting procedure and while some of the things some clubs do may not seem to be relevant to a prospective member I suspect they are not the issue that decides whether a prospective member joins or not. If a club appears to be looking back rather than ahead, that will be relevant in making a decision.

Tradition and history are important. They shape what we are and who we are but history is just that. Try as some of us do to pretend that change is not all around us, we really cannot ignore it. It is true that with change we sometimes lose things that are fundamental and preferable. But we can also benefit from change.

The trick for Rotary clubs is to keep the bits that are really important and adopt the new stuff that can really add value. If we really want to remind ourselves of the good things that traditions can provide but still be relevant and forward looking, make sure that we continue to remind ourselves and particularly newer members. Many clubs do that really well.

Anniversaries should be celebrated and not only the significant ones. After all everyone enjoys a party.

And talking of parties and celebration, it is still not too late to join in the celebration of the first and largest District in Australia at our 81st Conference in Albury from 14 – 16 March. Yes we will celebrate that heritage but our eyes will be fixed on the future. Rotary is amazing, that is why we are Rotarians but sometimes it takes us getting together to remind us just how amazing. So, see you in Albury!



Obstetric Fistula is the Biggest Problem You've

Never Heard OF

Imagine five days of labour that end in stillbirth. As you try to pull yourself together emotionally after this unimaginable loss, you realize that you're constantly wet. You don't know why, but that five days of labour made a hole in your bladder that constantly leaks urine. This hole is also known as an obstetric fistula. You try to drink less, but that makes your wretched smell even stronger. Your husband thinks you're cursed so he leaves. No one wants to work with you because you stink. You can't even get water because you are the unclean. You are left alone on the margins of society begging for an end to your suffering. This is obstetric fistula.

We really do not know how many women have obstetric fistula. These women are spread to the far corners of the developing world. The problem is biggest in the most remote places. Even in places where they can be counted, many women with fistula are so ashamed of their condition that they do not want to come forward.

More than 2 million women are living with obstetric fistula and there are 100,000 new cases every year. But despite an inexpensive surgery that is 90% effective, only 15,000



women receive treatment every year. That means that this year, only 1 out of every 140 women with fistula will get life-recovering treatment.
