

Happy New Year

Welcome to a new year and new decade. I hope everyone enjoyed time with family and friends over the holiday season.

The devastating impact of the recent bushfires on the regional communities is yet to be fully assessed but there is no doubt that there has been tremendous loss in a very short period of time. The Australian and international humanitarian response and generosity have been overwhelming.

Recently I communicated to you all directly by email outlining the activities our District has been undertaking to support bushfire recovery in Victoria and across Australia. Rotary's focus is to be active in where we can in the immediate sense and definitely in the recovery phase. This message is repeated in this edition of Networker and contains donation information.

Over the last month District 9800 has established a Bushfire Response committee to coordinate our District response to the bushfires.

Rotary has an ongoing presence through existing Clubs and Districts together with strong community partnerships across the affected regions. We are well placed to take the lead and provide support for families and communities in need. We will be coordinating our efforts (financial and logistical) with the impacted Districts to ensure that all communities are supported.

Through our networks and partnerships, we have already secured support from many areas.

- * Bendigo Bank has partnered with Rotary International District 9800 to establish an appeal with 100% of donated funds going directly to affected communities.
- * CUB has made a \$250,000 donation and on the Australia Day weekend donated kegs of VB to its outlets with all proceeds going to bushfire efforts
- * Personal protective masks (500,000) were donated by Direct Relief (US) through Rotary connections to RC Melbourne and are being distributed all across Australia to emergency agencies and communities.
- * Very recently the Victorian Transport Authority (VTA) has made available hundreds of shipping containers which will be very useful for homes needing to secure items needed for the rebuilding/recovery efforts.
- * Many Rotary clubs are already donating funds to our funds, the RAWCS fund and the D9820 fund as well as contacting Rotary clubs in the affected areas.

I am truly appreciative of the support we are receiving from Rotarians, Rotary clubs and our partners. To coordinate and maximise our response to those communities and ensure it is based on identified needs from those communities. We need to have a record of all efforts from Rotarians and clubs in our district. Donations in Kinds spearheads District 9800 Bushfire Relief



Donations in Kind has facilitated the provision of numerous activities for bushfire relief so far.

Please let your Club Members know that through their support for the DIK Store they are making a significant contribution to assist the people affected by the current bushfires. Donations In Kind is not a first responder disaster aid organisation, but this does not prevent us helping when someone identifies a specific need. Our focus is on helping to solve the problem not be the cause of the problem. If a Club or a District identifies a specific need, provides a wish list and they are confident the goods will reach their destination, they have access to a fair share of unallocated goods.

The Rotary Melbourne Passport Club members were first to respond through Vet Dr Charles Foster, packing medical supplies for vets across Victoria and New South Wales. Charles met with Dr David Middleton, President Aust Veterinary Association (AVA) at DIK, together creating a wish list for the wild life emergency response teams and members of RPM and Keilor East packed a large quantity of boxes.

David was very impressed with the amount of material available from DIK and very grateful for Rotary's offer to donate much of what is needed. Together they put together the wish list for the AVA and AgVic emergency response teams who are working with Vet teams, Wildlife Shelters etc. in the Bushfire areas. The Rotary Melbourne Passport Club organized a team to pack the goods requested. Instruments and medical supplies worth many thousands of dollars have been donated to help this great cause. - ▶ Undercasting (Velband, Softban) Jelonet - needed +++
- ▶ Combines
- ▶ IV lines - not the ones that go through pumps as they do not drip or do not drip adequately
- ▶ Gauze
- ▶ Hydrogel/Burnaid
- ▶ Normal Saline
- ▶ Chlorhex for wounds
- ▶ IV Cannula's 24G & 22G
- ▶ IV Saline & Hartmans
- ▶ Eye pads
- ▶ Non stick dressings
- ▶ Betadine
- ▶ Sterile MSU pots
- ▶ 18G needles

If stock is out of date does not matter.

Direct Relief, a non-profit disaster relief organisation based in Santa Barbara have just shipped 24 pallets containing 97,500 face masks for people in bushfire areas needing protection from smoke inhalation & they're now at Rotary DIK in West Footscray, Victoria, for redistribution.

Because of the swift action of Rotarians more than a third of these were delivered on the ground on January 15th to North Eastern Victoria and East Gippsland! The others are destined to go to volunteer fire fighters and the Red Cross early the following week. As the community need for more masks becomes clearer, Direct Relief has promised to ship more. Thanks to Direct Relief and Rotarians in California!!!



Bob Glindemann reports on Direct Relief

Rotary Connects the World – Bushfire Masks

Direct Relief Santa Barbara California —> Qantas —> DHL —> Donations In Kind West Footscray —> Red Cross / CFA/ Rotary —> The people who need them.

On the 7th of January Rotary Melbourne received a phone call from a Representative of Direct Relief, which is a Santa Barbara based non-profit, nonpartisan organization with a stated mission to “improve the health and lives of people affected by poverty or emergency situations by mobilising and providing essential medical resources needed for their care.

Direct Relief had already been in touch with the Australian Red Cross and on the basis of pre-commitment from the Red Cross they shipped 24 pallets containing 97,500 P2 / N95 masks to Melbourne utilising air cargo capacity donated by Qantas and ground transport by DHL. The connection with Rotary is that Dean Axelrod, Associate Director, Partnerships & Philanthropy at Direct Relief is also a Rotarian, and is President Elect for the Rotary Club of Santa Barbara. **At Dean’s suggestion, a call was made to Rotary Melbourne on Tuesday morning, resulting in a number of swift actions initiated by Rotary Melbourne:**



- To assist Direct Relief, Rotary Melbourne offered to facilitate access to storage capacity at the Rotary DIK warehouse in West Footscray. Storage capacity was available and the shipment of 24 pallets arrived at the DIK warehouse on the 9 January. We were fortunate that we were filling a container of beds for Somalia and had some room to take them in. The beds went in the morning and the pallets arrived in the afternoon!
- At the same time District 9800 Governor, Grant Hocking wrote to Australian District Governors to advise of the availability of serious quantities of p2 masks and seeking input from Australian Rotary Districts and Clubs on the immediate needs of their communities for these masks.
- This has resulted in the immediate distribution of around 34,000 masks to North Eastern Victoria and East Gippsland.
- Another 20 pallets on the ground in Sydney are destined for D9685 in the Blue Mountains and for 9675 in the Southern Highlands.
- The next consignment of 30 pallets has arrived and distribution is underway.
- **The plan is unfolding and we’re confident that the bulk of the remaining stock of masks will be distributed over the coming weeks including Port Macquarie and Canberra.**

And it’s not only masks.

As addressed on previous pages, a team of members from the new Passport Club and other volunteers sorted and packed 5 pallets of medical consumables under the guidance of a veterinarian member. These have been delivered **to the Victorian Dept Of Agriculture’s** Central Vet Store for issue to animal welfare agencies seeking assistance. We have also despatched 50 cartons of new industrial clothing to Traralgon for use in the forthcoming clean up with the balance of these going into Southern NSW for the same purpose.

This and the other support DIK are providing for this disaster could only happen because of the generosity of the Rotary Clubs who help to fund your store and the volunteers who do the work. These Clubs have already made a significant contribution to Bushfire Aid.

Bushfire Update from District Governor Grant Hocking

Here is the latest update from the D9800 Bushfire Response Committee and we have met everyday this week to help coordinate our District response. The committee is chaired by Sue Foley (RC South Melbourne), with Marion Macleod (Melbourne), PDG Jim Studebaker (North Balwyn) and Rhys Maggs (Essendon North) supported by DGE Philip Archer and myself.

We have been moved by the outpouring of support Rotarians and our community has shown to what will be a long and complex bushfire season.

In the last few days I have also spoken directly with Governors in both the Gippsland and Hume areas of Victoria and we will be working together in our response. We will be coordinating our efforts (financial and logistical) with these Districts to ensure that all communities are supported.

As well as this the 21 Governors across Australia are in constant communication and coordinating the National relief efforts. The aim is to ensure we coordinate and maximise our response to those communities in need as base it on the identified needs from those communities.

Immediate response

Emergency and Disaster response agencies in Victoria do a marvellous job in the immediate care and safety of the affected communities. Relief and Recovery centres are set up with support from Government, Red Cross, and many others. Support is provided in the form of food, accommodation, counselling services and funding for necessities.

I am proud that we have many Rotarians volunteering for front line agencies and responding to requests for support from agencies working in the relief centres and elsewhere including animal welfare. Generous offers are being received from many Rotarians, and there have been many individuals and clubs working in many areas to provide materials and food to affected agencies and communities. This includes the provision of 500,000 P2 facemasks which are being distributed through RC Melbourne and DIK.

Our District Bushfire Response committee would love to have a record of all these efforts from Rotarians and clubs in our district. Launch of Bearbrass Probus at Docklands

Rotary Central Melbourne (RCM) is launching Melbourne Bearbrass Probus at the Dock Library, Docklands, 10am-noon on Wednesday February 12th.

It's the first Probus Club launched within District 9800 since Carlton Gardens in 2016. It's also the first new Probus for inner-Melbourne since RCM launched Melbourne Sunrise Probus in 2011. That club is now full with about 120 members.

(In case you're wondering, "Bearbrass" was a suggested name for the settlement that became "Melbourne". There's also a Bearbrass Restaurant in Southbank).

Bearbrass is enthusiastically backed by Probus headquarters in Sydney, which coordinates more than 1500 Australasian clubs with 125,000 members. Probus headquarters is paying for marketing including display ads in local city newspapers. Robert Renshaw of Glen Waverley Rotary is lending his substantial expertise and will manage the launch meeting. Robert has launched eight Probus clubs in the past three years and currently is helping five potential Probus Clubs get started.



Probus Clubs are for active retirees who want to extend their friendship networks and enjoy stimulating monthly speakers. Interest groups include dinners, theatre, films, arts, sports, books, walks, and local and overseas expeditions.

Probus dues are typically only \$60 a year.

Probus Clubs can only be started by a Rotary Club and they are for members' enjoyment. Charity fund-raising is not allowed. After launch by Rotary, Probus Clubs operate autonomously without Rotary involvement.

The Bearbrass "Interest Meeting" on February 12 will ratify the standard Probus constitution, elect office-bearers and apply for Probus affiliation. Its monthly meetings will then be at the Dock Library at 10am on second Tuesdays of the month, from March.

The number of retiree residents in the CBD, Southbank and Docklands has surged since 2011. Overall, seniors aged 50-74 in CBD, Docklands and Southbank increased 14% from 2016 to 2019, and now total nearly 11,000. The city forecasts their numbers will surge another 25% to 13,500 in 2022. There is a particular need for networking via **Probus because the "tower dwellers" have no historic community. They include many seniors downsizing from the suburbs or country, and some have lost their partner.**

Although Bearbrass will be based at Docklands, its members will come from all over Melbourne city and further out. **Rotary Central Melbourne is fortunate to have secured Dock Library to be the club's venue, with its state-of-the-art auditorium and subsidised pricing to community groups.**

A vital task this month is to get flyers on to city towers' notice boards. If you live in a tower or can assist, please contact tthomas061@gmail.com. Meanwhile could District 9800 Rotarians please alert any prospective member to the Melbourne Bearbrass launch on Feb. 12th.

Rotary Opens Opportunities



Rotary International President-elect Holger Knaack is encouraging Rotarians to seize the many opportunities Rotary offers to enrich their lives and the communities they serve.

Knaack, a member of the Rotary Club of Herzogtum Lauenburg-Mölln, Germany, revealed the 2020-21 presidential theme, *Rotary Opens Opportunities*, to incoming District Governors at the Rotary International Assembly in San Diego, California, USA, on 20 January.

Rotary isn't just a club for people to join, but rather "an invitation to endless opportunities," said Knaack, who becomes president on 1 July. He emphasized that Rotary creates pathways for members to improve their lives and the lives of those they help through service projects.

"We believe that our acts of service, big and small, create opportunities for people who need our help," Knaack said. He added that Rotary creates leadership opportunities and gives members the chance to travel the world to put their service ideas into action and make lifelong connections. **"Everything we do opens another opportunity for someone, somewhere,"** said Knaack.

Changing for the future

Knaack also urged members to embrace change so Rotary can expand and thrive. Rather than setting a **specific target for increasing the number of members, Knaack said he's asking clubs and districts to think** about how to grow in a sustainable and organic way. He wants clubs to focus on keeping current members engaged and adding new members who are the right fit for their club. **We will capture this moment to grow Rotary, making it stronger, more adaptable, and even more aligned with our core values.**

"We need to stop thinking of new members as people we can mark down as statistics and then forget about," Knaack said. **"Every new member changes us a little bit. That person brings a new perspective, new experiences. We need to embrace this constant renewal. We will grow stronger as we learn from new members."**

Knaack pointed to Rotary's Action Plan as a compass that can guide clubs as they evolve. He recommended that every club have a strategic plan meeting at least once a year. At that meeting, clubs should ask where they want to be in five years and how they can bring more value to their members. He also wants to see more women in leadership roles and see Rotaractors play an integral role in how new clubs are formed and run. He encouraged district leaders to create new club models and rethink what it means to be in Rotary, and allow young people to be the architects of these new clubs.

In stressing the need for Rotary members to embrace change, Knaack noted that time won't slow down for Rotary: **"We will not let rapid change defeat us. We will capture this moment to grow Rotary, making it stronger, more adaptable, and even more aligned with our core values."**

Rotary and Toastmasters connect for growth

Rotary International and Toastmasters International are working together to provide our members with even more opportunities for personal and professional growth.

Toastmasters International is a global non profit organization with more than 16,800 clubs in 143 countries. Its members attend club meetings where they give speeches, evaluate the speeches of others, and perform other club duties, with the goal of ultimately becoming more confident speakers, communicators, and leaders. Our organisations are complementary in many ways, but we are each unique in what we offer our members.

As with Rotary, the club is the foundation of the Toastmasters experience. Its clubs offer a supportive and positive environment where members practice their skills. Most clubs are open to the community, have about 20 members, and meet each week or every two weeks for an hour or two.

I hope you will join us in supporting this alliance in your community. You can start by learning more about Toastmasters, exploring its resources and public speaking tips, or visiting a local Toastmasters club. Although the structure of club meetings is consistent, Toastmaster clubs are similar to Rotary clubs in that they each have their own personality. If you do not have a club in your area, you can watch a video to learn what happens at a Toastmasters meeting.

You can also invite members of Toastmasters to visit your club and learn more about Rotary. If you have a Toastmasters club in your area, consider meeting with its members to explore opportunities to collaborate or inviting a member of Toastmasters to participate in a service activity or speak at your club.

Toastmasters will create a leadership development program for Rotarians and Rotaractors. A structured, robust leadership and communication curriculum can help members develop practical skills that will serve them not only in Rotary leadership roles, but in their professional and personal lives as well. Effective leadership skills can strengthen our clubs and increase our impact. We will provide updates about this program when we have more details.

Many of us joined Rotary to make a difference and connect with others in our communities. By working with Toastmasters, our members can discover new ways to network and learn from others, while finding even more value in their Rotary membership experience.

Two senior anaesthetic registrars braved the cold of a Victorian winter for a month of training and observation with the Ballarat Health Service.

The chill in Ballarat was a long way from the tropical heat of Surabaya, where the doctors live. Dr Diah Wahyuningish and Dr Melissa Nathania Theda are the 29th and 30th registrars from Surabaya to be involved in the annual program and spent the majority of their stay at the Ballarat Health Service observing many aspects of anaesthesia.

The two doctors are registrars at Dr Soetomo Hospital in Surabaya, the second largest city in Indonesia. The hospital is at the eastern end of Java, just a stone's throw away from Bali, and with 1500 beds and 150 anaesthetic registrars, it is responsible for the acute management of health in the entire eastern half of Indonesia. This placement allowed the registrars to see differing methods of treatment which they can then use back in Indonesia.

During their visit to the Royal Children's Hospital in Melbourne the registrars observed the use of toys as pre-operative strategy to help a child be calm before surgery, rather than extra medication. The registrars were amazed with the facilities provided at the Royal Children's Hospital, making it more inviting and calming to younger patients.

The registrars thanked everyone at Interplast for their support of this observational placement , saying we are 'very grateful to the Australian community support to us through Interplast', and 'this is a good opportunity to increase knowledge and also skill in anaesthesia'.

The observational placement of these registrars is an ongoing example of both International and Vocational Service working together to create positive outcomes in the Asia-Pacific. The Indonesia Anaesthesia Trainees Attachment and Observer-ship Program is supported by the Australian and New Zealand College of Anaesthetists (ANZCA) and Rotary District 9780.

Rotary & the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation continue partnership

Rotary and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation are renewing their longstanding partnership to end polio, announcing a joint commitment of up to \$450 million to support the global polio eradication effort.



“Because of the efforts of Rotary and its partners, almost 19 million people are walking today who would have otherwise been paralyzed,” said John Germ, Past President of Rotary International who leads Rotary’s polio fundraising efforts.

“By partnering with the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, we’re ensuring that children in polio-affected countries get the lifesaving vaccines they need to be protected from polio for life. As the first organization to envision a polio-free world, Rotary is more committed than ever to delivering on our promise that one day, no child will ever again be paralyzed by polio.”

To an audience of Rotary volunteer leaders from around the world, Bill Gates, co-chair of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation delivered a video message announcing the extension of a funding partnership forged more than a decade ago. Rotary is committed to raising \$50 million per year over the next three years, with every dollar to be matched with two additional dollars from the Gates Foundation. This expanded agreement will translate into up to \$450 million for polio eradication activities.

“The Gates Foundation’s longstanding partnership with Rotary has been vital to fighting polio,” said Mr. Gates in today’s message to Rotary volunteers. **“That’s why we’re extending our funding match, so every dollar that Rotary raises is met with two more. I believe that together, we can make eradication a reality.”**

In addition to the extended funding partnership with the Gates Foundation, Rotary is also announcing US\$45 million in funding for polio eradication efforts in countries throughout Africa (Angola, Ethiopia, Mali, Nigeria, Somalia and South Sudan), and Asia (Afghanistan, Pakistan, Papua New Guinea, Pakistan and the Philippines). The funding will help support crucial polio eradication activities such as immunization and disease detection, research, and community mobilization.

Polio—a paralyzing and sometimes deadly disease—is on the verge of becoming the second human disease in history to be eradicated. This critical funding helps ensure that children in at-risk countries are protected from polio, and that the wild poliovirus is eliminated in the last two countries that continue to report cases.

While only Afghanistan and Pakistan continue to report cases of wild poliovirus, the remaining challenges to global eradication—like difficulty reaching children amid insecurity and conflict and weak health systems—have proven to be the most difficult. In order to meet these roadblocks head on and ensure the continuation of program efforts, funding and support from donors and world governments is imperative.



Rotary has contributed more than \$2 billion to fight polio, including matching funds from the Gates Foundation, and countless volunteer hours since launching its polio eradication program, PolioPlus, in 1985. In 1988, Rotary formed the Global Polio Eradication Initiative with the World Health Organization, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The Gates Foundation and Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance later joined. When the initiative launched, there were 350,000 cases of polio every year. Today the incidence of polio has plummeted by more than 99.9 percent.


