DG Weekly Message

September is Rotary New Generations Month.

What better way to celebrate the start of this special month than by reporting on a brand new program for a younger generation than we would typically focus on in Rotary.

August 24 saw the launch of a wonderful new program in District 9800 called EarlyAct[®] at Baden Powell College, Tarneit.

Think of EarlyAct as Interact for Primary school kids and you are close to the mark.

This first for D9800 and first in Victoria owes its outcome to two visionaries in our District.

The recommendation to participate in the EarlyAct program comes from Vanda Mullen who was appointed this year as my Special Representative to grow Rotaract and Interact in our District. Vanda had the vision, initiative and foresight to recommend that we also institute a similar program for younger people. With some research she was able to establish that we did not need to reinvent the (Rotary) wheel, as such a program has been in place since 1999 in North America, Europe and South Africa. It has also been in place in 2 Queensland districts for some years. It is not yet an official Rotary program, but is acknowledged by Rotary, and at the Council on Legislation in 2103, it will again be submitted for endorsement to confirm the support that it had at the 2010 Council.

Inspiration needs to be matched with courage and commitment to get such a program off the ground. Enter Julie Mason, our International Service Chair and GSE Leader for our team to D1080

in the UK next month. In her spare time Julie is Principal of Baden Powell College at Tarneit. The 2 campuses of this school are model, impressive schools and a visit there will show why Julie has been recognised with awards as High Performing Principal in 2008 and selected as Herald Sun Principal of the Year in 2005

Julie could see that the EarlyAct program was just right for her school and so the program was initiated at Baden Powell College under the sponsorship of the Rotary Club of Wyndham, of which Julie is a member.

The launch of the EarlyAct club at Baden Powell College was before an assembly of staff and parents and of course the EarlyActors. Rotary District 9800 was represented by DGE Ross Butterworth, DG's Special Representative Interact/ Rotaract/EarlyAct Extension Vanda Mullen, District Chair International Service & College Principal Julie Mason, AG Cherrie Osborn, President Max Coster of RC Wyndham, Councillor Bob Fairclough and AG Gary Willson, RC Wyndham and many wonderful partners and Rotarians and me.

AG Cherrie was not present just to make up numbers or enjoy the excellent afternoon tea, but to make a record of proceedings. This is how she saw it: "There was a buzz in the air of excitement and expectation as the formal proceedings got under way.






Life is for Living By JillWeeks

Some time before I joined RC Hawthorn, I was writing a book about people's experiences of retirement, and I was referred to the Rev. Arch Crow. Sadly, Arch passed away on 25th August. His obituary can be read at http://tributes. theage.com.au/obituaries/theage-au/obituary.aspx?pid=159477594

Below are a few insights into his remarkable life. Arch really stressed the significance of his visit to lona, which helped make his mind up to go into the Ministry.



Immediately prior to retirement.

I was Chaplain of Scotch College Hawthorn from 1967 to 1985. I then had a parttime appointment as Associate Minister of the Paton Uniting Church Deepdene from 1986 to 1996. These positions represented a major career changes from the Australian Defence Department to the Church - a complete reorientation but with no regrets.

Enjoying work before retiring?

Very much so. Extremely demanding but very rewarding. At Scotch I helped to prepare several generations of boys for a rapidly changing future. It was a full teaching load; and I introduced the Indonesian language to the school curriculum. There were social issues too, like the drugs and permissive sex. Add to that: Chapel services, sports supervision, weddings and conducting school groups to Southeast Asia.

At Paton Church I had a contract to share the pastoral work and worship services

What was the highlight of your career?

I had two highlights in my career. One was visiting the sacred island of Iona in Scotland, during my Defence days in London; and feeling a call to change my profession to the Ministry of the Church. The focal point in the historic Abbey cloisters was a striking bronze sculpture designed by a world- renowned Jewish artist and entitled, "Descent of the Spirit."

Incited in French are these words: "I Jacob Lipshitz, faithful to the religion of my ancestors, have made this Virgin for the benefit of all mankind, that the Spirit may reign." A prototype stands in a beautiful Roman Catholic church in Mante Savoie in France; another in the Cultural Centre of Los Angeles. Religion and secular, Protestant and Catholic, New World and Old are thus drawn together by the beneficent Spirit of God.

The other highlight was to become founding President of the Victorian Indonesian Language Teachers Association; and help to develop good Asian - Australian relations.

What is a typical day or week for you?

On a day to day basis, I rise early, at about 6 a.m. or earlier. I walk before breakfast, I read Bible notes, reflect without interruptions and get through books that I haven't had the opportunity of doing so. The Paton Church takes up a fair amount of time - visiting people, people having accidents, births, deaths and marriages, people needing counselling, and helping young parents. I also still have an association with Scotch College.

I have been involved in a number of activities since retiring. I went on a Clergy visit to Egypt and Israel, led by Rabbi John Levi in 1986. In 1988 I went on a Goodwill visit to China, where I took part in English conversation practice for students at universities and other tertiary education centres in Jiangsu Province. Whilst in China I gave a lecture in English to students of a medical faculty at a Chinese university on Youth Developments in the Western world. I've also tried to get an exhibition in Australia for a leading Chinese artist and to get a university place for a brilliant Chinese student in the U.S.A.

To help cultivate better relations between Jews and Christians, Judaism and Christianity, I became a member of the Council of Christians and Jews. I'm also on the Council of Christians working party on Christians and Jews. I am also on the Uniting Church in Australia Working Group in Christians and Jews. I've done a one-man project on attitudes to Jew and Judaism by the whole Uniting Church in Australia.

As founding President of the Victorian Indonesian Language Teachers' Association and first Honorary Member in 1969, I have continued my interest in Australia's cultivation of Asian Languages and Culture.

Other groups and activities I'm involved in include; being President of the 18th Australian Infantry Brigade Association 7th Division (AIF) of Victoria, Rotary, an Alzheimer and dementia council, a golf club, Melbourne Cricket Club and I've been a wartime officer of the Victorian Scottish Regiment: 200th Anniversary of the Gordon Highlanders, Aberdeen. I'm also Chairperson of the Uniting Church Lodge Program (Alzheimer's Hostels), I celebrate communion for one of those hostels. I also help fundraise for Scotch College.

For relaxation I go to the cricket and football, read, listen to music, watch films, plays and go on picnics.





Life is for Living (continued)

Retirement to me involves:

Active service to the church, family, friends and community; and the leisure to do something or nothing.

As a child what did you want to do?

I didn't want to do anything specific, but I wanted to help people in some way. My parents took me to a Vocational Guidance expert who proposed: Law, Medicine or the Church. After one year of Medicine, some years in the Army, a short time in business, and eleven years in Defence, I turned to the Church.

What are your future goals?

To keep on enjoying music and people.

Do you have a motto for retirement?

Yes. "Life is for living. Live it to the full."

PhD Scholars Find a Breakthrough in Health

Australian Rotary Health has provided almost \$28 million worth of funds to medical research as a result of its kind supporters. This is achieved through a range of scholarships and research grants including PhD Scholarships.

We have awarded 29 Ian Scott Scholarships, in honour of the man who founded Australian Rotary Health in 1981, since their commencement in 2000. Australian Rotary Health has also partnered with Rotary Clubs and Universities around Australia to award 78 Funding Partners Scholarships since 2004. Each PhD Scholarship is awarded as an annual taxfree stipend of up to \$29,000.

Our Ian Scott Scholars have studied the effects of globalization on suicide rates around the world, determined the priorities for depression and bipolar disorder research, and one PhD project provided strategies for tackling eating disorders which contributed to the curriculum in the youth version of the Mental Health First Aid program. Funding Partner Scholarships have financed the development of new drugs to treat osteoarthritis, a study which uncovered the foundations for pancreatic cancer treatments and an investigation into potential proteins to treat Alzheimer's.

Australian Rotary Health's largest range of scholarships currently available is Funding Partner Scholarships. They are vital in providing much needed finances for health research and are not possible without the partnership and support of Rotary Clubs and Districts around Australia.

Australian Rotary Health currently funds 7 Ian Scott Scholarships and 38 Funding Partner Scholarships into the areas of neurological and auto immune disorders, cancer, children's health and mental health.



DG Weekly Message

September is Rotary New Generations Month.

Engage tomorrow's leaders today!

For many Rotarians the expectation that each month will be designated as special months of Rotary activity seems as old as Rotary itself. It turns out to be a relatively recent state of affairs having been introduced at the start of the 1983 Rotary year when William E Skelton was RI President. The monthly focus was consistent with the theme for that year of "Share Rotary – Serve People". Given that we have just come out of Membership Month it is noteworthy that 714 new clubs were chartered that year; the most ever in Rotary.

This month as we know is New Generations Month but New Generations is a very recent 5th Avenue of Service. The concept of Avenues service grew from an early realisation (in 1926) that there needed to be a way to simply describe Rotary's objectives. A concept was developed that Rotary was like a 3 lane highway (Club Service, Vocational Service and Community Service). In 1928 the International Convention decided that International Service was also a fundamental aspect of Rotary. It is not recorded why highway lanes became Avenues, but with the inclusion of International Service, came the lasting designation of Avenues of Service.

So we come to New Generations as an Avenue of Service. Rotarians quickly started to lobby for "Youth Service" to become the 5th Avenue, but they also lobbied for other forms of service

to be included, such as Service to the Handicapped. The RI Board held firm against additional Avenues, arguing that if Youth was added, "the elderly" would also be inevitable.

It was not until Representatives at the 2010 Council on Legislation approved an enactment that New Generations became the Fifth Avenue of Service. The vote in favour was a near run thing at 263 to 250 and was adopted after an amendment to change the name from Youth Service, as originally proposed, to New Generations.

It was argued that the Avenue of New Generations recognises the positive change implemented by youth and young adults involved in leadership development activities, community and international service projects, and exchange programs that enrich and foster world peace and cultural understanding - New Generations is the future of Rotary.

The clincher was the acknowledgment of the volume of activity in youth programs within Rotary.

A little reflection will demonstrate to us all just how much of our Rotary activity revolves around the New Generations Avenue of Service. The Youth Exchange Program has been the most enduring program, effectively commencing in 1927.

RYLA commenced in Queensland in 1959 and spread quickly, first through Australia and then around the world. It was adopted as an official Rotary Youth program in 1971. Interact evolved somewhat in parallel to RYLA but was the progeny of a specially constituted international committee. The first Interact Club was launched in Melbourne in 1962 – but Melbourne in Florida (which incidentally was apparently so named after Melbourne, Australia).

Networker

Interact has often been seen as Rotaract for High Schools. In fact Rotaract grew out of Interact, commencing in 1968. Technically it is not a Youth program but of course qualifies as a New Generations program. With EarlyAct now expanding into our District we can proudly say that we have the Trifecta of service based New Generations programs – and they are all winners.

In a way these signature Rotary programs are only the tip of the iceberg. As I visit clubs, the focus on New Generations programs is very obvious.

Many clubs of course support the signature programs but there is also great support for MUNA (Model United Nations Assembly). And what a good story we have to tell about that program. As for the last few years we continued with the policy of sending the winning team and a combined team from our District MUNA to a National MUNA in Canberra. Our winning team was Blake Dunne and Kapil Bhargava from Scotch College (sponsored by the Rotary Club of Toorak) and the combined team was Anne Williamson from Wesley College (sponsored by the Rotary Club of Melbourne) with Emily Kayes from Sacred Heart Girls College (sponsored by the Rotary Club of Chadstone/East Malvern). At Canberra, the boys represented Switzerland and the girls represented France.

There were 32 teams from most states of Australia and the debating standard was the highest ever. The result for our district was excellent with our combined team judged 2nd and our other team judged 3rd. The students had the privilege of debating in the House of Assembly in Old Parliament House as well as being given a tour of the Australian National University and also hosted by the university for a prestigious dinner on the Saturday night with an excellent guest speaker.

We also have RYPEN (Rotary Youth Program for Enrichment) for year 10 and 11 students. We have 2 camps each year to develop the potential of "average" students

I've recently written about NYSF (National Youth Science Forum), a fully residential 12 day program which is highly contested and enthusiastically supported by many clubs. The Science Experience is a 2 to 3 day science based summer program that is also well supported.

There are many other programs run by individual clubs, such as debating contests, public speaking programs, mentoring, resume writing support as well as the District Endorsed First Steps, Youth job search program.

Yes, New Generations is a worthy Avenue of Service and Rotarians willingly give of their time to invest in the future of our next generation.

As always, Rotary - it's amazing!

When I read of the Rotary cricket fellowship in a Rotary Down Under article in 1999 my immediate reaction was enthusiasm to join as cricket has been a life long passion for me. What I have discovered since then is that I have a worldwide circle of Rotary friends with whom I can share my passion. The cricket fellowship has members in all cricket playing countries plus others like Nepal, Fiji and the US. Activities take place on three levels – international, national and local.

International festivals are held every two or so years with the most recent being March 2012 at Vapi in India. Before that Durban, Colombo, Hunter Valley, Christchurch, Chennai and Fordingbridge (UK) have been venues. June 2014 will see the next festival held in Nottingham, UK.

In Australia week-long national festivals also occur every two years or so. Every mainland State has hosted at least once over the last dozen years. Adelaide is the venue for the next national festival in October this year – organiser Bob

Brigden would be delighted to hear from any Rotarian who wishes to take part as a first experience of the fellowship.

Australian International Fellowship of Cricketing Rotarians welcomes any interested Rotarian who wishes to become a member of the fellowship. Age is no barrier – several playing members currently are over the age of 70.

Touring as a group is great fun. I have been involved with Rotary cricket in New Zealand, England, India and South Africa. For example, a party of us spent four weeks in UK in 2005. We were home hosted in nine different localities around the country. We played games against local Rotarians in each locality and made many new Rotary friends along the way.

One of the side benefits that can follow on from these contacts is that Matching Grants can be set up with the clubs and Districts of other members. I personally have executed four such grants with Rotarians and clubs in India (twice), South Africa and Pakistan.

Belonging to a fellowship can add so much to one's Rotary experience. I recommend it to you.






Fifteen schools and orphanages throughout Cambodia have asked us to assess their childrens' eyesight and dispense spectacles.






in 1982. September 21 was declared as the permanent date for the International Day of Peace in 2002. From inception, each year millions of people all over the world participate in scheduled events ranging from private gatherings to public concerts and major forums.

In this Rotary year of Peace through Service the International Day of Peace serves to remind us that for Rotarians the pursuit of peace is a lifetime commitment, not just one day of the year. The Rotary Foundation has as its mission, the advancement of world understanding, goodwill and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty.

Rotary has been doing much more than talking about peace. Rotary of course was very much involved in the establishment of the United Nations Organisation in the first place. Rotarians were also instrumental in establishing the world's first Peace Park 1932 convincing the governments of Canada and the USA to join national Parks in Alberta and Montana, to form Waterton-Glacier International Peace Park. Today, Rotarians govern the Waterton-Glacier International Peace Park Association. Canadians and Americans are equally represented on the board, and the presidency alternates between the two countries. Rotarians gather in September each year for a weekend of fellowship and goodwill.

Just as it has taken on the challenge of eradicating polio (which of itself is a major contributor to world peace) Rotary continues to make a practical contribution to world peace through the establishment of the Rotary Centers for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution. This program came to fruition in 2002 and has been supported by District 9800 from the outset. In fact our district is the only district in the Rotary world to have had at least one Peace Scholar nominated to the program every year. D9800 is the only Australasian District designated a Peace Builder District through our ongoing financial support of the program.

This week our first Peace Fellow, Tania Miletic is a keynote speaker and Bob Fels from the Rotary Club of Melbourne will also address the Rotary Peace Communities International Conference "Peace in Action" being held in Wagga Wagga. Bob is in his second three-year term as a member of the Rotary Peace Centers Committee of Rotary International, a reflection of his enormous personal contribution to this program.

Rotary District 9800 has supported Peace through Service in these most practical ways and in this special year of Peace through Service our District Conference in Albury will acknowledge the great contributions of Rotary and Rotarians to Peace through Service.

Education and Literacy

Receiving an education should not be an accident of birth; it should be a right for everyone. It's understandable that it is one of Rotary's "Six Areas of Focus" and it's a principle that everyone in our community will support. Currently 18% of population; 677,000,000 people are illiterate and 75,000,000 children don't go to school. If the problem was uniform it would be easy to fix, but as we know this is not the case. We need to tackle it school by school and country by country. We know how to do this as it has strong parallels with our approach for polio eradication. We know the things we have to do, provide schools, train and provide teachers and supply the equipment. There are two areas we need to tackle, teaching children and teaching adults. We could use the shotgun approach of every club choosing their own project; it's very democratic but not very efficient. Or we can have a plan and invite Clubs to participate.

Where should we start?

Helping Locally:

Although we have a great education system there are areas that need assistance. We know the main problems are people with learning difficulties, migrants and remote communities. The solutions are known and our role should be to help with the existing projects.

Clubs could enquire in their communities to see how they can assist and they have the opportunity to help the Aboriginal Literacy Foundation, through Donations In Kind.

In the other Australian Districts:

Before we look for ways to help overseas Districts with their projects, we need to look closely at our own area of responsibility; because no one else it going to. Each District is the Rotary world expert for identifying need in their area.

- Timor Leste has a 50.1% literacy rate. 500,000 need our help.
- PNG 60.1% literary rate.
 Solomon Islands 76.6% literacy rate.
- 2,700,000 need our help. 120,000 need our help.

This provides plenty of scope for Clubs and when we solve these issues we can look at other countries.

So how can we get involved and start to make a difference?

Provide the infrastructure: Rotary Australia World Community Service (RAWCS) looks after the overseas aspect. We need to build and refurbish schools. A list of the current projects is available for each of these countries and many are looking for assistance. RAWCS can also provide potential projects to adopt, or help you with individual Club projects.

Volunteer to work overseas: While many of the Volunteers work on building projects there are opportunities for everyone to help with teaching. Some people may choose remote locations, but there are also many very pleasant places to assist.

Training Teachers: Those with the skills can help with training overseas and we can also fund the training.

Provide the equipment and student needs: This is one of the easy areas. There are vast amounts of equipment we can get for free. Clubs can contribute by sourcing material and getting it to a Donation In Kind Store, helping to pack or paying for the freight.







Helping in our Region

Networker

Rotary International's aim is to help everyone and Clubs will be given support where ever the project is located, but serious consideration should be given to helping neighbouring countries first.

Donations In Kind Stores are well equipped to help our northern neighbours and have excellent relations with them. As most of the material available in the Stores is similar, it is more practical for individual Stores to make regular shipments to one country. The Northern and Eastern RAWCS Regions ship regularly to PNG and the Solomon Islands. The West Footscray Store regularly ships goods to Timor Leste.

D9800 is the largest District in Victoria and has very close ties with Timor Leste, so it is appropriate that we take a leading role in coordinating support for this nation. This ten year old country suffered major devastation in the war for independence and is the poorest in our region, so there is much to do. It is a rugged country with limited infrastructure and travelling in the bush is a challenge. Because transport is very limited, many small primary schools need to be established within walking distance of the pupils. Many of the existing structures require major refurbishing and often electricity; water and sewerage are still a dream. All need equipment and student supplies. They are currently short of 100,000 tables and chairs to service the current need.

There is equipment in stock that can be shipped immediately. Schools have equipment available to collect and some are prepared to become partners in your project. A School/Rotary partnership package has been prepared to assist Clubs when they make contact.


Pakistan scoring great gains despite challenges

A charity providing one-on-one services to young homeless people in Melbourne is in need of some publishing, graphic design and printing expertise.

Anne Mitchell, manager of Steps Outreach Service, has drafted a booklet of about 20 A4 pages for Years 9-10students on social justice themes. This draft explains the extent and nature of youth homelessness, especially the shocking circumstances that often compel a teenager to leave home and try to live on the streets.

Anne, who was herself a primary teacher for 14 years, hopes school students may even be inspired to develop projects to support homeless young people. Anne's draft is ready now for the graphic design process and she needs people who can give her practical input.

Last year she coordinated several Rotary helpers and the outcome was a high-quality but low-expense coffee table book, "Under the Bridge: Voices from the Street". This used poems written by homeless young people and atmospheric pictures shot by school students as illustrations.

The new education project will be sold to schools together with several copies of Under the Bridge. "My goal this year is to help students realize the happiness that comes from generous acts towards those less fortunate," she says. "Acts of kindness make everyone happier, including the giver." Steps Outreach is a small service within the non-denominational Concern Australia organisation, based at Collingwood. Steps' youth workers spend the week locating and visiting homeless young people around the suburbs and helping them with advocacy and referral at Centrelink, with police, rehab and a myriad of other agencies. Did you know that 1 in 6 Australians has a serial killer lurking inside?


This is the theme of the new media campaign by the National Stroke Foundation which will be shown around the country to help raise awareness of stroke.

District 9800 Community Service Chair, Grant Hocking, recently attended the launch of the new NSF campaign to raise the profile of stroke in Australia. The decision to run this campaign was made after consulting many people, including those at risk and those affected by stroke.

There will be 60,000 strokes in Australia this year. Many people would not know that stroke is Australia's second biggest killer (33% of all people who have a stroke die within the first year) and a leading cause of disability amongst adults.

"Despite these startling statistics many people don't understand the impact that stroke can have on individuals and their families. More needs to be done," said Grant.


There is also a lot of information available to provide a better understanding of stroke and how to reduce your risk of stroke.

Hopefully everyone is aware of the FAST campaign to help identify a stroke and to call '000' for immediate assistance. No matter how long symptoms last, stroke is always a medical emergency. For many people, treatments in hospital can lessen the impact of a stroke, said Grant.



Business tips: How to give and take feedback

Accepting feedback from employees, colleagues and managers can be daunting and humbling, but it is necessary to improve your own work and a business's operations. Equally important is knowing how to give feedback in a constructive and meaningful way. Read on for some helpful hints on how to handle the feedback loop.

While much has been written about how to offer constructive criticism to a colleague or employee, how should you receive it in return?

Tony Schwartz, CEO of The Energy Project, an American company that focuses on employee engagement and energising workforces, recently explored this subject for the Harvard Business Review, and argues that 'constructive criticism' is ill-defined in the first place.



Schwartz argues that 'constructive criticism' is a monologue, not a dialogue, and a "polarising" phrase. "We need to think of these interchanges instead as opportunities for honest inquiry and genuine learning," he writes. Schwartz offers three tips for giving feedback, which can also be extrapolated into effective ways to receive it:

1) Don't feel your own value is at risk when giving or receiving feedback.

2) Resist the "primal impulse" to defend yourself when giving or receiving feedback, otherwise it will only result in the two parties defending their own value. Don't deny responsibility for a mistake if confronted with one during the feedback process.

3) Treat everything that is said as "one interpretation of the facts". The feedback giver should never assume they are definitively correct on all matters. Instead, treat the feedback in a "spirit of humble exploration".

Other tips for receiving well-intended feedback, offered by US professional development firm Employee Development Systems Inc, include:

Take your time responding to feedback and don't automatically say the first thing that comes to mind, especially if it's a negative reaction.

If you don't agree with all the criticism, look for the elements of truth within it and identify how you can improve in those areas, before dealing with the rest of it.

VECCI also runs comprehensive training on the day-to-day management of staff, including undertaking the difficult conversations successfully.



DG Weekly Message

The transition from a month celebrating Rotary's newest Avenue of Service to a month celebrating one of the original Avenues of Service is not the leap it might seem. Many programs that fall within the Vocational Service portfolio (the Second Avenue of Service) are directed to youth.

These programs include: **Computers 4 Kids** Literacy programs Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE) Students, Ethics and Leadership (SEAL)

There are many other mainstays of traditional Rotary Vocational programs that continue or in some cases could be reprised by Clubs. Included amongst these are: Career Insight programs, School Literacy programs, Student Mentoring, Mock Interviews, Spelling Bees, Résumé Writing, Interview Workshops, Reading programs, The Four-Way Test Debate/ Essay contests and so on.

The reference to the Four-Way test is a reminder that Vocational Service is very much about harnessing a member's vocational talents to promoting the highest ethical standards, not only in business but society at large. It is also about contributing those talents to addressing the problems and needs of society.

The Four-Way Test is widely and appropriately promoted in

Rotary. Many clubs recite the test to constantly remind us of its fundamental importance to not only Rotarians but as a guiding principle for everyone.

Most of us have heard the story about how this test came about, but it is worth repeating. It did not start out as a Rotary principle but was most probably inspired by the Rotary Code of Ethics that was first adopted in 1914. The Four-Way Test was devised by Herbert J. Taylor, a member of the Rotary Club of Chicago in 1932 at the height of the Great Depression. Taylor had been recruited to turn around the near bankrupt Club Aluminum Company and in a final effort to do so, drew on his Rotary background to develop a code for his business that would provide an ethical compass for the difficult decisions that needed to be made on a daily basis.

Whilst Taylor wrote the test he "road tested" it widely and made sure that it was acceptable to people of all faiths. It is now history that the company was turned around and paid out handsome dividends and grew its net worth significantly.

The Four-Way Test was adopted by Rotary in 1943 and when Herb Taylor went on to become RI President in 1954 he gifted the copyright of

the Test to Rotary International. The rest, as they say, is history. The Four-Way test has been shared widely outside of Rotary by Rotarians and can be found in many public places. It can even be found on the moon, a Four-Way Test pin having been left there by astronaut Buzz Aldrin!

It is sobering to reflect that adoption of The Four-Way Test by nations and all people in conflict situations would surely result in world peace and personal peace. This would be "Peace through Service".

The Rotary code of Ethics was redrafted under the challenge of RI President Chuck Keller in 1987-88 to become the Declaration of Rotarians in Businesses and Professions. This declaration defined as a set of values that were appropriate for the personal conduct of Rotarians in businesses or professions.

Sadly my own straw polling suggests that this declaration is no longer as widely known or promoted as it once was. It was once part of the new member kit handed to every new Rotarian when they were inducted. Possibly it is still handed out in some clubs. It is included in the current District Directory as it has been for many years. Like the Four-Way Test it is a powerful guiding statement for all Rotarians, whether still working or retired.

Rotary does however change with the times (although some may argue that it does so too slowly) and at the end of 2011 the RI Board last year determined to rename the declaration the "Rotary Code of Conduct". This was to recognise that Rotary Club memberships now include community leaders, retired persons, and others not currently in businesses or professions In this Vocational Services Month it is especially worth recording the "Rotary Code of Conduct" in Networker

The version here is a little different to that in our District Directory in that the language is a little more contemporary]. It is very much a companion of and an extension of The Four-Way Test!

Have a good week in Rotary - it's amazing.

ROTARY CODE OF CONDUCT

As a Rotarian, I will

- 1. Exemplify the core value of integrity in all behaviors and activities
- 2. Use my vocational experience and talents to serve in Rotary
- 3. Conduct all my personal, business, and personal affairs ethically, encouraging and fostering high ethical standards as an example to others
- 4. Be fair in all dealings with others and treat them with the respect due to them as fellow human beings
- 5. Promote recognition and respect for all occupations which are useful to society
- 6. Offer my vocational talents to provide opportunities for young people, to work for the special needs of others, and to improve the quality of life in my community
- 7. Honour the trust that Rotary and fellow Rotarians provide and not do anytjing they will bring disfavour or reflect adversely on Rotary or fellow Rotarians
- 8. Not seek from fellow Rotarians a privilege or advantage not normally accorded others in a business or professional relationship




Nganambala, Northern Territory

This was an extraordinary cultural, touristic and beneficial experience which touched the lives of the eight who attended. It also positively affected the whole Nganambala community.... by installing a "kitchen garden". Environmentally sound, educationally useful, nutritionally important and sustainable and expandable into the future.

Currently the diets of many Aboriginal people in remote communities are very poor and the children are malnourished, with little stamina and concentration ability. In response to a request from the principal of Nganambala School to fill their bellies with fresh, healthy fruit and vegetables, the Rotary Clubs of Albert Park, Brighton, Brighton North and Darwin all put their heads together and created the pilot Project Kitchen Garden.

The children are hungry, living conditions poor, the schools are inappropriately resourced (state of the art white boards and computers, but no playground equipment), reading books are in poor condition and learning materials are lacking. But most importantly, students need to be able to concentrate so they can reach their potential... nourishing food is so vital.

Over a ten-day period our Rotary group travelled 5 hours out of Darwin, into the Northern Territory's outback, where there are no made roads or signage, no mobile connection, just kilometers of bumpy corrugated roads. We installed the 11,000L water tank, fertilized the soil, designed and established a garden bed together with the students, the teachers and the community. We also got to swim at two waterfalls, feasted at a chin birr, debate with two politicians seeking community support and enjoyed great fellowship with the teachers and within the Rotary group.

We discussed the challenges and projects ahead with Geoff Perry, CEO of Top End Schools. Geoff believes that Rotary can work with organizations like his, not replacing them but augmenting their effectiveness and capacity to develop indigenous communities. The Clubs now have the contacts to do similar projects in the Northern Territory, the Tiwi Islands and the Solomon Islands. Matt Gale, Principal Nganambala School, has requested a similar project with him in the Solomon Islands next year.

The Rotary clubs are indebted to Red Dust who supplied a car, satellite phone, swags and satellite navigation, GWE-LO Developments who supplied the trailer for the 11,000L water tank and Nganambala School who provided accommodation.

With an average of 70 stall holders and around 1800 patrons per market day we raise sufficient amounts of cash to be able to make very generous donations to local charities with whom we are connected: in ten years we have raised approximately \$840,000.

The team of six was ultimately selected from 230 applications.

The three team members present were PDG Jeffrey Bird of Point Gellibrand RC, Spencer Bock of Melbourne RC and Dr Michael Heffernan.

John Nathan spoke of the great bond that was formed by the team during their trip which is exemplified by the fact that the team has met annually since the visit and is shortly about to have their 46th reunion.

John eloquently described the significance that the GSE experience had had on him and surprised those present when he quoted from his recommendations for future GSE visits in his report to the District Board after the trip, which he still has in his filing cabinet at home!

Those recommendations included fewer and longer stays with host families which he was delighted to note was a feature of current GSE programs in the District.

Each of the members present spoke briefly and with a passion for their own personal experience.

The common thread from each of the members present was that the experience was life changing in the true sense of those words.

PDG Jeffrey Bird lamented that it had taken too long after the experience for him to be invited to join Rotary and urged all present to follow up GSE alumni as potential new members.

Spencer Bock has been a Rotarian for many years and remains a member of Melbourne RC and has served as an Assistant Governor. He spoke in glowing terms of how the experience changed him from wishing to read at the Bar to becoming a local lawyer servicing a rural community which he did for in excess of 40 years and continues to do part time.

The night was extra special as also present as guests were Julie Mason the team leader of the GSE team leaving for District 1080 in the UK in early October and one of the team members Kirsten Brewer, nominated by Brighton North RC, who expressed her thanks to the club and was spell bound by the tales from the 1966 GSE team.

Rotary Action Group: Maternal Health Project By Vanessa N. Glavinskas, Rotary International News

In Nigeria, one out of every 18 women dies as a result of childbirth. The country has the second-highest maternal

That's why the Rotarian Action Group for Population Growth and Sustainable Development targeted the northern Nigerian states of Kaduna and Kano with a pilot program aimed at reducing maternal mortality by preventing and treating obstetric fistula, a serious birth injury. From 2005 until 2010, the project, partly supported by a grant from The Rotary Foundation, reduced maternal death by 60% in participating hospitals, reached 1 million women of childbearing age, and repaired obstetric fistulas for 1,500 Nigerian women.



We have to empower women, and women cannot be empowered if they can't make their own choices in antenatal care and child spacing, says Dr. Robert Zinser, CEO of the Rotarian Action Group for Population Growth and Sustainable Development and member of the Rotary Club of Ludwigshafen-Rheinschanze, Germany.

Zinser has been to Nigeria nearly 20 times to work on maternal and child health projects, including the northern Nigeria pilot focused on the prevention and treatment of fistulas. An obstetric fistula is a birth injury that can cause stillbirth and, in the mother, chronic incontinence, infection, nerve damage, or death. The primary cause is labour that goes on for too long, often for days. Because 70% of Nigerian women deliver at home, often without access

to proper medical care, long labours that would be prevented in the developed world are more common.

According to the World Health Organization, prevention is the key, Zinser says. We insisted on a comprehensive approach of better antenatal care that includes training, equipment, quality, hygiene, and benchmarking.

The project also included surgery to repair damage from fistula. Many women with the injury don't know it can be repaired, so Rotarians created a series of radio programs that explained the condition, its causes, and the available treatment.


People listened, and village women found out their fistulas could be repaired at the Rotary center. We repaired 1,500 fistulas, 500 more than our goal, Zinser says.

The action group is now preparing to replicate the project in the states of Abuja and Onoda, with plans to eventually establish the model in other central and southern Nigeria states.

Zinser is adamant that the project can be implemented in other areas with high maternal mortality. We must save the mothers so that the mothers can save the world, he says.





