The commitments will vary from Club to Club and volunteer to volunteer but all assistance will be gratefully received by the Communities in question who are now struggling with the efforts required to re-establish, the time and energy involved and the loss of the volunteer workforce initially available to them. Duties involved vary from light domestic and administrative duties to heavy physical tasks such as property clearing, fencing and wood splitting. Days at a time to one day a month whatever time can be allocated will all assist with the work required and more details will be circulated to the Clubs in coming days. Please help!

When the Rotary Club of Albert Park held its annual Book Fair in last October at the Albert Park Primary School, there were winners all round.

Book-lovers came from as far afield as Myrtleford to fill boxes with old and new pre-loved books, CDs and DVDs - all at scandalously low prices; Port Phillip residents who had outgrown some of their book collections throughout the year were happy to donate them via the wheelie bins at Port Melbourne, Albert Park and St Kilda libraries; and the club was thrilled to donate the proceeds of the book fair and the year's book collections to local causes.

Australia – Turkey Gallipoli Short Term Youth Exchange Program

Announcement from DG Colin Muir:

September is the New Generations month and in keeping with the theme of this month, I would like to announce a new innovative program for D-9800. The initiative entitled "Australia - Turkey Gallipoli Short Term Youth Exchange Program" will enable 20 young students to go to Turkey, live with Turkish families and attend Anzac Day ceremonies at Gallipoli. Most likely to be a life changing experience, the program has the following attributes.



Concept: Sending three Year 10/11 students to a high school in Turkey in April for about four weeks is the concept of the program. The interested Rotary Club will take on the facilitation role in finding a high school to work with. The partnering local high school will undertake the project management and implementation process. It is expected that the local RSL Clubs would partake in this project.

Students from Turkey will be encouraged to come to Australia in exchange to be hosted by the school partaking in the program, probably in July-August, the northern hemisphere's holiday period.



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In Turkey: The students to be home-hosted by Rotary or school families to experience the local cultural environment. These families could be in Istanbul [D-2420] or nearby. The students will attend school whilst in Turkey.

The students will all attend the Dawn Service and Lone Pine ceremonies at ANZAC Cove on 25th of April 2010, the 95th Anniversary of that tragic campaign. Then depart for home, soon after.

Together with the DG of D-2420 Mr Nuri Ozgur, I have signed a Memorandum of Agreement [MOA], which establishes the platform for this program.

Costs: The local communities, both in Australia and Turkey, will be responsible for raising the funds for the students' travel & insurance costs. Rotary Clubs can support the project by donation or assisting with fund raising. The estimated cost is airfare and insurance which is about \$2400. Apart from pocket money needed, it is not expected that there will be further costs in Turkey.

It is anticipated that the cost of airfare is to be shared between student, sponsoring RC, school and RSL. It is anticipated that socially disadvantaged students will be targeted.

Timing: Interested Rotary clubs will, after finding a partnering school, register their expression of interest with the Youth Exchange Committee. If selected, the school will be requested to undertake the project. The schools will then co-ordinate nomination and selection process of Year 10/11 students in October. Fund raising activities then may follow the selection process. The students will travel to Turkey, early April 2010 and return soon after the Anzac Day ceremonies at Gallipoli.

What To Do Now: If your Club is interested and have a partnering high school, please register your interest with the Youth Exchange Committee Chairman, at your earliest convenience and no later than 30 September 2009. The selected clubs will be advised by 7th of October with further details of how to progress.

Writing For The Web

The typical online reader:

- is educated
- speaks English to a high standard
- views text online
- is skilled in searching online databases
- is conditioned to expect quick results
- is under pressure to find information.

Reading online

Readers behave differently when viewing information on-screen. They:

- scan text, they do not read it
- skip paragraphs if the first few words do not interest them
- dislike scrolling
- become tired quickly
- read 25% slower than reading from paper.

There is no assumed knowledge. There is no guarantee that the reader has seen the preceding pages, particularly if they located the page using a search engine or link.

Writing for online readers

Before commencing any type of publishing (on-screen or hard copy), ask the following questions:

- Who is the audience?
- Why will they read this document?
- How will they use this document?
- Will this document require updates?





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Answers to these questions will help with the structure and design of the document.

Structure

Always place key information first. This is true for sections, paragraphs and sentences. Use navigation tools such as menus or bookmarks to remove background information from the main text and link to it instead. Enhance clarity and scanning by:

- Reducing the number of words usually used in printed documents
- Using shorter words
- Avoiding repetition
- Using lists
- ✓ Breaking text into manageable chunks
 ✓ Limiting paragraphs to one idea
 ✓ Stating conclusions first

- Creating meaningful headings
- Highlighting important information
- Using diagrams and tables instead of text.

Say all you have to say in the fewest possible words, or your reader will be sure to skip them; and in the plainest possible words or he will certainly misunderstand them. John Ruskin 1819-1900

Language

Write in straightforward, simple English. Use the active voice (eg. 'Managers must read this.') rather than the passive voice (eg. 'This must be read by managers.'). It follows that many other writing styles ('academic', 'managerial', etc.) may confuse readers and obscure meaning. The choice and arrangement of words should be made to write clearly, concisely and correctly. This approach should leave the text with a tone best described as 'Positive + Professional'...

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

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


2009 AUSTRALIAN TOUR - ST. PETERS QUARTET

Training Our Leaders of the Future

We often talk in our Rotary clubs of succession planning and who, when and how to chose the next group of Rotarians to lead us into the future. Obviously we look for leadership skills and the ability to successfully manage and lead our clubs in each new Rotary year. However, I believe having leadership skills does not alone assure good Rotary leadership. An effective Rotary leader must also have Rotary knowledge, perspective about where Rotary has been, where it is now going and a vision of what Rotary can be.

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The once difficult task of finding suitable candidates is no longer the case, as we now have the Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI) in our District. The RLI program is a relatively new program, introduced by PDG Jim Studebaker in August last year. 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Marketing Tips

Nothing Attracts New Members Like New Members: Promote Your New Recruits

Ever heard the saying "nothing draws a crowd like a crowd itself"?

Promoting your Club's recruitment of new members is a fantastic way of attracting further new members – it demonstrates first hand the link between "I'd like to help the community in some way" and "I'd like to help the community in some way, so I joined

Rotary". It allows prospective members to see that Rotary members don't belong to a secret society, but indeed are people just like them with similar ideals.



The messages that new members impart have the added advantage of:

- Enabling others to picture themselves in the same shoes as the new recruit
- Being fresh and relevant
- Dispelling myths that might otherwise be a disincentive to join
- Showing why Rotary is a great vehicle for following passions that many people harbour
- Providing potential reasons to join
- Showing that there ARE new people and ideas in Rotary

Get the message out there!

By now we know all about the WIIFM principle, we know the audience we're trying to reach, we know the message we're trying to impart, we've got a good story, and we've even got a great front person (the new recruit) who can provide legitimate expert testimony on the worth of joining Rotary. The only thing left to do is make sure you convey all this in a way that piques the interest of others. Tell the world you have a new member and how mutually beneficial the arrangement will be!



A press release needn't be boring.

Think of what you would want to read and what you wouldn't if you were a member of the audience you were targeting. Even more so, think as if you were an editor of a local newspaper and were confronted by a 4-page press release that rambled on and on. Chances are you might put it aside.

Just like a good novel, a good press release should:

- Tell a good story, not just recall events dryly
- Contain the pertinent facts, dates, people involved etc
- Develop a sense of the characters involved rather than just share their biography who are they?
- Give some insight into the motivations of the central character
- Involve the reader help put them in the central character's shoes
- Provide neat transitions that tie the story together where possible
- Alternate between describing situations and referring to direct quotes
- Challenge the reader by exploring a twist or misconception, making them think
- Leave the reader with a taste for more
- Strike with big news early, and elaborate as the story goes on a creative headline or great picture / caption to cover the story will win you attention so be creative!

Just Do It!

Give it a go! Put it out there. Write it up and send it on – the biggest barrier to press coverage for Rotary Clubs is often lack of attempt to gain press coverage.

In the members section on the District 9800 website you will find a simple Microsoft Excel resource to help you generate a good story for a press release when you have new members join your club. The text will tell the story of WHY they got involved – the very story likely to interest and subsequently influence others.



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But the most important parts are up to you:

- DO add a high quality picture (if possible with some novelty or humour to it!)
- <u>DO</u> add a caption describing the picture and who is in it!
- DO add excitement, novelty, passion or intrigue to the story!
- DO link the story with a basic message of "hey, you can join us too and here's how!"
- DO feel free to contact District Marketing & Club Service for help or advice!
- DO send it in!
- DO follow up with editors (without hounding them!)



Clem Renouf AM – Sixty Years of Service to Rotary





September is New Generations Month

How is Your Public Speaking?

Speaking in public is still regarded as one of our top 10 fears in life. That is not surprising, because many who try, get it so awfully wrong. When you look back over your club meetings, assemblies, conferences and over the various presentations you have attended in Rotary, ask yourself what made those presentations successful. I suspect the answer will be that the quality of the presentation was just as important as the subject matter presented. The success of meetings, functions and events, particularly in Rotary, can often be put down to the speaker and his/ her presentation.

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If this is so, why then is there so little attention paid Effective Public Speaking? How often when leaving a Rotary meeting have you said "that was great" or maybe even "that was a fantastic presentation"? Or maybe you came away thinking "what was that all about?", or "I got nothing from that!" Perhaps the main reason was that although the speaker had a good message, his/her delivery was very poor.

Public speaking is the process of speaking to a group of people in a structured, deliberate manner intended to inform, influence, or entertain the listeners. The purpose of public speaking can range from simply transmitting information, to motivating people to act, or to simply telling a story. In our District we now have a solution to poor public speaking in Rotary. The members of the Rotary Club of Brimbank-Central, lead by David Moss-Bennett an expert in the field of Effective Public Speaking, have put together a one day program focussing on the areas of most interest to Rotarians and the running of Club Meetings.

Participants will learn about the fundamentals of effective public speaking and be able to:

- * prepare for and make 'short' speeches of up to three minutes
- * prepare for and make 'long' speeches of around five-six minutes
- * chair club meetings and make short reports to the Club and or Board as required

The programs will be conducted over one day starting at around 8.45am and concluding at approximately 4.15pm. Cost is around \$25, depending on venue and catering requirements.

Participants are provided with a reference manual containing notes about effective Public Speaking, plus a number of speech planning tools. A certificate of attendance will also be provided.

Create maintain, enhance and protect your club's brand!

Rotary's (and your Club's) brand is the way the outside world perceives what Rotary does, so it is imperative to create the right impression. After all, promoting yourself in the right light will lead to a positive image, create interest, entice new members, generate goodwill, and even bring financial support.





7 Rules of Effective Brand Management

- Always be noticed because if you aren't, who will know you exist?
- **Excite your audience (potential members and supporters) and engage them**... they deserve to be enthused and motivated by your club's message.
- **3. Challenge the status quo.** All Clubs, no matter how accomplished, should think like 'challengers' who are looking to achieve their next major goal, and constantly seeking to do things better.
- **Watch your brand's progress**. A brand is never still its position in the public's consciousness changes constantly.
- **5. Be aware that the influences on a brand are sometimes beyond your control.** You need to revise your brand strategy and tactics constantly, or risk losing sight of your intended direction.
- 6. The whole Club must be aligned to both its own marketing messages as well as those of Rotary International. The passion for alignment starts at the very top of the Club, with the Club President.
- 7. Great brand management has a major influence on how the world views you it can even influence change in the world. It increases (and retains) membership, grows financial support, provides channels for action within the community and provides the resources to make a real difference on issues locally and internationally. You and your Club members should aim for nothing less!







I am extremely pleased to advise that *ShelterBox* already have a small response team in the affected areas. We also have members of our district with relatives in the area, so we hope to receive plenty of information on how best our District can provide some much needed support.

So for this week's message, could I ask everyone to please consider those affected by these disasters. Please give your support when called on, because their **Future May be in Your Hands**.

ShelterBox Response

On Saturday, Tropical storm Ondoy (Ketsana, international name) brought a month's worth of rainfall to metro Manila and nearby regions in just one hour. The UN is reporting a death toll of 240 and rising and the number of displaced survivors is said to be 375,000. It total, it is reported that 1.87 million people have been affected.

ShelterBox Australia received three separate requests for assistance from Rotary Clubs in Manila. Australian ShelterBox Response Team (SRT) member and Rotarian Peter Pearce packed his bags for the second time in six weeks to travel to Manilla to assess the need and viability. Joining Peter will be UK SRT Lizzy Treglown who worked with Peter in the last deployment – between them they have all the local



Rotary and government contacts to best understand the infrastructure which will allow them to deliver aid quickly and most effectively.

It was only weeks ago that ShelterBox provided 334 ShelterBoxes to those affected by Typhoon Morakot but now they have been left reeling yet again from another catastrophic tropical storm.

The worst may not be over for the Philippines with weather experts warning another storm or typhoon could hit the region in the next couple of days. Overwhelmed Philippine authorities have appealed for international aid as the death toll from the once-in-a lifetime floods soar and weary survivors shelter in squalid conditions.




But how can we get them out to a new audience?
