Looking back to welcome in a new Rotary Year

2016-17 was a huge year for The Rotary Foundation, a year in which we celebrated the centennial of our Foundation.

Coming off The Foundation Centennial year, which was capped with our memorable Foundation dinner function 31 May, we knew that we would still be looking back perhaps more than we were looking ahead so the challenge was to keep the momentum going. An additional challenge was the lower amount of District Designated Funds (DDF) that was available as a consequence of lower club and personal contributions three years earlier.

Nevertheless it was a very positive year for Foundation related activities in D9800. Within the funding available we completed slightly fewer District grants but they were stronger and of higher impact. A new schools' scholarship program was very popular and effective.

Five significant Global Grants were approved as well as two Global Grant Scholarships.

D9800 returned to its status as a PeaceBuilder District with a DDF contribution of US\$25,000 to the Rotary Peace program. Importantly, our "Black Caviar" status was retained with 4 successful nominations to the Peace and Conflict Resolution program.

As a District we contributed US\$38,000 to the PolioPlus program from our DDF as part of a challenge program with clubs for a total of US\$79,000. We plan to extend the challenge program again this year.—read all about it on page 7. Annual giving was below that of the Centennial year but more than 18% above the period 3 years prior and more than 21% ahead on a per capita basis. and new major donors.

The year ahead will see a lot more effort to "fight polio to the finish". DG Bronwyn has her Smartie Campaign, there will be our annual Foundation movie, and the opportunity for clubs to support *Prance in the Park* (see inside for more details). It would be great if clubs could also support World Polio Day on 24 October and consider ways of helping the fight.

November is Foundation Month and clubs are encouraged to provide focus and support for OUR Foundation.

- Encourage support for the annual Central Melbourne Paul Harris Foundation Breakfast (28 November 2018) and Goldfields Cluster's Foundation Dinner on 29 November 2018.
- To promote and encourage Rotarians to become Benefactors or Bequest Society members.
- Encourage and assist all clubs to complete their Foundation Goals at MyRotary on www.rotary.org

World Convention Toronto 2018: reflections from a convention goer.

Toronto is a wonderful city with lots of tall buildings, culture and sport. It hosts plenty of conventions. RI President 2017-2018, Australia's own Ian Riseley, held his in Toronto late in June with warm balmy days and long evenings.

The opening ceremony, held at the Air Canada Centre (home of the Maple Leafs), began colourfully with many attendees waving their country flags against a noisy background of music. That was until the music changed to "I am, you are, we are Australian" introducing Ian and Juliet Riseley. At the first bars, the Aussies scattered amongst the 12,550 attending the first opening session (total registration was just over 25,000) all burst into song – very emotional. At least 30 of us added to the colour of the occasion in our End Polio Tees – we were definitely seen and heard.

In his opening address Ian spoke to the theme *People of Action* and announced that his wish that every Rotarian plant a tree had exceeded all expectations with approx 2,500,000 planted around the world.

The first official social function I attended was the "Jazz at the Aquarium" and amid 2,500 excited Rotarians from all over, we queued to get in, queued to get a drink, and waited and wondered if we would get the food. However when the crush eased it was an amazing venue with attendees enjoying the exhibits of fish and other marine creatures including our PDG Murray Verso.

The 80 or so of us from District 9800 had a great time together as well as meeting other Rotary friends from all around the world. A highlight was the Down-under Breakfast held just before the first opening ceremony where approx. 600 Australians and New Zealanders heard RI President Ian and Juliet in a relaxed and comfortable setting recount some of his memories of the past year.

During the four-day event, speakers praised, prodded, and partnered with Rotary in featuring RI's *Six Areas of Focus*. Dr. Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, Director-General, WHO thanked Rotary for partnering in the work to improve the health conditions of so many in the world in its indefactible fight against polio. Former first lady of the United States, Laura Bush, challenged Rotarians to keep making early childhood education a priority. Helen Clark, former prime minister of New Zealand and one of the architects of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, joined RI President Ian in a discussion about gender equality and the crucial link between the

environment, poverty, hunger, and peace.

However, the many stand-out presenters were those who had made a difference in the world either through their work as Peace fellows such as Marie-Paule Attema who is studying at the Rotary Peace Centre in Queensland or instigators of projects benefiting others, be it in literacy, hygiene, water and sanitation (Jeremy Hurst), PDG, District 7020, and chair of HANWASH initiated a series of Global Grants to implement the latest water filter technology in Haiti, one of the poorest nations on earth. Or Ann Gloag, whose Freedom From Fistula Foundation establishes clinics to ensure women's safety during childbirth in some of the remotest parts of Africa. Chief R. Stacey Laforme, a leader of a local First Nations People, protect the financial and cultural identities of First Nations people in the Toronto region.

Our Foundation's significant achieves over the past Rotary year were eloqently presented by outgoing Chair of the foundation trustees, Paul Netzel.

Canadian Prime Minister, Justin Trudeau, attended to accept Rotary's Polio Eradication Champion Award. He thanked Rotary for working with governments worldwide to eradicate polio. "Rotarians play a critical role in the fight to end polio, Trudeau said, "Together we will make that happen."

RI President Elect Barry Rassin announced that next year's Convention will be in Hamburg, Germany. This was my sixth RI World Convention and I would recommend that if you can, you attend one at least one – it is a great way to understand the true international meaning of Rotary International.

End Polio *Prance in the Park* event November 17th, 2018

If your Club is looking for an event to get involved in around World Polio Day on 24th October, here it is and we need Club Foundation Chairs (and Cluster Ambassadors) to tell clubs about it, get another 17 Clubs signed on and drive it to a \$100,000 or more conclusion!

District 9800 End Polio Now Ambassador Susie Cole and Club presidents Amritpal Singh (Southbank) & Kitty O'Connor (Laverton/Point Cook) are organising this major fundraiser for End Polio Now and they need 20 Rotary Clubs to send 5 walkers/prancers to participate in the inaugural End Polio Prance in the Park, featuring punks, princes and princesses! at Albert Park Lake on Saturday 17th November.

This year only 100 walkers can participate as more than that will require Parks Victoria permits, more complicated infrastructure and time to plan, but if this year is a success it will grow to a major event in 2019 & beyond.



















Polio Update

In District 9800 we have made a commitment to really do our bit to finally rid the world of this scourge. We have our own theme (D9800—Fighting Polio to the Finish) and the red polio shirts resplendent with our theme have become something of the uniform for the District support team.

At an international level Rotary International has dug deep to achieve that goal as reported recently.

"The fact that no new cases of wild poliovirus have been detected in Nigeria points to the improved surveillance and rapid response protocols Rotary and its Global Polio Eradication Initiative partners have established, particularly in insecure and inaccessible areas," said Michael K. McGovern, chair of Rotary's International PolioPlus Committee. "While this progress is promising, it's time to redouble our efforts so we can continue to maintain the political and financial support necessary to end polio for good."

While significant strides have been made against the paralysing disease, wild poliovirus is still a threat in parts of the world, with 10 cases in Afghanistan and three cases in Pakistan this year so far. As long as a single child has polio, all children are at risk, which underscores the need for ongoing funding and political commitment to eradication.

To support polio eradication efforts in countries where polio remains endemic, Rotary is allocating the majority of the funds it announced to Afghanistan (\$22.9 million), Pakistan (\$21.7 million), and Nigeria (\$16.1 million).

Further funding will support efforts to keep 12 vulnerable African countries polio-free:

Cameroon (\$98,600)

Central African Republic (\$394,400)

Chad (\$1.71 million)

Democratic Republic of the Congo

(\$10.4 million)

Guinea (\$527,300)

Madagascar (\$690,000)

Mali (\$923,200)

Niger (\$85,300)

Sierra Leone (\$245,300)

Somalia (\$776,200)

South Sudan (\$3.5 million)

Sudan (\$2.6 million)

Africa will also see \$5.8 million in funding for surveillance activities and \$467,800 for technical assistance. Additional funding will go to Bangladesh (\$504,200), Indonesia (\$157,800), Myanmar (\$197,200), and Nepal (\$160,500), with an additional \$96,300 funding surveillance in Southeast Asia. The remainder of the funding (\$6.6 million) will go to the World Health Organization (WHO) for research activities.

Rotary has committed to raising \$50 million a year to be matched 2-to-1 by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, yielding \$450m for polio eradication activities over a threeyear period. To date, Rotary has contributed more than \$1.8 billion to fight the disease, including matching funds from the Gates Foundation, and countless volunteer hours since launching PolioPlus, in 1985. In 1988, Rotary became a core partner in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative with the WHO, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The Gates Foundation later joined. Since the initiative launched, the incidence of polio has plummeted by more than 99.9 percent, from about 350,000 cases in 1988 to 22 confirmed in 2017 AND 14 to date in 2018.

The annual movie night arranged through Rotary Australia will be on or near November 1, 2018 and we will be looking to arrange several showings. Net receipts will be matched one for one.




Purchase a District tie or scarf and net proceeds will be matched one for one.

26th Rotary Foundation Paul Harris Breakfast

Air Chief Marshal Sir Angus Houston

AK, AFC (Ret'd)

Sir Angus Houston AK, AFC (Ret'd) was awarded the Knight of the Order of Australia in January 2015 for extraordinary and pre-eminent achievement and merit in service to Australia, through distinguished service in the Australian Defence Force, continued commitment to serve

the nation in leadership roles and in a variety of roles in the community.

In July 2011, Sir Angus retired as Chief of the Australian Defence Force after 41 years of service in the military. In 2011, he was named the Australian Father of the Year and in 2012, the ACT Australian of the Year.

Sir Angus serves on numerous public roles including as Chancellor for the University of the Sunshine Coast, and Victorian Police Corporate Advisory Group. He is a Board Member of the Lowy Institute for International Policy, the Australian Cancer Research Foundation, the Anzac Centenary Public Fund Board and the Victorian Police Executive Command.

He is the Ambassador/Patron of numerous charitable organisations, including Bravery Trust, the Australian American Association Canberra Chapter, Griffith University's Glycomics Childhood Leukaemia Project, Shelterbox Australia, Tropical Brain and Mind Research Foundation and the Centenary of Anzac Centre.

In July 2014, Sir Angus was appointed as the Prime Minister's Special Envoy to lead Australia's efforts to help recover, identify and repatriate Australians killed in the Malaysia Airlines flight MH17 disaster. He also led the Joint Agency Coordination Centre coordinating the Australian Government's support for the search into missing Malaysia Airlines flight MH370 in 2014.

In 2012 Sir Angus led the Expert Panel on Asylum Seekers. Sir Angus was Chair of the Anzac Centenary Advisory Board from July 2011 until March 2014. The Board provided strategic advice to the Australian Government in relation to the planning and implementation of the Anzac Centenary 2014-2018.
