### **Bendigo to Assist in Rebuilding Samoa**

The Rotary Club of Bendigo has a long association with the island nation of Samoa and, as result, is determined to play a pivotal role in that country's recovery from the devastating impacts of the tsunami that hit on the 29<sup>th</sup> September.

The relationship of the club and its members with Samoa and its people is both long standing and warm. In 1992 Samoa was ravaged by cyclones and, in response to a request for assistance, a number of Bendigo Rotarians were members of

the volunteer teams that responded. The products of these events included not only significant material assistance but also a recognition of the need for further help and, perhaps most importantly, an enduring love and respect of Samoa and its people. Since that time, a number of teams of volunteers from Bendigo have travelled to Samoa to provide water tanks and sanitation facilities plus much needed maintenance of educational facilities in a number of remote Samoan villages.

Without exception, the volunteers, which have included Rotarians, the family and friends of Rotarians and apprentices, have fallen in love with Samoa and its people and it is those people that require assistance at this time.

Those with a connection to Samoa are deeply saddened by the recent events. They also understand that while the current disaster relief efforts have been effective in providing temporary relief, the requirement for assistance continues. Once everybody is safe and secure and people have had sufficient time to mourn their losses, the task of rebuilding will commence.

The Rotary Club of Bendigo, the Rotary Club of Apia and the aid recipients, will work together to identify appropriate projects. It is expected that up to 20 teams of volunteers will be required over the next 2 to 3 years with each volunteer giving time, money and their heart to the task.



### ShelterBox Update

6<sup>th</sup> October, 2009: Over this past week, ShelterBox has distributed more than \$1.2 million of emergency shelter to our disaster struck Pacific neighbours who have endured earthquakes, tsunamis and flooding. Add this to a previous month where ShelterBox responded to earthquakes and typhoons in Indonesia and the Philippines; massive flooding in West Bengal; a typhoon in China; hurricane in Mexico; and flash flooding in Niger. Overwhelmed Philippine authorities have appealed for international aid as the death toll from the once-in-a lifetime floods soar and weary survivors shelter in squalid conditions.



In total, over the past five weeks, ShelterBox with the assistance of our fully trained ShelterBox Response Team members, Rotarians and their Clubs have assisted with the distribution of more than \$2.6 million in emergency shelter to those most in need.

Team members Keith Robins, Hans Van Dyk, Gary Bidner, Mike Greenslade and Peter Pearce have all volunteered their time and expertise over the past six weeks to assist those who have lost everything.

ShelterBox Founder and CEO, Tom Henderson, said: "This has been one of ShelterBox's most challenging set of deployments to date and we are urgently appealing for donations to enable us to alleviate the suffering of hundreds of thousands of people across the globe that have just lost everything in the last week. We're working flat out to ensure our aid is delivered to people as quickly as possible and, rest assured, we won't stop until the job is done."

Facebook and Twitter are great marketing tools, they are easy to use and enable your club to reach a huge audience.




Facebook and Twitter are a great way to share your club's goals and achievements with the world and highlights to potential members the good that Rotary does both locally and internationally.

### The AQUABOX Story

Aquabox literally began over a cup of coffee!

In 1990 members of the Rotary Club of Wirksworth, UK were discussing a better way of providing emergency aid to disaster areas. The idea was to combine a robust box with water purification equipment and other emergency supplies and so Aquabox was born. It was officially launched in October 1992 by His Grace the Duke of Devonshire at Chatsworth House UK and is an official project of Rotary International in Great Britain and Ireland, managed by its initiators.

Each Aquabox contains sufficient water purification equipment to supply a family with clean water for about 4 months, in addition to humanitarian aid in the form of eating and drinking equipment, water containers, tools, blankets and other basic equipment.

Since 1992 over 85,000 Aquaboxes have been distributed to disaster areas around the world, providing in excess of 417,000,000 litres of clean drinking water.

Aquabox (Australia) began through the Rotary Club of Eltham, Australia in 2001 and since that time boxes have been distributed from Australia to disasters in Nepal, Iraq, Cambodia, East Timor, PNG, Niue, Chad, Bangladesh, Colombo and Sri Lanka.

In February 2009 AQUABOXES were distributed, for the first time within Australia, to victims of the Victoria bushfire disaster. Aquabox (Australia) have revamped the contents of Aquabox Gold to suit conditions in the Region and are focussed on distributing these and the Aquabox 30.



### World Polio Day is 24th October.

- Polio (poliomyelitis) is a crippling and potentially fatal infectious disease, which still strikes children mainly under the age of five in countries in Asia, Africa, and the Middle East.
- Polio can cause paralysis and sometimes death. There is no cure for polio, the best protection is prevention. For US\$0.60 worth of vaccine, a child can be protected against this crippling disease for life.
- It can cause paralysis within hours, and polio paralysis is almost always irreversible.
- In the most severe cases, polio attacks the motor neurons of the brain stem, causing breathing difficulty or even death.
- Historically, polio has been the world's greatest cause of disability.

Before eradication efforts began, polio paralyzed more than 1,000 children a day, totalling about 350,000 children annually. The incidence of polio has since declined by more than 99 percent.

Rotary International is the spearheading member of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative and is the largest private sector donor. It has contributed more than US\$600 million to the polio eradication activities in 122 countries.

Tens of thousands of Rotarians have partnered with their national ministries of health, UNICEF, the World Health Organisation, the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, the U.S. Centres for Disease Control and Prevention, and with health providers at the grassroots level in thousands of communities.





Compare these two pictures: The Iron Lung ward at Rancho Los Amigos Hospital, Downey, California, ca.1953, and a baby in Nigeria today, who will never experience the disease.





Since 1985, eradicating polio worldwide has



### **Rotarians Respond to Asia-Pacific Disasters**

Rotarians are ramping up aid to victims left homeless by a series of disasters that struck areas in Southeast Asia and the South Pacific.

A devastating tsunami that hit American Samoa, Samoa, and Tonga; earthquakes in Indonesia; two typhoons in the Philippines; and flooding in India have left thousands dead and millions displaced.

Rotary clubs from districts in Australia and New Zealand are leading efforts to bring emergency response kits to victims of the 29 September tsunami that wiped out several villages in American Samoa and Samoa. Rotarians are focusing on distributing relief goods, including food, water, medicine, clothing, and shelter.

"I'm amazed at how fast the support came," said Leanne Jaggs. Governor of District 9920, which covers several islands in the South Pacific. "I am proud to be a Rotarian right now because of the way everyone comes together when needed."



### Canterbury RC Promotes Rotary on the Air

The Rotary and Community Service radio show is a product of the Rotary Club of Canterbury, Victoria, and has aired on Whitehorse Boroondara Community Radio, serving Melbourne's eastern suburbs, since 2006. The two-hour music and talk program, produced by club president Brian Bloomer, includes an interview each week with Rotarians about their service projects, how they improve people's lives, and how the public can get involved.

Bloomer served as the sole interviewer for the talk segment until earlier this year, when he became president of the Canterbury club. Now he shares the task with fellow club members David Proud and Neil Williams and Rotaractor Andy Reed, who each present one show per month.

Bloomer says he loves talking with Rotarians and members of the Rotary family who are passionate about their service. "Some of the best have been Group Study Exchange interviews -- teams coming to Australia and Aussie teams returning from their trip."



Another of Bloomer's favourite subjects is his club's regular medical trips to the Philippines. In 2007, the club sponsored three university students who helped screen patients for vision and hearing problems. Bloomer interviewed club members about the project and chatted with the students in an episode available in the show's archives.

He freely admits that he is not a radio professional. Before taking to the airwaves, Bloomer took courses offered by Australia's national broadcasting association. He also filled in several times on other radio programs before approaching the station about creating his own show.

Bloomer prepares well in advance of each broadcast, developing a written script and scheduling topics far enough ahead of time so guests will be ready to give a good interview. He says he keeps the show interesting by asking his subjects open-ended questions and selecting music that will appeal to his audience.







### **Child Mortality Drops Worldwide**

Improved anti-malaria measures and simple health practices have contributed to the decline of child deaths worldwide. according to a report released by UNICEF in September. The study showed that an estimated 8.8 million children under five died in 2008 compared with 12.5 million in 1990, a drop of 28 percent and the lowest since record keeping began in 1960.

"These new figures underscore the importance of the work that Rotary does," said 2008-09 RI President Dong Kurn Lee, who chose to focus on child mortality during his term. "The great majority of child deaths are preventable, and most of them can be prevented with relatively inexpensive interventions -something as simple as a water filter, antibiotics, or a trained birth attendant."



The UNICEF report attributed the drop in child mortality largely to health interventions such as immunizations, vitamin A supplements, improved prevention of mother-to-child HIV/AIDS transmission, and the use of anti-malaria mosquito

Although all regions of the world have made progress, millions of children still die each year, with 40 percent of those deaths occurring in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, India, and Nigeria, according to the report.

Lee's emphasis on reducing child mortality inspired clubs and districts to initiate new projects and come together for two international conferences devoted to the issue.

In 2008, more than half of all World Community Service health projects focused on reducing child mortality, involving medical clinics, health care training, and nutrition, according to Rotary International's ProjectLINK database.



### Rotary, Poverty and Population

### International Day for the Eradication of Poverty, 17 October

Humanity has reached a crisis point with respect to the interlocking issues of overpopulation, unsustainable development and human suffering.

With Rotary International's rich, religious, ethnic, and cultural background and with membership in over 160 countries, Rotary is the ideal organization to face this challenge to humanity.

In 1999, The Board of Directors of Rotary International published the Statement on Population Growth and Development. A key phrase reads: "Sustainable development, preservation of the environment, and the quality of life for all people, especially the new generations, is impacted by population growth."



The World Bank states that 2.8 billion people live in poverty, on less than US \$2 per day. 800 million people suffer from hunger and malnutrition. More than 1.5 billion people do not have adequate safe water and proper sanitation.

Preventing unwanted births, and guaranteeing individuals and couples the right to reproductive health, can help slow population growth rates and moderate environmental impact.

In 56 developing countries, the poorest women still average six births, compared to 3.2 for the wealthiest.

"Family planning could bring more benefits to more people at less cost than any other single technology now available to the human race." - UNICEF Annual Report 1992).

Rotary is now addressing these and other tragedies related to overpopulation and unsustainable development. In recent years, over 100 Matching Grants and larger 3-H projects have been completed that address this challenge.



### **POLIOPLUS PROGRESS**

#### POLIOPLUS PROGRESS (October 2009) IN FOUR ENDEMIC COUNTRIES

Over the last 20-plus years, Rotary has made tremendous progress toward its goal of eradicating polio, and the number of cases has been reduced to fewer than 2000 in 2008. And while the polio virus is stubborn, and difficult challenges lay ahead, the story behind the numbers offers us a hopeful view. Never in the history of our initiative have we witnessed such high levels of both scientific innovation and political engagement in the effort.



The development of a new bivalent vaccine offers a promising tool for simultaneously targeting the two remaining strains of the virus. Political leaders like U.S. President Barack Obama have championed the cause in recent addresses, and business and charitable organizations like Google and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation have committed significant financial resources to the effort. Progress is also being made at the country level. Here are some highlights of successes in the endemic countries:

Afghanistan: The main challenge to polio eradication in Afghanistan remains security issues that limit access to children in high risk areas of the country. General Stanley A. McChrystal, US Army Commander in Afghanistan has committed to helping address security concerns in areas where vaccinations are occurring. A nationwide campaign was conducted to promote International Peace Day (20 Sep 09) during the most recent polio immunization activities, and this helped vaccinators reach more than 880,000 children, the highest number on record. The Rotary Foundation is aiding in these security efforts by funding temporary shelters on the border between Afghanistan and Pakistan to provide a safe environment where vaccinators can effectively conduct immunizations.

Pakistan: International PolioPlus Committee Chair Robert Scott traveled to Pakistan in August 2009 to confer Rotary's Polio Eradication Champion Award on President Asif Zardari, who recently affirmed his commitment to the cause of polio eradication. Zardari also appointed his youngest daughter, Assefa Bhutto Zardari, as the Ambassador for Polio Eradication. Assefa is Zardari's daughter with former Prime Minister Benazir Bhutto, and she was the first child vaccinated by her mother during the launch of the country's immunization campaigns in 1994. A stamp has been issued to commemorate the appointment.

India: The number of polio cases in India is down, and they have successfully eliminated all but 1 genetic lineage of the type 1 polio virus, the most dangerous and paralytic strain of the virus. The Indian government recently renewed it commitment to wiping out the disease by pledging \$650 million in domestic funding to the cause over the next 3 years. The new bivalent vaccine holds promise as a tool for addressing persistent outbreaks in the last infected areas of India.

Nigeria: Because of unprecedented support from key political and religious leaders, Nigeria is gaining momentum in its fight against the polio virus. The country has seen a significant drop in cases over the last year, with the current case count of 382 compared to a count of 692 at the same time last year. For the first time Kano, one of the high-risk northern states, is now vaccinating more than 85% of its children. Nigeria has even experienced two non-consecutive weeks in which no polio cases were reported.

"We have come a long way," said Glenn E. Estess, Sr., Trustee Chair of The Rotary Foundation. "We have reduced the number of polio cases by over 99 percent. But we can't let up now. The remaining one percent is proving to be the most challenging, since the poliovirus persists in the most intractable parts of the world. We have the tools to eradicate this devastating disease. 
