### **Camp Getaway Progress**

Great progress is being made on the completion of the second 28 bed dormitory at Rotary Camp Getaway, at Axedale.

These photos show work being coordinated by Peter Kennedy from the Rotary Club of Bendigo Strathdale club, supervising workers arranged by Harold Simpson from the Rotary Club of Keilor. Assistance with electrical work is also being provided by PDG Des Hosking in partnership with President Daryl Rowe of the Rotary Club of Kangaroo Flat, assisted by club members.



Well done to all concerned for getting the project back on track.

Many working bees have been held to upgrade the camp including, kitchen, dining room and hall. D9800 Rotary clubs have also contributed to the significant landscaping plantings around the new buildings.

A major component of the redevelopment is the upgrade of essential services to ensure the highest level of quality accreditation for a camp of this type. This involves upgrade of fresh water, sewerage and electricity services, these items represent the major capital works costs of the project, most of which are buried underground.



Work continues today on a second modern dormitory, a project which should be completed late in 2008.

The unique feature of this project is the Rotary sponsorship and management of the project which will ensure that the camp and its operations are self sufficient, but more importantly, that children and individuals suffering disadvantage may have their costs supported by Rotary to enable them to participate in the unique bush experiences of Rotary Camp Getaway. Rotarian's commitment to community building experiences for youth will ensure that the particular experiences available in the unique riverside environment of Rotary Camp Getaway will have a positive impact on all participants.

### Seeing Rotary's Future With 20/20 Vision

20/20. Once something tested by ophthalmologists, these days the term is synonymous with our strive for success as a nation – whether that be in reference to our triumphs in abbreviated cricket matches or the upcoming summit on our nation's future we'll leave up to you.

But when it comes to the future and success of Rotary what are our collective visions? Where do we want to see Rotary in 20 years time? What are the best and brightest 'big' ideas that we need to start planning around for the future?

Prime Minister Kevin Rudd made a noteworthy statement recently in regard to the nation's future - "I don't want to be Prime Minister of a country where we simply drift".

In Rotary terms, while certainly not denigrating or disparaging our previous and present efforts and successes, we too should not be content to just 'drift'. Rotary is a fantastic vehicle for doing good in the community, but faces pressure from a myriad of organisations in demanding the public's attention, charity, participation and goodwill. We can't expect this pressure to subside either – it will likely intensify, and we must begin adapting now to meet the challenges of tomorrow.

#### **Rotary's Challenges**

As Rotarians we strive to make a difference. Without wanting to sound like Tom Cruise saving the world and uniting cultures, by virtue of being a Rotarian, we have chosen to act upon our desire to serve rather than just watch society in helplessness. Both Rotary and society face challenges now that require us to act, that require the minds of motivated Rotarians to make a difference and not just 'drift' along. With this weekend's President Elect Training providing a forum for our next leaders to set the course and start making dreams real, it's time to start looking to the future and take on the challenges that will confront us.

#### Membership

Rotary is a member based organisation. Simply put, the more members we have, the more good we are able to do. Rotary has an ageing membership base at the moment and without engaging the next generation and ensuring that Rotary is attractive to them to join, we will face a declining membership. Consequently this would mean a somewhat diminished potential for Rotary to make positive change in the world. Each District, each Club, each individual, needs to think about how they will attract the next generation – what will you do differently? When will you do it?

#### **Social Issues**

What are the social issues that will affect us all in the next 20 years? What planning and infrastructure is needed today to deal with them? Quite frequently in today's society we see social-cause bandwagons that many people are willing to jump on to. Some lead to change, some produce hot air. Regardless, in our favour is that people are willing to get on board good causes in their droves. By identifying tomorrow's needs and putting in place structures to actually deal with them (rather than just providing token empathy), Rotarians are in a prime position to lead change. What are the big social issues we'll face tomorrow? The environment? Shortages in aged care? Opportunities in indigenous communities? Drought relief? Rebuilding a sense of community spirit?

#### **Engaging Outside Support**

Trying to change the world on our own is not an easy task or something to which we should aspire. To do so would almost border on narcissm. Rather, engaging the support of the public, media, corporates, government and other organisations makes sense and enables us to effect change on a greater scale. Additionally, bigger projects attract

more media attention, they raise our profile positively, put our ideals and actions in front of a broader audience and make us more attractive to potential members who would like to be part of it. Rotary has a valuable commodity in the volunteer human resources, inspiration and leadership we provide – together with the commercial and financial resources which governments, corporates, media and the public provide we really can make dreams real. And let's not forget the resources available *within* Rotary – share your ideas and engage other Clubs, Districts, and interest groups within Rotary – you can bet there's someone out there who has a similar passion who can help share the load and grow the dream!

#### **Projects**

Like any business, RDU operates on a budget and over time it has to at least break even on its operations. Any profit stays in the RDU reserves. The Rotarian Life segment was introduced to broaden the magazine's appeal to both advertisers and Rotarians. Advertising revenue is an important part of

RDU's revenue stream and helps to keep our subscriptions as low as possible.

Quip Corner:

We may opt to receive the RI publication, 'The Rotarian', but you will see very few references to Australia. Taking that option diminishes the subscriber base for RDU, which directly reduces its income, and at the same time reduces its appeal to advertisers. Neither helps long term viability.

One very important note for incoming office bearers, particularly treasurers and cheque signatories - RDU and RI are NOT one and the same organisation, they are totally separate entities. The fact that they both have offices at Parramatta is admittedly confusing.

- Do not send your cheque for semi-annual dues to RDU, or a cheque for RDU subscriptions to RI.
- Do not add your invoices for semi-annual dues and RDU subscriptions and send one cheque to either party, then expect them to sort it out.
- A notification to RI of a new or terminated member does not flow through to RDU they have to be notified separately to start and stop subscriptions.

Finally, I ask you to share your RDU's around when you have finished with them. Our local library is happy to accept copies. They can be offered to anyone with a waiting room. Don't forget your Interact or Rotaract clubs.

Read your RDU every month and learn more about the great work Rotarians are doing. Then, with your improved Rotary knowledge, discuss Rotary's amazing array of service projects with all those people involved in your daily lives - family members, neighbours, work mates, social and sporting friends. Take pride in being a part of this extraordinary organization!

## Rotary Clubs Work In Community To Give People In Need 'Hand Up', Not 'Hand Out'

Community groups and service clubs can work together to change lives through the groups tapping into the skills, experience and connections of Rotary members, says a Brotherhood of St Laurence study of Rotary's Partnerships Advancing Community Engagement (PACE) projects.

The study, launched 15 April 2008 at the Brotherhood of St Laurence by Peter Batchelor, Victorian Minister for Community Development, evaluates four pilot projects in central Melbourne, Collingwood, Brunswick and southeastern bayside suburbs that match the 'people resources' of local Rotary clubs with neighbourhood initiatives that focus on long-term change.

The initiative aims to develop and evaluate the potential of Rotary members to address social exclusion and disadvantage. It is a partnership between Rotary District 9800 (which includes the City of Melbourne, surrounding suburbs and south eastern bayside suburbs), the Brotherhood and the Department of Community Planning and Development, which funded the study launched today.

Mr Batchelor said, "The study concludes that by becoming engaged in long-term local issues aimed at providing a 'hands up' rather than a 'hand out', Rotary clubs have shown their strengths in assisting other community organisations to help people build better lives. Rotary involvement with local communities shows that it is leading the way on turning social inclusion from an idea into a reality through practical steps forward."

Rotarian John Wigley, chair of the PACE Steering Committee said, "Rotary clubs are dedicated to enabling ordinary people to achieve extraordinary things, but have tended to deploy their members' considerable resources on fundraising and working bees. The PACE project opens new horizons by involving Rotarians in projects that drive change in the community and raise awareness among them of the issues confronting disadvantaged people. This is a model with potential for other organisations in linking community groups with the enthusiasm, expertise and networks of volunteer professional and business people. It's also a wonderful way of making good use of service members' talents."

Tony Nicholson, Brotherhood of St Laurence Executive Director said, "The Brotherhood was delighted to be involved in the PACE project. At its core is a concern by Rotary with helping disadvantaged people rebuild connections with society, which is the first step to begin the process of changing their lives for the better."

The report found that not only did the PACE projects benefit local communities by drawing on the dedication, talent and professional contacts of Rotary members, but they also helped to better 'embed' Rotary clubs in communities, creating new grassroots connections and potentially recruiting new members.

The involvement of Rotary clubs in the four projects was as follows:

- Rotary Club of Brighton's crucial assistance in putting the services of four smaller local community organisations on a firmer footing by amalgamating them to create the Bayside Community Information Support Service, and development of the Smart Kidz Education Support program, which assists local families who are finding it difficult to meet basic school expenses.
- Rotary Club of Brunswick's establishment of the inaugural Brunswick Youth Art Show at Brunswick Secondary College as a means of engaging with local young people, initially students at the school. Having their art exhibited boosted students' confidence and another early spin-off from the project was that a Rotarian who is a qualified accountant was invited to join the school's finance committee.
- Rotary Club of Collingwood's support for the Wellington Community Centre in Collingwood, including initial funding for refurbishment of the centre, housed in a church hall, and assisting with the centre's constitution and other legal and administrative matters. The centre has become a valuable community resource.
- The commitment to breaking the cycle of homelessness by the Rotary clubs of Melbourne and Southbank, through support for The Big Issue's Community Street Soccer Program and the associated 2008 Homeless World Cup, to be hosted in Melbourne in December.

#### "Science and the Challenge for the Future"

Nobel Prize winner, Professor Peter Doherty has been invited to speak at the second Yarra Cluster's Boroondara Paper to held **Friday, 23 May 2008** from 6:45am for 7:15am and winding up in good time to get to the office at 8:30am, at Leonda, 6 Wallen Road, Hawthorn.

Professor Peter Doherty shared the Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine in 1996 with Swiss colleague Rolf Zinkernagel, for their discovery of how the immune system recognises virus infected cells. He was Australian of the Year in 1997, and has since been commuting between St Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis and the Department of Microbiology and Immunology at the University of Melbourne. His research is mainly in the area of defence against viruses. He regularly devotes time to delivering public lectures, writing articles for newspapers and magazines and participating in radio discussions.

Peter Doherty graduated from the University of Queensland in Veterinary Science and became a veterinary officer. Moving to Scotland, he received his PhD from the University of Edinburgh Medical School. He is the first person with a veterinary qualification to win a Nobel Prize.

Peter is also the author of several books, including "A Light History of Hot Air" and "The Beginner's Guide to Winning the Nobel Prize".

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

### Are You Evergreen Or Deciduous?



Autumn is a time of change and readjustment and I believe there are parallels in nature that we can relate to human traits and personalities.

Over the last few weeks, as I drive around, I am impressed by the beauty of the deciduous trees in their autumn glory. They really stand out against the green of most of our evergreen trees. However, after a few weeks

of glory these trees look stark and ready for their 'hibernation' through the winter months.

During their 'post-autumnal glory' the trees appear lifeless - the body of the tree is still visible

but the spirit is elsewhere.

Evergreen trees, in contrast, appear unchanged from month to month. They do not hit the glorious heights of the deciduous trees, but neither do they plunge to the visual depths of the dormancy period. They certainly don't appear to be lifeless.

Mostly, evergreen trees continue to grow all year, spreading upwards and outwards. They are the quiet achievers of this world. With steadfast consistency, they adapt to the world around them ...hot or dry, wet and windy. The evergreens continue to make their mark on the landscape.

People can also mirror these two groups of trees.

Some people work in short bursts of extreme activity, seeming at times to be almost manic. These short bursts of energy can sometimes create ripples in a club or community as these people strive to reach the objective in the shortest possible time. Often this flurry of activity is accompanied by impatience. The 'short, sharp bursters' generally hate delays or any other impediment that prevents them from reaching finality in their stated task. Often too, they are bored with repetition and unless new challenges can be found for them they may lapse into periods of inactivity.

Dormant? Hibernating? Having ... 'a deciduous moment'? Whatever it is, the condition seems to yearn for a warmer, more inviting environment to stimulate another rush of unbridled enthusiasm.

Conversely, 'the evergreens' seem to work consistently on tasks given to them and when the task is completed they seek out new projects without fuss or fanfare. They are the stalwarts of an organisation.

It could be said that the stalwarts don't often come up with the brilliant 'outside the square', 'out of left field' ideas of the 'deciduous group'. However, inbuilt is the support base to take the inspiration to further development and a successful conclusion.

So (as I stand here amongst the scattered leaves) don't be too concerned as to whether you are evergreen or deciduous ...

We need both groups in large numbers in our Clubs if we are to continue grow, to be successful and deliver the very important "Service above Self".

Community groups and service clubs can work together to change lives through the groups tapping into the skills, experience and connections of Rotary members, says a Brotherhood of St Laurence study of Rotary's Partnerships Advancing Community Engagement (PACE) projects.

The study was launched on Tuesday, 15 April, at the Brotherhood of St Laurence by the Hon. Peter Batchelor, Victorian Minister for Community Development. It evaluated four pilot projects in central Melbourne, Collingwood, Brunswick and south-eastern bay-side suburbs that match the "people resources" of local Rotary clubs with neighbourhood initiatives that focus on long-term change.

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Community Planning and Development, which funded the study launched today.

Mr Batchelor said: "The study concludes that by becoming engaged in long-term local issues aimed at providing a 'hands up' rather than a 'hand out', Rotary clubs have shown their strengths in assisting other community organisations to help people build better lives.

"Rotary involvement with local communities shows that it is leading the way on turning social inclusion from an idea into a reality through practical steps forward. Rotarian John Wigley, chair of the PACE Steering Committee, said: "Rotary clubs are dedicated to enabling ordinary people to achieve extraordinary things, but have tended to deploy their members' considerable resources on fundraising and working bees. "The PACE project opens new horizons by involving Rotarians in projects that drive change in the community and raise awareness among them of the issues confronting disadvantaged people. This is a model with potential for other organisations in linking community groups with the enthusiasm, expertise and networks of volunteer professional and business people. It's also a wonderful way of making good use of service members' talents."

### **ORO Province PNG... A Logistical SRT Nightmare**

As news of the loss of many lives and the extensive damage caused by Cyclone Guba reached Australia in late November, ShelterBox moved to ship 224 boxes from its store with DHL in Melbourne. They were unable, frustratingly, to obtain air transport so the consignment was sent by sea to Port Moresby for on forwarding to the remote Popondetta region of Oro Province (in the vicinity of the Kokoda track). Working with Rotarians in Port Moresby and the Anglican Church (the major NGO in that remote area), SRT members Gary Bidner (Ipswich), Peter Clouting a Rotaractor from NSW and Olly Payne from the UK began making arrangements for the long tortuous by sea journey from Moresby to the province.

Early reports told of the extensive damage to infrastructure, agriculture and livelihoods by a one-in-a-hundred-year flood that



surpassed known record flood levels.



Landslides and major rivers changing course were common. Anglicare people told of the scale of devastation being "unprecedented and beyond imagination". They estimated over 350 people dead or lost from more than 205 villages and some 12,000 households seriously affected. Coastal villages were swept away and road networks devastated, 60 bridges were damaged or demolished.

The SRT members were in Popondetta in mid-January ahead of the arrival of the ShelterBoxes to make logistical assessment. Even though weeks had passed since the cyclonic event, the community eagerly awaited the arrival of the green boxes and when they were landed and deployed, they were overjoyed.



### **Exchanging The World**

"Australia? Is that in the Middle East?"

#### "Ohhh Australia! That's where Arnold Schwarzenegger comes from right?!"

For anyone who has travelled overseas, it's a fair bet you might have heard such misconceptions about Australia. While we may race to condemn the naivety and

ignorance of such assumptions, how many of us could ourselves state the collective name of the native peoples of Northern Sweden, how the King is honoured in movie cinemas in Thailand or even name Brazil's official language? Sure we can look it up on Google or Wikipedia, but to have first hand experience of a culture from which to learn is something irreplaceable - we not only

learn facts about that culture, but we can begin to understand and absorb it with context.

Such experiences also afford others the opportunity to learn about our culture as well -Yes, we do speak English in Australia and no I

don't ride a kangaroo to the shops. And no, I don't know Crocodile Dundee, but let me tell you all about drop bears...

Rotary's Youth Exchange Program has been running since 1929, and since that time has been offering youth from around the world the opportunity to immerse themselves in foreign cultures. Spreading dialogue and understanding (as well as Vegemite) across far flung corners of the world, our Australian youth exchange participants have joined youth from over 30 countries worldwide in showing the world what we have in common (Did you know that most Belgians aren't Collingwood fans either?).



As an ambassador of both their country and of their sponsoring Rotary Club, each participant has the privilege of seeing, learning and doing much more than they ever could from the window of a pre-packaged bus tour. Typically exchange students stay with three host families while abroad for a year. They partake in the customs and traditions that make up everyday life in their host country. They attend school, join in the social and cultural activities, and learn what it is to be part of another community. They also impart to that community an understanding of their own culture, history and traditions at the same time. The learning is not just for the student - the host families gain immeasurably as well.

Many students and host families learn a new language, try new foods (apparently Finnish ammonia-salt candy is one



worth giving a miss) and learn skills that they never expected they would possess. Students learn to adapt and become self-reliant; they grow in confidence; they develop a tolerance and understanding of other ways of thinking and doing things; and not unimportantly, they develop friendships and connections that will last throughout their lives.

The Rotary connection is not tenuous either. Students learn about Rotary and what it does around the world. They see first hand that when people from around the world join together to promote understanding, goodwill and service to the community, profound things can happen and lives can be altered for the better. Spending time with local Rotarians, they learn that the will for a better tomorrow, is one that is shared worldwide. With that realisation often comes inspiration – the thoughts of 'what if?' and how this common will can be leveraged to begin making a difference.

With the connection established, the inspiration and the confidence developed, we provide fertile ground in which tomorrow's leaders of global change grow. Perhaps the greatest outcome of Rotary's youth exchange is that host families and students alike are able to look back 10 years later and think "that was the best thing I could have ever done".

### **International Travel & Hosting Fellowship**



If there is one thing Rotarians universally enjoy, it is the rich fellowship with other Rotarians. The Recreational and Vocational Fellowships of Rotary International are associations of Rotarians and spouses who share common interests in worthwhile activities for the purpose of furthering acquaintance and fellowship.

The International Travel and Hosting Fellowship (ITHF) is one such fellowship with members in 60 countries and is a network of Rotarians throughout the world agreeing to host and share their lives with each other. ITHF provides members with both online and printed directories listing details of all members to facilitate "connections". The online directory includes a host of information about the member, the location and the country.

Prospective hosts are contacted, preferably 30 days prior to the desired visit. They consent to a "connection" with the visiting party subject to their own convenience. Connections take many forms, some will simply involve an evening at a restaurant, some will provide local information, some admission to "the club", some will include everything – accommodation, food, sightseeing, entertainment, etc. Each is strictly the host's choice but without any obligation. Details are decided by the members.

The ITHF is not a bed and breakfast, or home hotel organisation, there is no obligation to house visitors in the home. The "connection" will be richer for it, but some do not have space for visitors, and some might find the time inconvenient. The ITHF "connection," therefore, is for the purpose of having a cultural experience. Those simply wanting a bed, a meal to eat, or who are more interested in their own itinerary than that offered by hosts will soon discover they are in the wrong fellowship. Common courtesy requires that ITHF members make their inquiries well in advance of the planned arrival, respond promptly to all inquiries received, and take maximum care to avoid any unwelcome surprises to the hosts or visitors.

ITHF organises tours for its members and their families to and from the RI World Convention most years, on which they can enjoy touring in the company of like-minded Rotarians. In 2009 the Tour starts in London and travels through England, Ireland and Scotland to the Convention in Birmingham. Of the 80 seats available, 62 are already booked. The tour will be led by current ITHF President John Steven and incoming President Steve Yoshida of Alaska. 
