

### Rotary's Area of Focus for March: Clean water and sanitation

#### March Area of Focus: Water and Sanitation


Clean water and sanitation is a human right. When people, especially children, have access to clean water, sanitation, and hygiene, they lead healthier and more successful lives. We don't just build wells and walk away. Rotary members integrate water, sanitation, and hygiene into education projects. When children learn about disease transmission and practice good hygiene, they miss less school. And they can take those lessons home to their families, expanding our impact.

#### 'WASH' in Schools Target Challenge

Clean water, better sanitation, teacher training, and hygiene education in schools can improve the health and education of children by creating a cycle of opportunity: improved education, increased school attendance, and improved academic performance. The WASH in Schools Target

Challenge is a pilot program created to motivate Rotary clubs to develop sustainable water, sanitation, hygiene (collectively referred to as WASH), and education projects using the expertise and resources available through two of Rotary's areas of focus: basic education and literacy and water and sanitation.

The program will focus on measuring the impact that WASH and basic education and literacy initiatives have on school attendance. Rotary and UNICEF will recognize Rotary clubs and schools whose WASH in Schools projects achieve the benchmarks outlined below. During the pilot phase, the program will run through to July 2018 in five countries, all chosen for their strong, active involvement in school sanitation efforts: Belize, Guatemala, Honduras, India, and Kenya.

If a club or district isn't in a pilot country, you can still support a project as an international sponsor. Sponsors collaborate with a host club or district in the countries listed to support projects in the pilot country. Contact <a href="mailto:aof@rotary.org">aof@rotary.org</a> to learn more.

Many Rotary clubs in D9800 have been involved in water and sanitation projects locally and overseas in places like Western Uganda, PNG, East Timor, Philippines, Cambodia. Back in Australia, the 'End Trachoma

2020' project initiated by Melbourne Rotary aims to end trachoma in indigenous communities and this will include projects related to education in sanitation and hygiene. *Continued:* -


#### **Group Vocational Exchange – District 3820**

### Water and Sanitation Facilitate Education



### Who would have thought that giving clean water will also facilitate education?

Sitio Malasa, situated in the foothills of Zambales mountains, is populated by the indigeneous Aeta community that live in the province of Tarlac, Philippines, 150 kilometers north of Metropolitan Manila. It is a depressed community, of *Aetas* displaced by the cataclysmic Mt. Pinatubo eruption of 1991, and lowland homesteaders.

The community's potable water needs had been served by twelve deep wells, drilled to a depth of approximately 100 feet. Through the years, however, most of the wells had fallen into disrepair or have run dry, as their shallow aguiferss gradually depleted. In March 14, 2015, tribal and community leaders voiced their critical need for clean. potable water to Rotary Club of Ortigas Center's, Rtn Everita de Leon, as there is only one functioning well and pump remaining, forcing the community to rely on rainfall and on water from a polluted nearby creek for most of their personal and farming needs. This resulted in outbreaks of diarrhea and gastroenteritis, outbreak of numerous skin lesions, affecting adults and children alike. Children could not focus on their studies because the Malasa Elementary School itself had no water or functional toilets, and because the children either do not attend classes or take time off from school to line up at the only well to fill containers for their families' potable water needs. The womenfolk of other families would also have to walk a kilometer a day. half of that uphill, just to be able to fill their containers from the single well.

Immediate Past District Secretary D3800 Luz Cotoco, prepared and submitted a proposal to visiting Ruth Carlos Martinez of the Rotary Club of Brighton Beach, District 9800, in the hope of soliciting possible project partners. The Rotary Club of Brighton Beach, Rotary Club of Altona City and D9800 Foundation expressed interest in supporting the project. *Continued* -

Next, a full project assessment was conducted and Water Mineral Resource Engineer Glaiza Lee Diao was engaged to conduct a technical site analysis and the resulting "Technical Scoping Study" was duly submitted to the participating Rotary Clubs for review. Glaiza Diao later became a Group Vocational Exchange 2015-2016 team member of D3800 to D9800. Key conclusions drawn from the results of the study were:

- That none of the existing twelve wells could be considered viable for rehabilitation and long-term operation; hence, a new well or wells would have to be drilled in order to gain access to a deeper, larger aquifer.
- That the most ideal location for a new well would be in the vicinity of the Malasa Elementary School, to provide a reliable source of clean, potable water for drinking and sanitation for its students, as well as a tapping point for the community. The well being at a relatively high point of Sitio Malasa, families could walk uphill to the well with their empty containers, and after filling these with water, would have an easier time walking downhill back to their homes.

Construction work, site visits, coordinating with the local government, and purchasing of supplies were efficiently managed by the local partner, RC of Ortigas Center. The project, with a total cost of Php364,500 (A\$10,414) was faced with construction issues of delays due to two typhoons that caused mudslides and difficulty in drilling due to the hard rocky formation.

To ensure regular supply of water, Greenco Water Tank (Australia) donated one water Pak Flat tank for the school while another tank was purchased by RC of Ortigas Center for the community. The tanks serve as catchment for the collection of rainwater and also from the deep well .

Last October 2016, Ruth with Luz, conducted a post evaluation site visit and provided training on sanitation and water conservation to the students, teachers and community. This was supported by Sanitation Operating Manuals on water conservation, recycling and hygiene. Further, the community leaders were informed that the last remaining functioning well of the original deep wells provided to the community had been found to yield water unfit for drinking, and that today, the new well is the community's sole source of potable water. Water from the old well can now only be used for washing and for irrigation. Furthermore, school children are now able to attend classes and focus more on their studies.

The Sitio Malasa Water & Sanitation Project clearly demonstrates how Rotarians from clubs and countries far and near can work together to address Rotary's six areas of focus, and most particularly access to one of man's most basic needs – clean drinking water.


### **Rotary Community Recycling**





### Chairs and Desks for Fiji

If any school furniture donors wonder where the furniture goes, this is a great example. A total of 45 desks and chairs were delivered in two boat loads to Dreketi Village for Laucala Primary School.

The project, to sort and deliver to the landing at Vuni Vasa on Taveuni Island, Fiji, was coordinated by Claude Prevost of Fiji Pearl fame. The Rotary Club of Boronia in Melbourne is a sister club to the Rotary Club of Taveuni Island and they work very closely together on many projects.

Claude says "Just before Xmas, Dreketi Village near our farm in Qamea was destroyed by floods and landslides. 17 houses, the hall, health center and the school were completely demolished.

"Today ( Monday 16<sup>th</sup> January ) was school delivery day. I would like to thank all who helped us today like the Rotary Club of Taveuni, the Loloma foundation and all the private donors who dug deep in their pockets to make sure that the 45 students of this village would get a desk, a chair, a school bag, all their textbooks, stationary, dictionary and geometry sets."



The desks and chairs came from DIK West Footscray and two more containers leave DIK on the 7th March bound for Taveuni. DIK have been marvelous with helping us deliver the goods to Fiji.

RC Boronia and RAWCS have sent two containers both of which contained building materials to rebuild schools after cyclone Winston and school desks and chairs. New Zealand Rotary is doing similar things.

#### So far since Cyclone Winston - RC Taveuni (a club of 10 members.) has :-

- Housed students in temporary school rooms
- Made temporary and permanent repairs to teachers houses
- Fixed the Hospital roof
- •A number of water projects
- Donated a complete ambulance to the hospital
- •Completely rebuild one whole school Lavena
- Built 4 Teachers Houses at Niusawa
- Almost completed 2 Teachers Houses at South Taveuni
- Assisted with temporary repairs at Vunikavikaloa





RC Boronia is assisting with medical equipment, general funding and completing all the paperwork for Import/Export Agents, Freight, RAWCS, Donations-in-Kind, and others to ensure that supplies get through.


We would love to invite and make you aware of a great volunteer opportunity we have coming up and helping us to recruit some volunteers for a day of picking apples.

### BED LINEN RECYCLING PROJECT

The purpose of the project was to recycle used Linen from Rio Tinto in the Pilbara to overseas charities through Rotary International Donations-In-Kind, Melbourne.

Sixty-two pallet cartons were transported free of charge by LinFox, from Perth to Melbourne over December 2016 and January 2017. The material was laundered and much of it was in an as-new condition. DIK have been coordinating with Linfox to hold the cartons as required pending space in the DIK store.

The beneficiaries are the many hospital patients in impoverished countries who currently have nothing or very little in their hospitals. This linen will be of great value to them.

Some quantities have already been despatched to the Helping Hand Hospital in Nepal. More is designated for three hospitals in the Philippines. Additional quantities will be despatched to Chile with a container of beds that will be sent towards the middle of the year.

The Dili National Hospital in Timor Leste and a Rotary project in Fiji will also be a recipient from DIK's container next month in March. Several more are being arranged to Cambodia for April/May.

Some of the linen will be stored by DIK waiting for containers that are despatched to hospitals throughout the year. It should however also be noted that from

experience it is a reality that some of this will eventually be "borrowed" by the patients when they leave. However it is a reality of life in these locations.

On behalf of all the receiving charities, the Mill Point Rotary Club would like to thank:

- LinFox for their generous assistance transporting these goods to Melbourne and in particular for their cooperation and assistance in coordinating the despatch of items with DIK.
- Rio Tinto for generously supplying these goods to enable them to be used for the above beneficiaries. and for coordinating the supply of these goods.
- Special acknowledgement to The Compass Group and Atlas Linen for coordinating the supply of these goods.
- Rotary International Donations In Kind for managing the final distribution.
- And finally the members of the Mill Point Rotary Club. It was their initial resourcefulness and voluntary efforts that made the initial stage of this Line project back in August 2016 happen, that consequently led to this stage.

- **Relax attendance requirements** while attendance is important, you can encourage members to give their time in different ways.
- Offer different membership types alternative types include family, junior, or corporate memberships. These members will only be considered active and counted toward your membership total if they pay RI dues.
- <u>Invite Rotaractors to be members of your club</u> you can reduce fees or relax the attendance policy for these members, as long as your bylaws reflect this.

### **MODERN SLAVERY**

What Can Rotarians Do to Help Alleviate Modern Slavery? Part 1
A good and common question among Rotarian colleagues particularly after advising them, "THERE ARE MORE SLAVES ON EARTH NOW THAN AT ANY TIME IN HUMAN HISTORY".

The Global Slavery Index 2016 <a href="https://vimeo.com/140641794">www.globalslaveryindex.org</a> estimates 45.8 million in some form of modern slavery. The analysis covers 167 countries and includes an assessment and rating of Government responses to the issue. There can be different definitions of Modern Slavery, with the Index report covering situations of exploitation and control, inability to leave because of threats, violence, coercion, abuse of power or deception, with treatment akin to a farm animal, refer Appendix 1. 58% of those living in modern slavery are in 5 countries. An introduction to Modern Slavery (short video Sept 2015) assists our understanding. <a href="https://vimeo.com/140641794">https://vimeo.com/140641794</a>

The Free The Slaves analysis is 78% are in industries where manual labour is needed, such as farming, ranching, logging, mining, fishing, brick making and in service industries, dish washers, janitors, gardeners and house maids and then 22% trapped in forced prostitution or Sex slavery. It is estimated of those in slavery, 55% are Women and girls and 45% Men and Boys, with approx 26% under the age of 18yrs. <a href="https://au.pinterest.com/VeriteFairLabor/products-made-with-forced-labor">https://au.pinterest.com/VeriteFairLabor/products-made-with-forced-labor</a>

1. Firstly, **Create Awareness** in Rotarian circles and within the wider public, of the plight of millions who are physically and mentally held in servitude as slaves for commercial gain.

This can be done with Rotarians learning more on the subject by having speakers at Rotary Club meetings, District Conferences and Rotary Conventions - Speakers covering, Slavery, Human Trafficking and Corporate Ethical Supply Chains and projects that rescue and provide protection, refuge, rehabilitation and education centres. Having booths at Conferences and Conventions, promoting such projects.

Rotary International and Foundation has geared its humanitarian work around 6 Areas of Focus and alleviating Slavery does not sit squarely under any particular one of them. Rotary International, the Foundation, Districts and their Clubs do magnificent humanitarian work under all the 6 Areas of



Focus. So What Can Rotarians Do to Help Alleviate Slavery, under the Areas of Focus? Two stand out for longer term prevention:

#### 2. Elevate, "Basic Education and Literacy"

One of the world's biggest challenges is the extent of poverty and inequality across the globe and certainly within many developing and 3<sup>rd</sup> world countries. The common belief is that the cycle of poverty can be alleviated / broken through Education. It would be highly desirable that every child has the opportunity of some education, to be able to read and write, to solve problems, have skills, trade skills, understand health and hygiene, have ethics and become self sufficient with skills for employment so as to contribute in the local community. Education for children can assist to lead a family out of poverty and provide hope and opportunity. Through education the cycle of poverty, the need for migration and the vulnerability to human trafficking and slavery can also be broken.

There are a number of Rotary Club and District examples of supporting "Basic Education and Literacy" projects. The School of St Jude, in Tanzania —" fighting poverty through education", is a prime Australian Rotary success example, which may have equals from other Rotary School funding Initiatives in other parts of the world.


#### **MODERN SLAVERY** - continued

**3.** Elevate – "Economic and Community Development" - Help Create and Develop more Viable Communities.

In the Rotary Foundation 2014-15 Annual Report under the Area of Focus," Economic and Community Development" it reports The Canadian Adopt a Village in Laos projects, P18, outlines a prime example of Education Resourcing plus they include other Areas of Focus initiatives, building dams, levelling crop fields, installing water tanks, providing water purifiers, toilets, solar panels, school facilities, health and medical centres, the facilities needed by that developing community – covering many Areas of Focus. Providing long term Community facilities and thereby opportunity, growth and sustainable futures.

The Rotary International publication, Areas of Focus - Project Strategies, are an excellent guide.

The Rotary International Foundation would have many many more examples of highly successful "Basic Education and Literacy" and "Economic and Community Development" projects. Publication and promotion of such projects, explaining the how and why of their success could prompt more applications, prompt other clubs funding support and / or the



Foundation could offer \$2 for \$1 in grant funding to expand the impact and make a difference in these humanitarian areas of focus. This approach could over time help to alleviate modern slavery along with assisting in a number of Humanitarian Areas of Focus.

Let's promote more projects and their funding.

In the Next Edition of The Networker. Part 2 What Can Rotarians Do to Help Alleviate Modern Slavery?

- 4. Rotarians to Influence Corporations, Governments and Consumers – Supply Chain Ethics & Legislation Enforcement
- 5. Put the subject of Modern Slavery on the Rotary International Agenda and Develop a long term Strategy.

An articulated Strategy would demonstrate and enhance the reality of what Rotary International stands for, by changing opportunity in communities in greatest need. Rotary International would truly be revitalised, enhance and retain its reputation from its actions of being the leading Humanitarian Organization in the world.

If people do nothing, if we Rotarians do nothing, there will be little change and the scale of Modern Slavery will live on. Let's be the Rotarians that speak up and lead an abolition movement as part of our humanitarian endeavours.


