PDG Gordon McKern OAM honoured with RI Service Above

Past District Governor Gordon McKern has become the first person outside the Melbourne Metropolitan area, to be honoured with Rotary's prestigious Service Above Self award.

He was presented with the award at the Multi District Conference on February 17th by Rotary International's Past Foundation Director and Chair of the Rotary Peace Centre Committee, Bryn Styles.

Gordon is one of only five people in District 9800 in the last 20 years to receive the accolade, and he was recognised for his commitment to helping others by volunteering his time and talents.

As District Governor, Gordon led efforts to raise millions of dollars to help create the Rotary Bone Marrow Donor Institute in Melbourne.

"When you're District Governor, you have a cause in mind which you want the clubs to get involved in," he said.

"We wanted to raise \$2 million but we managed to raise \$4 million to go towards the institute."



He later assisted in efforts to create the BMDI Rotary House in North Melbourne, which provides accommodation for families of children who are undergoing bone marrow treatment at the Royal Children's Hospital.

Gordon McKern joined the Rotary Club of Eaglehawk in 1976 after relocating his business and his family from Melbourne. In his 43 years at Rotary, he has contributed at all levels of the organisation from being a regular member, to Club President, and then District Governor from 1992-93.

He also played a key role in his local community over the last four decades; he was the chairman of Coliban Water for 14 years, chairman of the Bendigo Art Gallery for six years, president of Bendigo Regional Institute of TAFE for five years and chairman of La Trobe University Bendigo Regional Advisory Board for four years. He also currently holds the position of chairman at both the Ulumbarra Theatre and the Aspire Foundation.

Gordon received the **Australian Centenary Medal in 2001** and an **Order of Australia in 2009** for his service to the community. He was also recognised as **Citizen of the Year** in Eaglehawk in 1986 and in Bendigo in 2014.

He also started the **McKern Foundation**, which for the last 25 years has supplied, delivered and erected all steel requirements for the Royal Children's Hospital's annual fundraising project of building a house for sale. His foundation also supplies fresh fruit every week to every student at 37 schools around Bendigo.

District Governor Bronwyn Stephens said Gordon McKern's influence on Rotary and the wider community has been incomparable. "He is one of very few people that is universally respected and admired and that only good things that are said of," Ms Stephens said. "Gordon McKern is a Rotarian that genuinely practices service above self every day."

"He's touched a lot of people and sat beside them on their own humanitarian journeys," she said. As District Governor, Mr McKern led efforts to raise millions of dollars to help create the Rotary Bone Marrow Donor Institute in Melbourne.

Gordon has also been influential in doubling the number of members of the Paul Harris Society, which recognised Rotary members who contribute over \$1,000 or more each year.

"He has been hugely successful in persuading people to join and donate," former Rotary District Governor Dennis Shore said. Mr Shore, a close friend of Mr McKern, said the philanthropist was "one of nature's finest gentlemen".

"He is respected within Rotary, respected as businessman and as a community leader, and is admired as a family man," he said. "I'm proud to call him a friend, as would many, many people," he said.

Rotary working in Vietnam

Rotary is not officially present in Vietnam, but Rotary North Balwyn has partnered with a Non-Government Organisation, the **Overseas Kids Foundation** to provide assistance to a poor community since 2009.

Over 100 children who were previously unable to go to school have been sponsored, with five already having graduated from University in a variety of disciplines. Books, furniture and equipment have been supplied to the kindergarten, schools and health clinic. Following testing, clean water has been supplied through six outlets in the schools and community. Pig-raising and a new agricultural project are in process with the aim of breaking the poverty cycle.

The International Red Cross has presented us with an Achievement Award.

As a result of visible benefits, the Phu Tho Provincial Government asked that we support other communities and, led by Rotary Bacchus Marsh, Balwyn and Brighton, we have committed to assist three other communities using the North Balwyn approach.

More than 1,500 children will benefit from educational support and some 16,000 residents from improvements in water, sanitation and health care.

This is an inspirational example of District 9800 clubs working together to make a difference through improving lives of needy people.

WERN is now approaching 4 years since establishing itself in Footscray with the help of many good people and corporates who simply want nothing more than to help their community.



Since May 2015, apart from establishing the necessary partnerships, sponsorships and creating a location to operate from, **WERN** has successfully established a network of 50+ support agencies and have partnered with 320+ accredited case managers to support the clients we assist every day with material aid at no cost helping people to re-establish their lives after experiencing trauma through emergency circumstances of fire or flood or from backgrounds of domestic violence, refugee, mental health or homelessness circumstances.

WERN is a Rotary program managed by 10 Rotary Clubs from District 9800 in the north and west of Melbourne and provide our service to 9 municipalities from Brimbank; Hobson's Bay; Hume; Maribyrnong; Melton; Moonee Valley; Moorabool; Moreland and Wyndham and simply rely on the generous support of our Member Clubs, our Sponsors and our Community.

WERN has assisted over 1,200 families since commencing and has provided over 25,000 items to our clients with a nominal value of almost \$800,000.00. **WERN** has received over 1,000 donations and almost 8,600 hours from our volunteers. An outstanding effort in under four years and currently **WERN** is assisting 50 to 60 families each month.

WERN is now needing to find new premises to operate from, our current facility has been ear-marked for redevelopment and in the short-term will be used as part of the Metro Tunnel development. Part of our strategy is to identify and purchase a suitable long-term home for our activities where we can continue to provide quality, free of charge goods to our most challenged and needy members within our communities.

John Hewko on Innovation



How do we innovate at Rotary?

Innovation and flexibility. Those are two words you hear a lot today when we think about any organization adapting to a rapidly changing environment. But what do those two words mean for Rotary?

In short, they will define Rotary's future, because they are fundamental pillars of our strategic plan for enhanced impact, reach, engagement and adaptability. If we are really serious about growing Rotary and attracting new members from all demographics, we must innovate. That innovation will need to take various forms.

It begins, **first**, with making the idea of innovation in Rotary a mindset. It begins with developing a culture of positive change and adapting to the needs of our new realities and challenges.

Second, innovation is also about **transformative technologies**. We can call this sustaining innovation – that is, constantly developing our suite of products to serve our existing members.

We have implemented this concept of sustaining innovation through three channels of new technology: <u>Rotary's Learning</u> <u>Center</u>, <u>Rotary Club Central</u>, and an enhanced **online membership leads program**. Now, all these tools are at your disposal, and many new ones are in the process of being developed. Their consistent use should be a key foundation of our future growth strategy.

The **third** kind of innovation that we must aspire to generate at Rotary is called **disruptive innovation**.

In the world of business, it refers to a product or service, often very simple in its first design. This product or service takes root at the bottom of a market, and then relentlessly grows in popularity, until it displaces established competitors.

Think of how the traditional taxi cab business has been changed forever by ride sharing platforms such as Uber, which connects consumers who need rides with drivers willing to provide them.

With a growing group of individuals looking for connection, friendship, and an opportunity to get involved in the world around them, Rotary is well positioned to be a disruptive innovator.

"If we are really serious about growing Rotary and attracting new members from all demographics, we must innovate." Imagine for a moment what Rotary clubs could look like in the future. Clubs that could change their meeting schedule and format, can relax attendance requirements, and offer multiple membership types.

Think of a club where you can invite Rotaractors to be members of your club while they are still in Rotaract. **A club of the future**, where measuring adherence to the rules is replaced with measuring progress against goals to improve the community and to grow the club. Well, you don't have to imagine very far, because these clubs already exist. <u>Next Rotary</u> <u>Generation Invercargill</u> is a family-friendly club in New Zealand with fluid meeting times and venues. While attendance is encouraged, it is not compulsory. <u>The Rotary Club of Aruba</u> systematically engages with its local Rotaract and Interact Clubs to ensure a smooth and natural transition into the Rotary club. As a result, half of the club members are former Rotaractors.

Then there are the so-called <u>Passport clubs</u>. Three years ago District 5180 in California began thinking about a club model that would be attractive to younger members who were not interested in attending weekly meetings or paying dues they could not afford.

The district chartered what they called a Passport club with 20 members in Sacramento, California. The club meets only six times a year with an optional social event in the month between meetings. In addition to attending the six required meetings, every year passport members must either contribute \$1,000 to the Rotary Foundation OR do at least 40 hours of community service with Rotary clubs or other non-profits in the district.

This club has more than tripled its membership in three years.

A long-term sustainable growth strategy just doesn't appear out of thin air. It requires a commitment to club innovation and flexibility; a commitment to best serving the specific needs of our communities as they evolve, and to incorporate Rotaractors into Rotary. I challenge all of us to think out of the box, and to grow Rotary through new innovative club models and to try new approaches. I'm confident that we will embrace the opportunities ahead of us through innovation, flexibility and thoughtful change.

Nutritious Food – A Human Right


According to the **Food and Agricultural Organization of the United Nations** (FAO), figures show that hunger is on the rise. It's estimated that the number of undernourished people has increased to nearly 821 million, from around 804 million. And, at the same time, 1.9 billion people are overweight. Many people associate eating with easing hunger. Those affected by both malnutrition and over-nutrition may not know that feeling full does not necessarily equate to having adequate nutrition.

We also know that every minute 5 children under the age of 5 die from malnutrition, and it's because of these figures that **Food Plant Solutions Rotarian Action Group** (FPS) is working hard to end hunger, malnutrition and ensure food security.

Formed in 2007, *Food Plant Solutions Rotarian Action Group* creates educational publications that present scientific evidence in simple terms, tailored for all levels of literacy. The publications are designed to quantify the

nutritional value of food plants and educate care-givers on which food plants are more nutritious and why our bodies need those nutrients. We focus on what are often neglected and under-utilised plants, plants that are growing in and adapted to the environment, plants that are high in the most beneficial nutrients, plants that require minimal inputs to grow.

Food Plant Solutions does not send people in-country, but forms partnerships with existing providers who use our publications to educate communities, and particularly women and children, on the nutrient value of their local food plants. Our approach empowers through education. The more information and education people have on food choices; what nutritious food is, how to grow it and why it's important to eat, the more likely they will be to make healthier choices. This benefits them, their family and their community as a whole



Because hunger and malnutrition kills 1.5 times more people than AIDS, tuberculosis, malaria and natural disasters combined. And, we know that girls who are born malnourished and become stunted as children, will often become malnourished mothers and the cycle then repeats itself. This cycle can be broken - empowering women through education so that they understand what nutritious food is, why their bodies need it and how to access it.

Malnutrition and stunting rob children of their futures – both are preventable.

We'd like to cease to exist because we were no longer needed. Sadly, we are a long way from that. We are very low cost - all general donations go solely towards the project.

We are an innovative approach to hunger, malnutrition and food security, which is cost effective and proven to work; our Vietnamese partner has seen malnutrition reduce in schools by 95%.

In their report **"2018 - The State of Food Security and Nutrition in the World**", FAO have said "Access to safe, nutritious and sufficient food must be framed as a human right, with priority given to the most vulnerable. Policies must pay special attention to the food security and nutrition of children under five, school-age children, adolescent girls and women in order to halt the intergenerational cycle of malnutrition. A shift is needed towards nutrition-sensitive agriculture and food systems that provide safe and high quality food, promoting healthy diets for all."

This is what Food Plant Solutions does; we address the issues identified by FAO, and our approach is in line with their recommendations.




