#### Your Grants so far in 2017-18

Since our last newsletter the following grants have been approved:

#### **District Grants**

This year we introduced grants for educational scholarships to support students of demonstrated motivation and ability, who are experiencing financial hardship. The grant opportunity, which covers both Year 11 and 12, has proved very popular and more than 20 students are being supported through 13 clubs.

Educational opportunities have also been a focus at an international Level. The Rotary Club of Camberwell has supplied desks and chairs for 200 secondary school students in Cambodia and Rotary Central Melbourne is funding scholarships for students in Kolkata to escape the vicious cycle of crime and poverty in India.

The Rotary Club of Daylesford has implemented an innovative program for future young leaders at a local primary school and the Rotary Club of North Balwyn has completed a student exchange program with Mongolia.

Meanwhile Rotary Club of Keilor East has assembled kits to implement the "Days for Girls" program in Balibo, Timor Leste and Rotary Club of Hoppers Crossing has commenced a diabetes education program in Ghana.

Closer to home the Rotary Club of Glenferrie implemented a program to secure and distribute emergency care packs for the homeless. Also Rotary Central Melbourne supported funding of night nurses in the city area providing medical assistance to under-privileged and destitute street people over the Christmas and New Year period when other agencies are closed for their annual break.

#### **Global Grants**

#### **Rotary Global Grant GG1751527**

Funding to provide clean, potable water and sanitation to the residents and schoolchildren of five Barangays through the provision of a deep well, elevated tanks, sink facilities, and toilet blocks in Tabuk City, Kalinga, the Philippines. This is a project developed by the Rotary Club of Melbourne supported by the Rotary Club of Meycauayan Uptown in the Philippines, RC Prahran and Districts 9800 and 9500. The grant is for US\$43,950.

#### **Rotary Global Grant GG1744459**

Funding to to provide the Akama Primary School with appropriate sanitary ablution facility and assist with the implementation of a WASH program for the school and community in Epi, Vanuatu. This is also a projected developed by Melbourne Rotary Club and supported by the Port Vila Rotary Club and D9910. The grant is for US\$40,000.

In addition to making the first personal contribution to The Rotary Foundation, Rotary founder Paul Harris also established a charitable trust in 1944 that would generate income for him and his wife, Jean, until their deaths, when the remaining balance would be given to The Rotary Foundation to educate underprivileged children.

Others have designated that their gift be used to support a Rotary Foundation program in the name of a loved one. Sir Angus Mitchell, the first Australian to become president of Rotary (1948-49), helped launch this tradition in 1949, when he established a scholarship for an Australian student in honour of his wife, known as the Teenie Robertson Mitchell Memorial Fellowship, beginning a tradition that continues to this day.

We all have the opportunity to continue to make a difference after we are gone through a bequest to The Rotary Foundation

As expressed so aptly by PRIP Royce Abbey, a bequest to The Rotary Foundation is our final way to make this world a better place than we found it.

But there are many others who have made a significant and meaningful contribution in an area of excellence that really makes a difference. Here are two Ambassadorial Scholars sponsored by District 9800 who you might not have heard about but they have made a real difference.



Professor Malcolm Sim is an Occupational Physician and epidemiologist leading research and teaching staff in the Monash Centre for Occupational and Environmental Health (MonCOEH).

Professor Sim is the new President-elect of the Australasian Faculty of Occupational and Environmental Medicine (AFOEM). His role as President-elect takes effect in May and he transitions to a further two-year tenure as President in 2020. This appointment is testament to his vast experience in occupational and environmental medicine.



Dr Ngaire Elwood BSc (Hons), PhD is an expert in the field of cellular therapy, cancer, cord blood, stem cells and leukaemia. She has devoted her career to investigating, developing

and providing improved therapies for the treatment of cancer, leukaemia and other blood disorders.

Ngaire is Director of BMDI Cord Blood Bank at the University of Melbourne and Vice President (2017) of the international Board of Directors for the Foundation for the Accreditation of Cellular Therapies (FACT), and represents the International Society for Cellular Therapies (ISCT) on this Board.

Many District Governors have been Alumni of Foundation Programs. In many cases that has been the catalyst or a reinforcement of their decision to offer themselves for consideration as a District Governor.

# The Rotary Foundation receives highest rating from Charity Navigator—again!




For the 10th consecutive year, The Rotary Foundation has received the highest rating — four stars — from Charity Navigator, an independent evaluator of charities in the U.S.

In the most recent ratings, the Foundation earned the maximum of 100 points for demonstrating both strong financial health and commitment to accountability and transparency.

In a letter to the Foundation, Charity Navigator notes that "only 1 percent of the charities we evaluate have received at least 10 consecutive 4-star evaluations, indicating that The Rotary Foundation outperforms other charities in America. This exceptional designation from Charity Navigator sets The Rotary Foundation apart from its peers and demonstrates to the public its trustworthiness."

The rating reflects Charity Navigator's assessment of how the Foundation uses donations, sustains its programs and services, and practices good governance and openness.



**District 9800** is a Leader in support of Rotary Peace Centres and identifying Peace Fellows.

There would be few Rotarians in District 9800 who do not know that our District is the only district in the Rotary world, which has successfully nominated a Fellow every year since the first Fellow intake in 2002.

District 9800 has self-styled itself as the Peace Fellow "Black Caviar" district but our record now far eclipses that of the amazing racing mare with 32 Fellows now successfully nominated.

#### What do the Fellows do?

Through academic training, study, and practice, the **Rotary Peace Centres** program develops leaders who become catalysts for peace and conflict prevention and resolution in their communities and around the globe. Each year, up to 100 Rotary Peace Fellows are chosen to participate in a master's degree or certificate program at one of our partner universities. Fellows study subjects related to the root causes of conflict and explore innovative solutions that address realworld needs. We have peace centres around the globe at:

- ☐ Chulalongkorn University, Bangkok (certificate program)
- ☐ Duke University and University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, USA
- ☐ International Christian University, Tokyo
- ☐ University of Bradford, England
- ☐ University of Queensland, Brisbane, Australia

## Polio Challenge

Yes, it has been a long haul and regrettably we are not quite done yet. But we are so close and we cannot give up yet!

Polio has long ceased to be a disease here in Australia but a recent discovery of the polio virus in the Melbourne sewerage system reminds us that it would be so easy for all the work we have done to be in vain if we do not finish the job.

#### So, here is the deal!

**Run a special event** to raise funds for Polio eradication in addition to your annual giving for Polio-Plus. District will match your funds raised from its DDF allocation\*, which will receive a special 50% bonus allocated by The Rotary Foundation. All of that will be matched 2 to 1 by the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. Your club will have the satisfaction of knowing that you really helped to make a difference.

Here is an example:

Club fundraising \$1,000
District match \$1,000
50% DDF Bonus \$500
Sub-total \$2,500
Gates 2:1 match \$5,000
Total \$7,500

District does not have unlimited DDF but will match up to \$50,000—so there is a challenge for clubs to make a difference.

#### What is a special event?

Really anything you want it to be—from a Trivial Pursuit night to a movie night, to buying and selling a special batch of Rotary fruit cakes. And yes, you can direct your \$400 from Star Carnivale to Polio eradication and it will be matched one-for-one from DDF!

If your club also makes a donation to PolioPlus as part of our annual giving to The Foundation, it will receive a 1:2 DDF match as a "thank you" for your proactive support. Donations must be banked by 31 May 2018.
