Rotary's Area of Focus for February: Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution

Rotary and Peace

Rotary International's stated purpose is to bring

together business and professional leaders to provide humanitarian services, encourage high ethical standards in all vocations, and **to advance** goodwill and peace around the world. The month of February brings Rotary's focus on Peace & Conflict Prevention/Resolution. Sixty million people are displaced

by armed conflict or persecution, and 90 percent of armed-conflict casualties are civilians, half of them children. Through service

projects, fellowships, and other Rotary-sponsored campaigns, members train adults and young leaders to prevent and mediate conflict, and aid refugees who have fled dangerous areas. Members also pursue projects to address the underlying structural causes of conflict, including poverty, inequality, ethnic tension, lack of access to education, and unequal distribution of resources.

Each year, Rotary awards up to 50 fellowships for master's degrees and 50 for certificate studies at premier universities around the world.

- Master's degree programs: Last 15 to 24 months and require a practical internship of two to three months during the academic break.
- Professional development certificate program: For experienced professionals and lasts three months with two to three weeks of field study.





These fellowships cover tuition and fees, room and board, round-trip transportation, and all internship and field-study expenses. In just over a decade, the Rotary Peace Centers have trained more than 1,000 fellows

for careers in peace building. Many of them are serving as leaders at international organizations or have started their own foundations. You will see in the graph below where the peace alumni work:

Peace Begins Within Us – Extract of an Essay

In March 2013, our then non-Rotarian daughter Katrina responded to PDG Dennis Shore's challenge to write an essay on 'What Peace Means To Me', with ten being chosen to attend an RI Peace Conference in Hiroshima. Kat has given me permission to share some of that essay, and I do so to demonstrate the point that we do have the ability to make the world a more peaceful place, starting with ourselves, then those around us in our families and communities. The extract begins:

"The kind of peace I would like to see in the world starts with each of us being equipped to cope with our own lives, supported by strong families and communities. Cultural anthropologist, Margaret Meade said "Never doubt that a small group of committed citizens can change the world; indeed, it's the only thing that ever has". Peace to me is a state where the mind, heart and spirit align. Our views on matters in life would come from equal portions of our hearts and minds, so that our actions are not overpowering or judgmental, but instead, are balanced and considered. Like the Rotary four-way test.

"I have observed how Rotary helps change the lives of people all over the world for the better, and how in Sri Lanka they convinced a country at war to cease fighting so that a polio immunization program could continue. If we found a way to stop a war, even though temporarily, and Sri Lanka became polio free, we can find more of these occasions.

"Imagine all the people, living life in peace, is part of John Lennon's lyrics in his song 'Imagine', and that is what I like to dream. A world where we individually have the ability to reach within and recognize what is and what is

not working for us, and to bring about change to be the best we can be. We share this life and world, don't we? The world and its people are one and that gives power to the people."

"Our own life has to be our message." – Thich Nhat Hanh.

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Rotary: Making a Difference By Ryan Hyland

Rotary International President-elect Ian H.S. Riseley made the case on Monday that protecting the environment and curbing climate change are essential to Rotary's goal of sustainable service.



Riseley, a member of the Rotary Club of Sandringham, Victoria, Australia, unveiled the 2017-18 presidential theme, **Rotary: Making a Difference**, to incoming district governors at Rotary's International Assembly in San Diego, California, USA.

Environmental degradation and global climate change are serious threats to everyone, Riseley said. "They are having a disproportionate impact on those who are most vulnerable, those to whom Rotary has the greatest responsibility. Yet environmental issues rarely register on the Rotary agenda," he said. Environmental degradation is one of the major threats listed by the UN's High-level Panel on Threats, Challenges, and Change. Riseley added, "The time is long past when environmental sustainability can be dismissed as not Rotary's concern. It is, and must be, everyone's concern."

The president-elect challenged every Rotary club to make a difference by planting a tree for each of its members between the start of the Rotary year on 1 July and Earth Day on 22 April 2018. Trees remove carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases from the air, which slows global warming. "It is my hope that the result of that effort will be far greater than the environmental benefit that those 1.2 million new trees will bring," Riseley said. "I believe the greater result will be a Rotary that recognizes our responsibility not only to the people on our planet, but to the planet itself."

Securing Rotary's future

In his address to the 2017-18 class of district governors, Riseley also urged clubs to improve their gender balance and lower the average age of their

members. Only 22 percent of Rotary's members are women, up from 13 percent 10 years ago. At that rate, Riseley said, it will take another three decades for Rotary to achieve gender parity. "Three decades is far too long to wait to achieve a Rotary that reflects the world in which we live. We need to make it a priority now," he said.

Noting that 103 of the 539 incoming governors are women, Riseley said they are the type of women we need in Rotary, "leaders who will help Rotary connect with, and represent, and better serve, all of the members of all our communities." Riseley also believes it is imperative that clubs find ways to attract and engage younger members. Today only 5 percent of reported members are under 40, and a majority of members are over 60, Riseley told the audience.

"Consider what Rotary stands to look like 10 or 20 years from now if we don't get very serious, very soon, about bringing in younger members," Riseley said.

Clubs will make a difference this year through their own decisions, said Riseley, but it will take teamwork on a global scale to move Rotary forward and secure its future. "We know that we can do more together than we could ever hope to do alone," he told incoming governors. "I ask you to keep that spirit of teamwork and cooperation always in your minds and to take it back with you to your districts."

Your Outstanding Foundation From RI District 9800 Foundation Newsletter

The Association of Fund Raising Professionals (AFP) has recognized The Rotary Foundation with its annual Award for Outstanding Foundation.

The award honours organisations that show philanthropic commitment and leadership through financial support, innovation, encouragement of others, and involvement in public affairs.

Rotary Foundation Trustee Chair Kalyan Banerjee stated that it was an honour to receive such a recognition and the "continued strong support of Rotary members will help us keep our promise of a polio-free world for all children and enable the Foundation to carry out its mission of advancing world understanding, goodwill, and peace" and "another 100 years of Rotary members taking action to make communities better around the world."

The award will be presented in early 2017 at the AFP's annual conference in San Francisco.

Rotary Foundation Trustee Chair-elect Paul Netzel is set to accept the award on Rotary's behalf, and Eric Schmelling, director of fund development at Rotary, will speak at the conference.

"While almost everyone is familiar with Rotary, not everyone may realize just how much of an impact Rotary and The Rotary Foundation have had on countless people and communities across the globe," says Jason Lee, AFP president and CEO. "On behalf of the entire charitable sector and people around the world, all of us at AFP are honoured to be able to recognize The Rotary Foundation as our 2016 Outstanding Foundation."

AFP's committee of judges cited Rotary's comprehensive campaign to eradicate polio as a major driver of the selection. They also mentioned that Rotary applies a methodical, purposeful approach to support a wide variety of causes, from providing clean water to educating the next generation of peace professionals.

World Understanding Month By PDG Dennis Shore

The monthly cycle of Rotary themes continues and February is World Understanding Month in the Rotary Calendar and the relevant **Area of Focus is Peace and Conflict Prevention/Resolution**

Peacemaking becoming an early core objective of Rotary. Delegates at the 1914 Convention adopted a resolution calling for a peace conference and called upon all clubs to be advocates for peace. Sadly those actions failed to prevent the outbreak of World War I. Nevertheless Rotary had defined peacemaking as being at the core of its values.

Arch Klumph, architect of The Rotary Foundation, making a visit to the UK immediately after that dreadful war proclaimed to British Rotarians that he envisioned the part that Rotary could play by creating "a mighty team to preserve peace, justice and honour among the nations of the world". In 1922 the Rotary Convention ratified a proposal to incorporate peacemaking into Rotary's constitution and bylaws. Interestingly this is also when Rotary's name was officially changed to Rotary International and Rotary could indeed legally proclaim itself to have as its objective to aid in the advancement of "international peace and goodwill".

Rotary did much more than talk about peace. Rotarians were also instrumental in establishing the world's first Peace Park in 1932, convincing the governments of Canada and the USA to join national Parks in Alberta and Montana, to form Waterton-Glacier International Peace Park. Today, Rotarians govern the Waterton-Glacier International Peace Park Association. Canadians and Americans are equally represented on the board, and the presidency alternates between the two countries. Rotarians gather in September each year for a weekend of fellowship and goodwill.


So much of what we do as Rotary and Rotarians supports this objective even though we do not necessarily think of it as such. Our humanitarian programs are very much at the heart of alleviating the causes of conflict and war. In fact the first of The Rotary Foundation's six Areas of Focus is about peace and conflict resolution. The other 5 areas of focus relate to disease prevention and treatment, water and sanitation, maternal and child health, basic education and literacy and finally economic and community development. These all provide an ideal recipe for achieving peace in our world.

Of course Rotary does not just beaver away in the background. So often we are called upon to take leadership roles or take on the role without being asked, such as in polio eradication. - *continued*

World Understanding Month



Charles C. (Chuck) Keller, of Pennsylvania, U.S.A., upon being elected 1987-88 R.I. president: "I am prepared to dedicate my life and best efforts to the marvelous effort that is Rotary."

Rotary's peacemaking leadership was recognised in its role in the formation of the United Nations after World War II and for creating the concept (and charter) of UNESCO before that.

The UN universal declaration of Human Rights drew on the resolution of the Rotary International Havana Convention in 1940 as its framework.

When the UN Charter was finalised in 1945, Rotary was at the forefront of the action. Rotary was invited as an observer organisation but 49 Rotarians guided agendas, arranged translations, mediated and suggested wording for resolutions. Rotary today continues to assist the UNO at the highest level of consultative status.

Despite the lofty ideals and objective of the United Nations Organisation, Rotary continues to provide a more pragmatic and independent approach to peacemaking and Rotary as an organisation is at the forefront of creating world understanding through its own programs.

Successive Rotary leaders looked for ways to extend Rotary's leadership in peacemaking. The need was clearly there and well expressed by Chuck Keller, RI President in 1987-89. Chuck said "Keep three central truths in mind: First, service to others is the essence of Rotary, the very foundation of our unity. Second, this unity is stronger than the enormous diversity that surrounds us. And third, peace is the single greatest imperative of our time". It is not surprising that Rotary's theme in Chuck Keller's year as RI President was Rotarians – United in Service – dedicated to Peace.

Just as it has taken on the challenge of eradicating polio (which of itself is a major contributor to world peace) Rotary continues to make a practical contribution to world peace through the establishment of the Rotary Centers for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution. This program came to fruition in 2002 and has been supported by

District 9800 from the outset. In fact our district is the only district in the Rotary world to have had at least one Peace Scholar nominated to the program every year. To date we have successfully nominated 27 Scholars out of a total of 1057 scholars who have completed either the Master's degree course or the Professional Development Certificate course.

As we move forward to challenges this new year brings, I am reminded of some of the wisdom that the Archbishop has shared that I turn to when I am in need of some inspiration.

1. "If you are neutral in situations of injustice, you have chosen the side of the oppressor."

2. "Without forgiveness, there can be no future for a relationship between individuals or within and between nations."

3. "Religion is like a knife: you can either use it to cut bread, or stick in someone's back."

4. "Resentment and anger are bad for your blood pressure and your digestion."

5. "Do your little bit of good where you are; it's those little bits of good that overwhelm the world."

6. "Hope is being able to see there is light despite all of the darkness."

7. "Don't raise your voice, improve your argument."

9. "Differences are not intended to separate, to alienate. We are different precisely in order to realize our need of one another."


