


Three reasons to strengthen Rotary's image

Over the past two years, Rotary has undertaken an unprecedented amount of research to study the effectiveness of how we communicate with each other and also to look at perceptions about the organization from the community at large.

What's likely not surprising is that we determined we have all of the strengths necessary for greatness in our second century of service. However, when we looked at awareness about our organization in the greater public arena, they quite simply don't know about us. It is very easy to ask the question – how can this be true?

Global research shows that when asked – four in 10 people have never heard of us, another four know us in name only, and the remaining two only have some familiarity, which is often colored by misconceptions. How can we attract and engage new members and partners when they don't know who we are?

Personally, I think that in order to keep Rotary relevant and enticing for the next 100 years, we need to be innovative, forward thinking, and adaptable to ensure that the rest of the world views us the way we view ourselves. Here's what I like most about the Strengthening Rotary initiative:

1. It helps us explain who we are, what we do, and why we matter.

Through this process, we have introduced a new framework to help Rotarians better define who we are when asked the inevitable question – what is Rotary? We Join Leaders – Exchange Ideas and Take Action. Of course each Rotarian's story is different but if we could highlight the common ground, it begins to form a compelling call to action. We are leaders who act responsibly and take action to tackle some of the world's most pressing challenges. When we are all singing off the same song

sheet our message is amplified and it becomes much easier to engage people in Rotary.

2. It helps us present a strong, unified image to the public

For so long we did our good work quietly and not for recognition. While this was noble it made it difficult for people to understand the good work of Rotarians. Now that "telling our story" has become a priority, we need to make sure that we have a united voice.

An exciting new visual identity kit and guidelines have been launched and they provide tools for individuals, clubs, and districts to create a look that begins to introduce continuity across the globe. Of course, there remains room for personal creativity but a unified look and feel will propel Rotary into a very bright future. Everyone will know who we are, what we do and why it matters!

If you've visited rotary.org within the past few months, you've probably noticed evidence of this initiative in the form of simpler, more action-oriented words and visuals. I am also so heartened to see the materials that Rotarians are creating with these new tools. They are stunning and I have heard from countless Rotarians that they love the fresh new look and feel.

3. It will help us attract new members and supporters

Strengthening Rotary is essential to Rotary's future. As we share our story in a more clear and compelling way, like-minded people are going to want to be part of our great organization. This really is one of our best membership opportunities. In the end, if we can elevate awareness and attract and engage new members and partners, our good work will spread and "doing good in the world" will not only remain our organizational compass but it will help us soar to new heights.

Charities' fund-raising costs swallow millions in donations

Some of Australia's biggest charities are spending almost half their donations on fund-raising, a Fairfax Media investigation has revealed.

Analysis of the performance of 15 well-known charities shows some are spending up to 40¢ in every donated dollar on fund-raising, while others are spending less than 5¢.

But there are few guidelines in a sector facing significant uncertainty as the Coalition dismantles the former government's Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission, which was intended to be a charities watchdog, in favour of a "centre for excellence".

The Make-A-Wish Foundation of Australia received more than \$12.8 million in donations last year but spent \$5.2 million, or 41¢ in the

dollar, on fund-raising, marketing and communications. After other expenses, only 54¢ in the donated dollar went to granting the wishes of sick children.

Chief executive Gerard Menses said the charity's financial position had improved and it had granted 501 wishes in 2013.


"We do aim to keep the cost of fund-raising as low as possible to ensure the maximum amount can be spent on life-changing wishes," Mr Menses said.

The National Heart Foundation raised more than \$51 million in 2012, but spent more than \$20 million on fundraising, \$8 million more than it put towards research. Other revenue went towards health programs.

At the opposite end of the spectrum, global charity World Vision spent 11¢ in the dollar on fund-raising, the McGrath Foundation spent 9¢ and the humanitarian arm of the Red Cross spent 4¢.

The big differences in the cost of fund-raising are partly the result of no clear accounting guideline as to which costs should be classified as fund-raising expenses and administration.

Make-A-Wish, for example, includes marketing as part of the cost of fund-raising whereas the National Breast Cancer Foundation includes marketing, communications



and speakers as a separate category, not included in its fund-raising costs. It spent an additional \$1.05 million on these costs in the year to June.

In addition, larger charities may also be able to share costs across different branches.

Philanthropy Australia chief executive Louise Walsh said not all charities were transparent with their financial data, putting the onus on donors to do their own research.

"A lot of annual reviews and annual reports are not as strong as they should be and not all of them are user friendly," she said. "We would like to see a lot more information on the public record, particularly around the financial side of it."

The federal government failed in its bid to delay the introduction of the Charities Act this month, with the new laws to take effect on January 1.

The act provides a new definition of a charity, which is not required to pay income tax.

Social Services Minister Kevin Andrews will begin consultations over the repeal of the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission in February, a move that has already met resistance from the charity sector and the Greens.

Linda Lavarch, chairwoman of the Not-For-Profit Sector Reform Council, said the abolition of the ACNC and

potential repeal of the Charities Act would result in less accountability.

In many cases, detailed data on a charity's performance, including spending on executive pay, can be obtained only by paying for reports filed with the Australian Securities and Investments Commission.

CanTeen, which supports young people with cancer, raised \$24 million in the year to March 31 and spent 38¢ in the dollar on fund-raising. But the charity said that for every \$1 it invested in its regular giving program, it got \$3 back over three years.

Peter Orchard, CanTeen's chief executive, said the charity was reviewing its internal operations to cut costs. He made 16 people redundant when he took over the top job last March.

"It is ... important to compare charities that do similar work," he said. "CanTeen, for example, delivers services in Australia, which involves very different costs to that of a charity funding overseas aid."

The chief executive of the Fundraising Institute of Australia, Rob Edwards, said donors chose to support charities "for the difference they can make to their beneficiaries, not how little they spend achieving it".

"There are currently no clear definitions to guide

charities on which costs should be classified as servicerelated or administration and the sector is working with government to introduce an agreed accounting standard," Mr Edwards said.

HOW DOES OUR ROTARY STACK UP?

The maxim from Rotary is that "No Fundraising is used for admin", certainly it's a "rule" that we like to apply ie: membership dues covers meeting costs plus a bit, but it is evident that administration expenses are creeping in.

Foundation for example is supposed to keep all moneys for three years (keeps the interest earned) and returns it all three years later.

RAWCS take 3% to cover costs on new projects after July 1, 2012 and will charge existing from July 1, 2015. But only on donations from Corporates and Foundations.

Perhpas the message is that Rotary Clubs need to look carefully at who they donate money to.





Model United Nations Assembly DATES UPDATED FOR 2014

The dates for the 2014 MUNA are from Friday 2nd May till Sunday 4th May 2014 and the venue is the district's own Camp Getaway in Axedale.

For those that don't know what MUNA is, it stands for Model United Nations Assembly, which simulates the workings of the UN Assembly by having teams of two students represent a particular UN country in debates on matters of world political and social concern. The students dress to represent their country and they always have a stimulating and fun time.

The program targets year 10 and 11 students (most are year 11).

The MUNA committee now encourages any Rotary Exchange Student who may like to participate by allowing them to be added to form a 3rd member of a team at a special discounted price.

The cost of the program for 2013 was \$285/person and \$150 for a an Exchange Student added as a 3rd member. There may be a small increase next year. A bus is provided at a small cost to assist clubs in getting their

teams up there on the Friday evening.

Depending on the number of teams participating either 1 or 2 winning teams will be sent on to the National Assembly held each August at the Old Parliament House in Canberra. Over recent years our district's teams have had excellent success there. The cost of that prize to Canberra is fully covered by the initial entry fees so if your team does win the District 9800 MUNA you do not need to contribute any further funds for the Canberra Assembly.

There are quite a few clubs that participate each year by sponsoring a team from a school they have developed strong relationships with. There are also clubs that have rarely or never participated in this great program and we suspect that in some cases that it is because they have difficulty in seeking out a team. We would love to get clubs involved that have not participated in recent years so if finding the students is your problem then let us know and we may be able to help out.

ROTARY TO BRING THE WORLD TO SYDNEY

Sydney (10 October 2013) – Sydney to host Rotary International's 105th annual convention 1-4 June 2014, which is expected to attract more than 18,000 Rotary club members from over 150 countries while injecting an estimated AUD 60.5 million into the local economy.

Often described as a "mini-United Nations" because of its global scope and cultural diversity, the always-colourful Rotary convention will transform the Sydney Olympic Park into a kaleidoscope of energy, colour and excitement as Rotary brings together its global network of volunteer leaders — men and women from all walks of life dedicated to tackling the world's most pressing humanitarian challenges — to engage in a full agenda of plenary sessions, workshops and a lineup of world class keynote speakers.

"Sydney is a vibrant international hub as well as a gateway between East and West," said 2013-14 Rotary International President Ron D. Burton. "It is the perfect venue for our convention as we celebrate and share the many ways our members have found to use the resources of Rotary to improve the lives of

families worldwide."

Organized by Rotary International in conjunction with the Sydney Host Organizing Committee of local Rotary leaders, with significant support from the New South Wales Government, the convention also will provide registrants with ample opportunities to savor

NELSON MANDELA REMEMBERED AS AN ALLY FOR PEACE, POLIO ERADICATION

In 1996, routine polio immunizations in Nigeria and other African countries were anything but routine. Competing health priorities and lack of funding hampered many governments from putting polio eradication high on their agenda. The drive for a polio-free Africa needed a playmaker.


Enter Nelson Mandela. Herb Brown, Rotary's president in 1995-96, recalls seeking the South African leader's support.

"President Mandela was so gracious and listened as we described the problem," Brown says. "I told him only he had the influence to persuade the countries to resume immunization."

Mandela agreed to help. "I'm well aware of Rotary and all the work you've done, and all the work you did while I was in jail," he told Brown. At a press conference, with Brown at his side, Mandela asked all the heads of state in Africa to open their doors to polio National Immunization Days.

Mandela helped launch the Kick Polio Out of Africa campaign later that year with 1996-97 Rotary President Luis Giay and Rotary Foundation Chair Rajendra Saboo. Almost immediately, Africa's polio eradication effort was back on track. Using soccer matches and celebrity endorsements, the campaign raised public awareness of polio and helped spur more than 30 African countries to hold their first National Immunization Days.

In recognition of his vital work, Rotary presented the Rotary Award for World Understanding to Mandela in 1997, then Rotary's highest honor. "We chose President Mandela because of his significant

contributions to world peace, human rights, and freedom," said Giay, adding that Rotary members especially appreciated "his strong support of the eradication of polio throughout Africa."

Mandela called the award "a tribute to the people of South Africa's rainbow nation." Rotary's work toward eradicating polio "has shown the power of a global network of people who are ready to roll up their sleeves and put their heart and soul into saving children from disability."

Mandela donated the award's \$100,000 prize to the Nelson Mandela Children's Fund.

Following his death, Rotary members in South Africa lauded Mandela as "one of the 20th century's iconic symbols of freedom and equality," "the father of the nation," and "a leader of service."

"Mandela was a man who overcame unimaginable hardships to emerge as one of the greatest leaders of our time — and one of our greatest humanitarians [His] legacy of courage, determination, and

commitment will forever inspire us to move forward in our effort to achieve a better, more peaceful world," said Rotary President Ron Burton.

Based on the true story of the greatest treasure hunt in history, The Monuments Men focuses on an unlikely World War II platoon, tasked by FDR with going into Germany to rescue artistic masterpieces from Nazi thieves and returning them to their rightful owners. 

Hobson's Bay Cluster

Hobson's Bay Cluster has six established and active Rotary Clubs being: Flemington, Point Gellibrand, Footscray, West Footscray, Williamstown and Yarraville.

This pocket of Western Suburb Clubs does our District and the Rotary movement proud having, in each club, a strong and well led membership of active, dedicated and keen Rotarians, and families of volunteers sharing the basic philosophy of "Service above Self".

Just some of the projects and events completed this Rotary year to date include the following highlights. Please enjoy reading the submissions from these clubs:

FLEMINGTON



RoadSTART is a program to assist new arrivals gain a driving licence.

For many of these new Australians their general road experience is limited, making the need to gain considerable road experience essential to acquire the skills to successfully pass their driving licence.

However, few have the family and friend network that ensures a supervising driver and a suitable car is readily available for them to gain the required experiences.

It was apparent from the outset that even more hours than the 120 stipulated under the L2P program would be required by most of the intended target audience. With a grant from the Department of Roads and Transport and support from The Flemington Bendigo Community

Bank, City Link, Moonee Valley City Council and our own Flemington Rotary Club the program came into being in 2012.

Due to the grants, learners are able to receive an hour driving in one of the two purpose bought cars with a supervisor for \$15. Of this, \$5 is retained for fuel and the \$10 balance is given to the supervisor.

It was envisaged that licenced but under-employed migrants would be attracted to this role as it generated a little extra spending money. The reality is that the supervisors have come from many backgrounds. All are given training before being matched with learner's.

In addition, the learner's program starts with fully paid lessons and an ongoing assessment from an RACV Driving Instructor to determine the learner's readiness to graduate from driving in a car park to quiet streets to peak hour traffic and finally on the Ring Road.

Key to this program are the volunteer supervisors. We need more!

FOOTSCRAY



Since 1991, each year, Dr. Jamie Robertson, a member of Rotary Club of Footscray, takes a team of professionals including general dentists, specialists, dental assistants and allied personnel to Vietnam and spends two weeks doing voluntary work in the city and countryside and help/educate many people including children in dental heath related problems.

This year Dr. Robertson was asked to start a similar project in Ethiopia and subsequently a district grant was approved for a scoping visit to Ethiopia.

Recently, Dr. Robertson and his team went to Addis Ababa, Ethiopia to survey the current health of children's teeth, assess the socioeconomic circumstances, the school's human development curriculum, the facilities for a school-based program and the present access to care for children and general people in the area.

After analysing different factors, including the collected samples, a future project will be considered for Ethiopia.

POINT GELLIBRAND



I am pleased to report on the success of the breakfast meeting held on October 29, to raise money for Breast Cancer Research.

The function was well supported with nearly 160 guests in attendance.

The venue, the Royal Yacht Club of Victoria, was ideal and we owe much gratitude to the staff who started very early preparing a breakfast that was enjoyed by all present.

The function was started by an idea of Fay Lanyons, the lolly lady, and raised \$7300 for the cause.

Over the last three years the breakfast has now raised \$26,000 and this has all gone to the Walter and Eliza Hall Institude and the National Breast Cancer Foundation.





We had many sponsors and their contribution was a big part of the final result. Some have been with us for the three years.

We are also grateful to our guest speaker, Terry Bracks, who's presentation complimented the mood of the event and her wisdom was well accepted.

We will repeat the function next year, probably in school holidays.

Sincerest thanks to our guests and speaker and those guys from our Rotary club that assisted by attending to the tables.

WEST FOOTSCRAY



Early in 2013, the Rotary Club became involved with the Aboriginal Literacy Foundation based in Melbourne which distributes primary school aged reading materials to Aboriginal communities throughout Australia.

The involvement was in partnership with a private Company R2A Pty Ltd. We each contributed \$5,000 and gained a grant of \$2,500 from Rotary Foundation. Approximately 400 children received a reading parcel.

The idea is to provide reading materials to the young Aboriginal children, especially in remote communities where they may not receive the resources to learn. The children's skills are measured at the start of the project and monitored as they progress.

By getting the younger children to learn to read, it follows that they then learn to write and the socioeconomic community levels also improve. The Aboriginal Literacy Foundation also conducts Learning

and Cultural camps regularly at Ballarat in which the Club participates.

WILLIAMSTOWN



Raised Garden Beds

This is an initiative from one of our Rotarians, Paul Richards, who has been liasing with the local Hobsons Bay Council over the last two years. The idea behind it is to help elderly or people with disabilities to be able to garden at a height that is easy for them, so they do not have to bend down to the ground.

The council has been funding the project with money for paint, potting mix and the plastic for the insert. Rotary has been providing the wooden pallets and manpower to construct the units and the painting of the garden beds.

We started by erecting these raised garden beds in local community centres, then with the council selecting appropriate candidates we have started putting them into peoples gardens, so they may continue to enjoy their gardening, plus hopefully grow a few vegetables that will help their budgets and enjoyment of food.

Children's Christmas Fair



We have had the Children's Christmas Fair twice now, held at Seaworks, Williamstown. It is a Great community event, held at the beginning of December. The idea is to encourage the local community to come together and enjoy a fun day with the kids.

The cost is a gold coin for adults, free for children. There are free rides, face painting, jumping castle, petting animal nursery, clowns with balloons and of course Santa.

We do look for sponsors but mainly the Rotary Club has funded the event so far, it would be great to become a self funding event but even if it doesn't it is a great community event and puts the Rotary name out into the community.

We of course have a BBQ which is fundraising, so that helps the cost but the main thing is that it is a whole club event that everyone can be involved with.

YARRAVILLE



The Rotary Club of Yarraville was chartered in September 2003, so this September we celebrated our tenth anniversary of Charter in the manner with which we started: we held a fund-raiser to support a local child in need.

Five-year-old Owen has multiple disabilities, and requires a set of sophisticated equipment to participate in mainstream schooling next year. With the pro bono help of comedian Dave O'Neil, Yarraville Rotary raised \$6.5K through a September 10 "Event for Owen".

The club maintained its usual schedule of BBQ fund-raising and support for key local events like the Yarraville Festival and Relay for Life, but also participated in a Cluster initiative to fund the construction of school toilet blocks in Bangladesh.





NEW TRAINING SEMINARS

Dear Rotary Leaders,

In January 2013 Rotary International President Ron Burton 2013-2014 stated: "Rotary, just like in nearly every other aspect of life provides return for effort, for whatever you put in you shall be rewarded in return".

The District 9800 Training team, our Learning and Development Committee along with the delivery of the District's training Programs of Rotary Leadership Institute, District Assembly and Presidents' Elect Training Seminars have developed two new short 2 hour Training Seminars for two significant portions of our Club membership. A "New Members" seminar to assist Clubs in the induction of new Rotary Club Members to assist them in their Rotary knowledge and their access to quality training and a second important Training Seminar aimed at encouraging future Club Leaders to more readily understand and undertake invitations to them to assume Leadership positions in your Rotary Club.

The "New Members Seminar" will address Members' Rotary Knowledge, Rotary's Goals and Structures and further learning opportunities all in a friendly, facilitated training environment. We know from Rotary research many new members leave our organization when they are not fully informed and in sync with what Rotary stands for and what Rotary can offer Rotary Club Members by way of service, personal development, mentoring and rewards in assisting others. I am confident the Training Team have developed a significant opportunity for Clubs to access a central training seminar to assist in the development of their newer Rotarians.

A significant problem facing many Clubs today is identifying and encouraging Club members to assume higher office, whether at Committee, Board level or at Club Leadership positions such as President. Some Clubs are facing Presidents serving for 2, 3 or more years at a time and the practice is extending due to the reluctance, inability or lack of availability of Club members to take up the various leadership positions within their Clubs.

The Learning and Development Committee has developed a 2 hour seminar to assist and encourage those members identified as Future Leaders by Clubs to appreciate the opportunities, to be aware of the support available both within and external to their Clubs and to understand the special year Rotarians have when they lead their Clubs in the various Leadership positions Clubs have to offer.

The Committee is well led by PDG Keith Ryall, a professional facilitator and Trainer himself and well supported by current District Secretary and Past President David Bennett, District Governor Nominee Julie Mason, District Programs Representative and Past President Bronwen Scarffe, all professional facilitators and/or educators.

The curriculum and facilitated discussion and delivery is designed to assist and encourage learning and development and aimed at increasing enthusiasm for Rotary service. I am hopeful the programs will serve our clubs and members well towards their individual growth and development. In recognition of the value of such development opportunities and in support of the Clubs of D9800 the District Board has determined both the introductory sessions of both Seminars in February and March will be offered at no cost to members or Clubs and covered by District 9800.

It is hoped Clubs can identify their future first-time Leaders in advance of the Club's immediate needs and encourage identified members displaying leadership potential to attend the Future Club Leaders Seminar whether they be considered for Committee or Club Leadership in the coming years.

It is my recommendation you, as current Club Leaders give your support and encouragement to the benefits of both of these short, convenient seminars and I am sure your members will develop to be more complete Rotarians for their efforts. 
Updates have not only included photos but also videos accompanied by sharp, descriptive text which has kept every Rotarian Facebook member up to date with the DGE training in San Diego.
