Brighton RC Supports DAA

In 2008, 2191 Australians committed suicide. Over three-quarters of them were male. 103 were Indigenous Australians.

President Paul Nicholson of Brighton Rotary Club Presented DG Iven Mackay with a cheque for \$3,500 for Disaster Aid Australia, on 2nd September "We sincerely thank our fellow Rotarians at Brighton – this generous donation will further allow us to provide much needed shelter and water through our



Family Survival Packs and also our long term water pack thus allowing a family safety and shelter for up to two years and clean water for ten years" Jenni Heenan, General Manager of Disaster Aid Australia said. "Without the continued support of humanitarian Australians we could deliver the aid so urgently required – we thank you, I encourage everyone to visit our website for daily updates on how we are all assisting to ease some of their pain"

Just ten weeks after launching, Disaster Aid Australia together with international partners Canada and USA which form Disaster Aid International, have pledged Family Survival Packs to assist survivors in the devastating floods of Pakistan. 100 Family Survival Packs are being flown into Pakistan with another two containers leaving next week.

An international Disaster Aid Response Team,

consisting of an Aussie, Canadian, American and Brit who are all highly experienced and have assisted in disasters, many times before, leave next week to deliver the aid.

According to the United Nations, 6 million survivors urgently require aid in the form of shelter, food and clean water. This catastrophic flooding is bigger than Haiti, the China earthquake and the Burma cyclones. The death toll has risen to 1600 and reports reveal that up to 14 million or 8 percent of the population have been disrupted or affected.

Disaster Aid Australia has another 1000 Family Survival Packs ready to deploy but they urgently need your assistance with donations to allow further assistance into Pakistan.

Working with two of the largest international humanitarian charities, they are committed to ensuring that these survivors have our help in the form of Family Survival Packs and clean water systems through their partner the SkyJuice Foundation.

All donations are tax deductible and totally trackable – all donors of Family Survival Packs and water systems will receive a photograph of those who receive their valued contribution through a donation together with recognition on the website and a certificate.

Jenni Heenan, General Manager of Disaster Aid Australia said "A donation of \$800 for a Family Survival Pack ensures a family to be together in the security of a tent and all the relevant items in the box to start over with some dignity. A donation of \$5,000 will allow up to 10,000 litres of clean water a day for ten years."

"We can only deliver the aid with your support and we all know how generous Australians (and especially our fellow Rotarians) are to the plight of those far less fortunate" Jenni said.

Indian School Children Inspire

More than 120,000 school children in RI District 3020 (part of Andhra Pradesh, India) joined together to raise US\$115,000 for Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge. Mobilised by Rotary clubs, the students obtained donations from parents, neighbours, and others in their communities.

Kishore Cherukumalli, 2009-10 governor of District 3020, came up with the project idea, believing that the public should participate in and contribute to making India polio-free. The effort spread public awareness of both polio eradication and Rotary. "People started telephoning Rotarians [to say] that they were hitherto not aware of the good work done by Rotary," says Rotary Foundation Trustee Ashok Mahajan. "The management of the schools that the Rotarians approached were more than willing to be our partner and thanked Rotary for giving them the opportunity to contribute to the cause. Parents called Rotarians to know more about Rotary, some showing interest to join Rotary."Two festive music night fundraisers organised by Rotarians netted an additional \$30,000 for the challenge.

Burrito Del Mar

Relish Recipe Tip

INGREDIENTS

3 medium tomatoes, peeled and diced 1 medium green capsicum, finely diced 1 small brown onion, finely diced 1/4 cup roughly chopped coriander 1 cup tomato puree $3 \frac{1}{2} \text{ tsp salt}$ 1 tbsp jalapeno chillies (optional) 170g butter 170g chopped brown onion 170g plain flour 750 ml warm milk 1 tbsp jalapeno chillies 1kg green prawns, peeled and deveined 750g scallops 10 flour tortillas 150g cheese (prefereably Egmont) grated



METHOD

2 spring onions, finely sliced

Prepare a salsa cruda the day before or at least a few hours before serving to allow the flavours to mingle. Place the tomatoes, capsicum, onion, coriander, tomato puree, 2 teaspoons of the salt and the chillies (if desired) in a bowl and mix well. Depending on how much juice is in the tomatoes, it may be necessary to add a little water to obtain the desired consistency. Cover and refrigerate until ready to use. Preheat a convection oven to 180C. Melt the butter in a pan over a low heat and sauté the onion until soft. Remove from the heat and blend in the flour to make a roux. Return to the heat and slowly stir in the warm milk, salsa cruda, salt and jalapenos. When the sauce comes to a boil and thickens, remove from the heat and gently fold in the prawns and scallops. Place a tortilla on each serving plate. Keeping aside about 300g of the seafood mixture, ladle even quantities of the remaining mixture along the middle of each tortilla, including about 5 prawns and 3 scallops per serve. Fold in one end of each tortilla and roll up, leaving the other end open. Top each with 30g of the seafood mix, including some prawns and scallops. Sprinkle 1 tablespoon of the cheese along the length of each burrito. Bake in the oven for 4-5 minutes until the cheese has melted. Scatter with the spring onion and service with rice and frijoles or salad.

Serves 8-10 (1 burrito each)

RLI strongly believes that having leadership skills does not alone assure good Rotary leadership. An effective



Rotary leader must also have Rotary knowledge, perspective about where Rotary has been, where it is going and a vision of what Rotary can be.

RLI is a series of fast paced, interactive, one–day courses offered to refine a Rotarian's leadership skills and increase their base of knowledge in Rotary. Courses are fun, topical, interactive, and geared toward busy business and professional persons who want to be more effective leaders in their vocation and club and more knowledgeable Rotarians.

Courses are run by experienced, formally trained Rotarians in this district. Participants are expected to contribute their experience and ideas in facilitated discussion groups – usually 15 participants and the aim is to acquire Rotary knowledge and understanding of how Rotary operates differently in clubs and learn from these differences. The style of the courses is conversational and learning comes by sharing knowledge, ideas and opinions.

The Institute offers courses in three full day sessions - 9.00am to 3.15pm and participants must complete Part 1 before proceeding to Part 2 then graduating after completion of Part 3 however the completion of all three parts may be completed at your own timing.



They learn how Rotary operates differently in clubs and learn from these differences. It builds confidence in a Rotarian.

This multi-District leadership development program seeks to have Rotary clubs identify potential future club leaders (not necessarily as club presidents) who want to be more effective leaders in their vocation and club and increase their Rotary knowledge. RLI gives you a perspective about where Rotary has been, where it is going, and a vision of what Rotary can be.

The program consists of 3 full day sessions, which run from 9.00am to 3.15pm, held on Sundays, with venues in South

You Gave and We Delivered!

Pakistan Relief through Disaster Aid Australia

On 14 August, the need was to assist 6 million survivors who had been displaced by the catastrophic floods in Pakistan – today, the UN reported the need to assist 21 million survivors with shelter and clean water. Imagine every Australian needing a home and clean water just to survive!

Based in Islamabad, Disaster Aid Response Team (DART) team leader Larry Agee (USA) reports that the region of Khyber-Pakhtunkhawa is flattened and the devastation is the worst he has seen in five years as a humanitarian aid specialist.

"Our first tents were assembled in Chocki Town where everything was flattened except the school but the 275 students now have no school equipment" said Australian DART Peter Clouting who is on his third deployment. "The headmaster sought refuge from the floods on top of a mosque where he stayed for four days until a helicopter rescued him" he said.

"We have four DARTs on the ground in Islamabad and a further four more Australian DARTs assisting over the coming weeks with their objective to supply as much shelter and clean water to survivors as we can" Jenni Heenan, General Manager of Disaster Aid Australia said.

"Our fellow Australian Rotarians and their friends have worked together by fundraising and personal generous donations so that we could deliver what is needed – it is gratifying and humbling to know that together we are making a difference for these survivors" she said.



Today our DARTs split into two teams – one to Chaderra district and to Nowserea district where they erected Family Survival tents and then moved to Essogay . Forty homes were washed away and the village is now divided by a river.

The next 192 Family Survival Packs will assist survivors placed in government camps who at the end of the month will need to find alternative shelter.

'With two more containers leaving Shanghai next week, we will move south to the Punjab region to work with NGO's to set up more camps for survivors' Jenni said.

"Working with engineers on the ground, our DARTs are planning the placement of our SkyHydrant water solutions to provide 10,000 litres of clean drinking water a day – these should be in place in the next weeks, as the most needy areas are confirmed" she said.

Marketing Tip

This September's New Generations Month takes on a different meaning than in the past.

The commitment to getting youth and young adults actively involved in Rotary was strengthened in April when representatives at the Council on Legislation approved New Generations as the fifth Avenue of Service.

RI President Ray Klinginsmith says the new Avenue of Service improves the value of youth programs and their impact on Rotary's future.

"The Council wanted to be sure New Generations programs were given adequate attention by clubs," says Klinginsmith. "Rotarians just want to be up front and recognize the importance of these programs. New Generations isn't just important to the future of Rotary but also our communities and the world."



New Generations Service acknowledges the positive change implemented by youth and young adults involved in leadership development activities, community and international service, and exchange programs that enrich and foster world peace and cultural understanding. Programs include RYLA, Rotaract, Interact, and Rotary Youth Exchange.

"We truly have the finest youth programs in the world," says Klinginsmith. "Their intrinsic value continues to escalate. We do a great job with these

programs, we just need to give them more visibility."

This month is a chance to celebrate the new Avenue of Service, says Vicki Puliz, chair of New Generations Service for District 5190 (parts of California and Nevada, USA).

"News of the Council's decision was welcomed with excitement and enthusiasm by Rotarians in

our district," says Puliz. "We are using this as a way to emphasize how Rotary International views New Generations and its importance. It's a springboard to communicate even more with our clubs about these programs."

Virtually every club in her district is involved with one or more of the four youth programs. A wide range of district programs fall under the New Generations umbrella, says Puliz.

"Focusing more on youth is crucial for Rotary to thrive and survive," she says. "It's one of the reasons why we have programs on literacy, leadership training, and ethics for young people."

She recommends that every club appoint a New Generations Service chair. "We've learned that our youth programs benefit from communication and coordination," says Puliz.

New Generations joins Club Service, Vocational Service, Community Service, and International Service as an Avenue of Service. Before starting a project, Rotarians are asked to think broadly about how their club and its members could contribute within each avenue.

Klinginsmith says the best clubs are the ones that are well balanced.

"Strong clubs are involved in all five of the Avenues of Service," he says. "The ones that don't have New Generations programs are missing a part of the great adventure of Rotary."

Walk Every Day

Health Tip

Walking is a great way to improve your health — both mental and physical. If you can carve out some time from your busy schedule, you can design a walking program that will work for you. In planning your walking program, keep the following points in mind:

- Choose a safe place to walk. Find a partner or group of people to walk with you. Your walking partner(s) should be able to walk with you on the same schedule and at the same speed.
- Wear shoes with thick, flexible soles that will cushion your feet and absorb shock.
- Wear clothes that will keep you dry and comfortable. Look for synthetic fabrics that absorb sweat and remove it from your skin.
- For extra warmth in winter, wear a knit cap. To stay cool in summer, wear a baseball cap or visor.
- Do light stretching before and after you walk.
- Divide your walk into three parts. Begin by walking slowly for five minutes. Increase your speed for the next five minutes. Finally, to cool down, walk slowly again for five minutes.
- Try to walk at least three times per week. Add two
 to three minutes per week to the fast walk. If you
 walk fewer than three times per week, lengthen
 the fast walk more slowly.
- To avoid stiff or sore muscles or joints, start gradually. Over several weeks, begin walking faster, going farther, and walking for longer periods of time.
- The more you walk, the better you will feel. You will also burn more calories.

The Science Experience is three days of fun science activities for Years 9 & 10 students. The program is designed to provide students who have an interest in science with an opportunity to engage in a wide range of fascinating science activities under the guidance of scientists.

The program takes place in universities and tertiary institutions where students perform experiments, meet and hear senior lecturers in lecture theatres, attend site visits and experience what it is like to be on campus of a university or tertiary institution. The program also provides information about further studies in science, technology and engineering, and it highlights the wide range of careers available, as well as giving participants the opportunity to meet and share ideas with students from different schools.

Youth Suicide

In Australia, young people are the only group whose health has not improved over the past three decades. Suicide is the largest single cause of death of teenagers, and represents 19% of all deaths between the ages of 10 and 24. Sadly for each reported suicide, there are more than twenty suicide attempts in this age group. Its causes remain perplexingly complex, but common risk factors can be identified. Many victims have experienced bullying at school. Most have never received any form of counseling. More than one third has experimented with illicit and prescribed drugs. Many have come into contact with the police. Significantly, more than half have experienced a recent break-up in a relationship with a boyfriend or girlfriend. More than 75% of all mental health problems manifest themselves before the age of twenty five, so it is critical that an approach based on early intervention is taken.

Many Rotary Clubs in District 9800 and beyond have acknowledged this need, providing financial support to the Centre for Adolescent Health where no fewer than 8 major research projects with immediate relevance to youth suicide are underway or have recently been completed.

This ground-breaking research informs staff providing a Graduate Diploma in Adolescent Health and Welfare for professionals who work directly with young people and who, at the completion of the two year program are better prepared to recognize, and deal with, the early warning signs of mental ill-health within the communities of young people with whom they work.



Since 1996, your Youth Suicide Awareness Committee has sought funding from Rotary Clubs for teachers, police officers, youth and social workers, school nurses and corrections officers to complete this course of study. The course is administered by the University of Melbourne and the Centre has close ties with the Royal Children's Hospital. While the treatment of mental health illness is a key component of the work at the Centre, the emphasis is primarily on young people in the settings in which they live and work – not in psychiatric clinics. The Centre's primary focus is upon early interventions, providing a holistic and practical approach that professionals can use in their work-places.

Since its inception in 1996, more than 120 graduates have received scholarships or financial support from Rotary. It is pleasing to report that more than 30 graduates are Victoria Police officers, many of whom have been supported by the Rotary Club of Central Melbourne Sunrise through the Silk-Miller Scholarship. The Rotary Clubs of Camberwell, Canterbury, Brighton North, Brighton Beach, Altona Central are among those who consistently make this a part of their New Generations' spend. The Rotary Club of Brighton North is committing more than \$30,000.00 to funding scholarships over the next three years and is seeking suitable candidates. It would like very much to support professionals who are working within indigenous communities in Victoria.




Membership Report to DLT - September 9th 2010

Vocational Training Team in Timor Leste

Vocational Training Team visit to Timor Leste to ascertain the need for a project to provide a post graduate maternity refresher and up-skilling programme August 23rd to 30th 2010.

A Vocational Training Team visited Timor Leste in August 2010, to ascertain the need for a project to provide a post graduate maternity refresher and upskilling programme.



Timor Leste has currently a maternal mortality rate that is approximately 80 times greater than that of developed countries such as Australia.

Under the Foundation,Äôs Vocational Training Team Programme a proposal was made to offer and develop a refresher and up-skilling training programme aimed at midwives and medical practitioners providing maternity care in Timor Leste. A team consisting of District 9800 Rotarians visited Dili and Baucau in Timor Leste to investigate the best format for a refresher programme for maternity service providers that would meet the needs of the country.

The team met with a wide spread of the key personnel and organisations involved in the provision of maternity and child health services with the government, training institutions, health care providers and NGOs.

Joseph's Corner

The Sisters of St Joseph were founded by Sr Mary McKillop. Following in their founder's footsteps the Order operates three counselling centres and their work is non-government funded.

The Joseph's Corner service focus is on providing free individual, relationship, family and group psychological counselling to family and friends of people with drug and alcohol addictions.



Through the work of co-ordinator Sr. Jeanne Dwyer, these counselling centres provide support and counselling to families traumatised by drug and alcohol addicted members. The Joseph's Corner program encourages participants to re-establish interests and connections with their community.

To support the Counselling Centres, Sr. Jeanne runs an Op Shop in the suburb of Yarraville, but is struggling to keep the Centres afloat with the rising costs of all services and rent.

The Interact Club of Winston School San Antonio, Texas, USA, has been setting lofty goals for itself for 15 years. Though Interact clubs are asked to complete at least two service projects each year, the Winston School Interactors carried out 55 projects and logged close to 2,000 volunteer hours in 2009. All that hard work hasn't gone unnoticed. The City of San Antonio recognised the club with the Mayor's Award for outstanding community service by a youth group.

"I'm extremely proud of the many successful projects our students have completed over the years," says Charles Karulak, headmaster of the Winston School and a member of the Rotary Club of Boerne Sunrise. "Our Interactors have forged a positive reputation in the community. Often, local organisations will contact the club to ask for support on projects."

The private school serves students with learning disabilities from kindergarten through 12th grade. The high school grades have about 75 students total, most of whom are Interactors. Michael Canales, a member of the Rotary Club of San Antonio North Central, says it's remarkable that a school so small can have such a positive impact.

"It's not unusual for an Interactor to participate in an athletic game on Friday night and then report to an Interact project the next day," says Canales, a Spanish teacher at the Winston School and Interact chair for District 5840. "These young men and women give so much of their personal time to the community."

The Winston School Interactors have volunteered at a local soup kitchen and conducted fundraising drives for the battered women's shelter, the Animal Defense League, and an orphanage in Peru.

In 2008, the club collected \$2,700 in 10 days to help the city's food bank feed victims of Hurricane Ike, which devastated coastal towns in Texas.

The Interactors have also made three trips to the Casa de Misericordia orphanage in Piedras Negras, Mexico, delivering supplies requested by the children

"The Interactors spent the entire day with these children, giving the more important gift: their compassion," Canales says.

Club members also spend a day every year assisting terminally ill children from Cuidad Acuña, Mexico, who come to visit SeaWorld adventure park. The Interact club works with the Boerne Sunrise club, which brings the children to San Antonio.

Canales says that international service gives Interactors a new perspective.

"Students in the U.S. want immediate gratification. Interact exposes them to those who don't have the luxury of getting what they want," he explains. "Interactors start thinking less about themselves and more about those in need. They reap tremendous benefits from international projects."

Canales says the entire school has embraced the principles and standards of Rotary. The Four-Way Test is posted in all the classrooms.

"The impact of Interact on our students has been tremendous," Karulak says. Through teamwork, public speaking opportunities, and service to others, "the program has provided opportunities for students to develop and grow."





RC Keilor Hosts Harold Mitchell



Harold Mitchell may be well known as a media guru but he is also a generous benefactor and fundraiser. He was recently guest speaker at the RC Keilor, thanks to their energetic and enterprising President, David Bourke. As part of the Club's 'new members drive' they are introducing speakers of note on their program this year. These evenings are seen to provide an opportunity for members to invite special guests along where they learn about and experience Rotary as well. Over 90 people gathered at the Keilor RSL to hear Harold Mitchell speak on a range of topics from the state of the nation and global economics, to refugees, population growth, Boomers, Gen Y's, youth initiatives, climate change ...and the Rotary organisation.

Awarded the Officer of Australia for support of cultural and artistic endeavours, he launched the philanthropic Harold Mitchell Foundation in 2000 which funds the Arts and Health initiatives. The founder of one of Australia's largest advertising groups, Mitchell Communications Group Ltd, which recently sold for \$363 million, he is also a director of several media companies and the owner of Stadia Media. Add to this his many and varied community roles.

Son of a sawmiller and himself a labourer in a sawmill, Mitchell didn't finish high school. 'You make your own luck', he stated. 'If you're not moving forward then you're moving backwards — well that's how I live my life', he added. The Boomers were the happiest healthiest generation in our history and just wanted their kids to do well, Mitchell claimed; 'we'll be the last generation to see our kids having more

than their parents did'. It's a fact, he said, that our kids and grandkids have been encouraged to borrow and now have a 'borrow' attitude. He also stated that soon there'll be one person to keep three and claimed that universities are not turning out smart graduates as in the past. Mitchell told us not to be afraid of population growth but to build on it, while making sure that there are facilities in the Regional areas (neglected by successive State governments he stated) because our cities can't accommodate a bigger population. Broadband, global warning, the rising cost of living, job creation for young people and encouraging them to want to work, building more hospitals, multiculturalism, skilled integration, the environment, elections and an openness to new ideas - all were touched on with Mitchell's candour. Even without Kevin Rudd: 'he stopped leading as he loved the idea of managing'!

Harold Mitchell is dedicated to improving life for the people of Timor in particular and PNG. He congratulated Rotary on its involvement in East Timor and impressed upon us the need for Rotary to continue its work in this struggling region. He also noted the age group of the Rotarians present while congratulating them, and the Rotary organisation itself, on their combined dedication and effectiveness in improving the lives of others in the world. He urged us to continue to constantly review Rotary practises and formats with a positive and professional eye. To always keep Rotary focussed on the future with changes that make it attractive to the 25-40 age groups. 'It's imperative to build on the membership and support base and to not lose focus on this.' And: 'Being a Rotarian and a volunteer is not enough. Rotarians all have a duty to be mindful of the future of Rotary.'

In conclusion Mitchell impressed upon his attentive and appreciative audience that 'Australia is an extremely attractive place to live and we need good people to facilitate great opportunities'.

Writing for Networker

Imagine This Task...

- Imagine you had to review 70 A4 pages of text.
- Imagine you then that you had to condense these 70 pages down to 10 pages, summarising, correcting for spelling mistakes and verifying information from the original author.
- Then imagine formatting each of these pages, pairing pictures to the different pieces of text.

Now imagine you had to do this regularly.

...On top of your everyday work.

Sound like a lot? It is.

As you probably know, Networker, like virtually every Rotary project, is a volunteer endeavour.

That's why Networker needs your help to make a big job just a little easier. And that's why Networker is introducing a NEW submission form to standardise submissions.

What We Need In Every Submission:

The Article, written in 9 point Arial font, in MS Word format.

This article can be as long as you like – it will be hyperlinked – however keep in mind the interest of your reader. The longer it is, the less likely others are to read it. Use sub-titles throughout the article to give it context and to ensure it remains compelling. An article in PDF format is not easy to edit for the web with our software – please use MS Word!

A 200-250 word Synopsis of the Article:

This should be like a shortened version of the article which gives the critical information from which others will choose whether to read the extended article. Use the same format as for the article itself.

A 30-40 word Abstract of the Article:

From your Synopsis, write condense this further and explain it in layman's terms – what is your project, effort, news or event all about in the shortest length possible. Essentially, this should be what you would tell someone if you were describing your project in

one breath to another person!

Pictures in jpg or gif format, cropped to 164px x 151px (width x height) and original resolution.

Attach these as separate files in jpg or gif format. Files embedded in a word document need to taken out, copied into a graphics program and resaved. This takes time – please help us out! If you can attach the file in both original (high resolution) format, and 164 x 151 sizes, we then have both our thumbnail and picture for the article. Photoshopping to make your pictures more interesting or eye catching is encouraged!

You can attach several pictures – remember to include any logos and aim for action shots – will a posed picture really tell the story or differentiate your project as exciting?

Events – Extra information

We need all the information as per a regular article (cited above) for events, plus the following details:

- Event Date and Time
- Event Title
- Event Location
- Event Cost
- · RSVP Date and Contact Details
- Website or link for more information
- Other Critical Event Information

A True Blue Minestrone

Relish Recipe Tip

INGREDIENTS

40g fresh basil leaves 50g+ freshly grated parmesan 50g pine nuts 4 garlic cloves, roughly chopped olive oil

sea salt and freshly ground pepper

1 large onion, chopped

1 leek, diced

1 celery stalk. diced

1 medium carrot, diced

3 rindless bacon rashers, diced

1 medium-large zucchini, diced

1/2 small green cabbage, ribs removed and shredded

1 medium-large potato, peeled and diced

2 X 400g cans diced tomatoes

1 can cannellini beans, rinsed and drained

2 litres chicken stock



METHOD

To make the basil pesto, whiz up the basil, 50 g Parmesan, pine nuts, 2 crushed garlic cloves, 70 ml oil and a little ground pepper in a food processor until well combined. Taste for seasoning and set aside.

Heat a little oil in a heavy-bottomed pan and gently saute the onion, leek, celery, carrot, bacon, and the remaining garlic until fairly tender and lightly coloured, and the bacon is cooked through.

Then add the zucchini, cabbage, potato and tomatoes. Stir and gently cook for another 5 minutes.

Add the Cannellini beans, pasta, stock and seasonings. Mix well and simmer until the pasta is tender, adding more stock if needed. Taste for seasoning.

Serve with a large dollop of the pesto and extra Parmesan sprinkled on top, and good crusty bread on the side.

Serves 8

Trip to Cambodia

The RC Elsternwick team arrived late evening at ACE in Phnom Penh to a huge welcome and enthusiastic presentation by the ACE students.

The following day saw us visit the remaining slums that had not been demolished yet. The kindergarten was cancelled that day because one child was taken to hospital by the teacher. We chaperoned the rest of the kids to a playground in town.

That afternoon saw us all visit Rudi Boa school near where the relocated students now live. It is the equivalent of going to school in a garage next to Craigieburn tip. Later that night we endured 3 hours of terror driving from Phnom Penh to Khompong Tom where Saing Sy school is situated.

The first day, we acclimatised with a visit to the school and Mous Village. Mous is a derogatory term referring to the presence of mosquitoes in the vicinity. The residents of Mous Village were relocated here when a road was built through their previous homes. The Saing Sy school was built for these people. They are very poor and live in squalid conditions. Families often number up to 9 or 10. The children are beautiful and pre CKF, they died at the rate of 3 or 4 per month. It is a real privilege to spend time with these people in their homes.

That same day Johnny Mac came up with an engineering solution to a problem which threatened the progress of the building of the new classroom. Work continued.

Now we had to move fill in so that a slab could be laid for the classroom. We helped move truckloads of dirt by hand using woven baskets in 36C heat and 100% humidity.

We could barely move at all the next day, so we started design work on the playground. Two days later we had a brief, scope, specifications and a scaled drawing of a playground 38 metres long by 12 metres wide.

Meetings with the preferred tenderer followed and construction commenced soon after we left for VietNam.



The send off from Saing Sy is something we will never forget.

The Saing Sy school that Bill Stoney was referring to in Phnom Penh was built by the Cambodian Kids Foundation (CKF). THE CKF is the brainchild of Rotarian Donna Cooper who is now a member of the Rotary Club of Elsternwick. When Donna became a member, of our club we adopted the school as our project and our \$3000 contribution greatly assisted the construction of the school. So much so, one of the rooms in the school is named "Elsternwick."

Papua New Guinea (PNG) have introduced an outcomes based schooling curriculum from 2003. Unfortunately this curriculum has had little support or training from those who have introduced it. In the Western Highlands province, a group of teachers formed the PNG Teachers Club and have taken it upon themselves to learn this curriculum in any way they can. After a short trip to Sydney last year and now an extended trip to Melbourne this month, 16 teachers from the PNG teachers club have a much clearer idea of the advantages and merits of such a curriculum. They now go home to "spread the word" to the teachers of the Western Highlands province of PNG.

The Rotary club of Laverton Point Cook with the assistance of Wyndham Rotary sent the teachers to 6 Victorian schools as well as the Victorian Curriculum and Assessment Authority (VCAA). They were hosted by members of both clubs and managed to include some sightseeing during their time here. The teachers became members of our family and a long and fruitful relationship has sprung out of this truly international project.

Over 2,200 representatives from 70 countries attended the United Nations 63rd Annual United Nations DPI/ NGO Conference aimed at attracting support for achieving the UN Millennium Development Global Health Goals by 2015.



For experienced local Rotarians PRID Ian Risely (D9810) and Loryn Clark (D9800), attending the conference was an inspiring event. For young Rotarians from the newly chartered D9800 Rotary Club of Melbourne Park, Lauren Walton and Jessica Wheeler, it was an impressive introduction into the Rotary World. "There were many young volunteers at the conference, committed to making the world a better place," said Clark.

The Rotary workshop was entitled "Coordination of a Public-Private Health Campaign: The Global Polio Eradication Initiative" and was coordinated by Jenny Horton. Well received by an interested audience, Horton a registered nurse from the Rotary Club of Kenmore, Queensland and a WHO Consultant, felt the workshop clearly illustrated how effective partnerships are and how each partner brings strengths to the GPEI, and creates synergies.

"Seeing and hearing what is being done about polio eradication by many NGOs was amazing," said Jenny Horton.

Dr. Bruce Thorley (Head of the Australian National Poliovirus Reference Laboratory WHO) Jenny Horton, and Lieven Desomer (a United Nation's Children's Fund Polio Chief) spoke at Rotary's polio eradication workshop and reinforced the valuable contribution Rotary International has made to eradicate polio.

A True Blue Minestrone

Relish Recipe Tip

INGREDIENTS

5 medium-size beetroot
1/4 cup verjus
4 tbsp extra virgin olive oil
sea salt flakes and freshly ground black pepper to taste
3 cloves garlic, smashed
4 tbsp Banyuls vinegar (or good red wine vinegar)
5 buffalo mozzarella balls (or cow's milk fior di latte)
baby basil leaves or regular basil chiffonade

METHOD

Preheat the oven to 220 C. Coat the beetroot in the verius and half the olive oil. Season with salt and pepper. Wrap the beetroot and garlic together in aluminium foil, place on a baking tray and bake for about 2 hours or until just tender. Peel off the skin then set aside and allow to cool.

Lightly whisk the remaining olive oil with the vinegar, salt and pepper. Cut the mozzarella balls into 1cm slices and set aside. When the beetroot cools, slice to the same thickness as the mozzarella.

On a serving platter or individual plates, layer the beetroot with the mozzarella. Drizzle with the red wine vinaigrette and garnish with baby basil leaves. Season with salt and pepper.

I thought you should be aware that DG Iven Mackey has in his latest report to the District Leadership Team noted that the is happy to promote both Disaster Aid Australia and ShelterBox relief programs. There are differences in approach, in the form of assistance offered and in costs, and each program has its strengths. There are supporters of both programs in D9800 and our priority should be to provide flexibility to potential donors. Having said that, there is a groundswell of support for DAA in D9800 I believe because it is locally managed, it offers a wider range of relief equipment and its costs are lower.

Alternatively, Aquabox Australia who provide water purification kits, is requesting donations to replenish reserves here in Australia.

The flood waters may have receded in Pakistan, but according to the United Nations, 6 million survivors urgently require aid in the form of shelter, food and clean water. Reports reveal that up to 14 million or 8 per cent of the population have been disrupted or affected. Both Disaster Aid Australia and ShelterBox are delivering emergency shelter and water in Pakistan now and need your help. Currently all existing Aquaboxes have been committed to Pakistan's relief efforts.
