District Governor Grant Hocking

Hello everyone

This is my final message for the year and what a year it has been. Melissa and I would like to thank you all for your wonderful support and friendliness during the year. It has certainly ended a different way to how it started but we have all adapted well with whatever challenges have come our way.

I started the year by quoting Paul Harris who in 1935 said "This is a changing world; we must be prepared to change with it. The story of Rotary will have to be written again and again."

We have certainly done that this year.

We started the year with 4 Cs-- **Connection, Conversation, Collaboration, and Celebration.** And we are ending it with an extra C- COVID 19. We have embraced the first 4 and managed well with the additional **C.**

I hoped that the district and clubs would focus on certain objectives during the 2019-2020 Rotary year and this has been achieved. I asked everyone to do something different, and we have done that in spades. The district now has new successful committees to make us proud. Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, Environmental sustainability, and the Peace committee.

Clubs were encouraged to show flexibility and this has occurred with changes to schedules, venues, and membership models being demonstrated across the district. This was further enhanced by clubs starting to use video conferencing and other means of staying connected over the last few months. It was pleasing to see clubs adopt and adapt to the new technology so quickly. Many clubs reported improved attendance and there have been many new member inductions. We focussed on the positives and looked to success rather than dwelling on the changed circumstances. Paul Harris would have been proud of us.

We lead the way in this area and thanks must go to **District Secretary Jane Pennington and Mark Stephens** for their support in updating the information on the website and ensuring timely important communication with clubs was maintained. On this point I must also thank **Lesley McCarthy for editing, producing and publishing the District Networker** each month which is also a crucial means of ensuring we all stayed connected.

Under the wonderful guidance of Club Service chair and **AG mentor Johnathan Shepheard** the Assistant Governors have been meeting each month to learn from and support each other. The enthusiasm of the AG group this year has been wonderful and I know they have enjoyed supporting the clubs and gained valuable experience in working as leaders within our district.

We have ensured more support for Rotaract with AGs ensuring they are invited to the cluster meetings and also visiting the Rotaract clubs. This is wonderfully aligned with the new elevated status of Rotaract.



We chartered 2 new clubs in line with the new club models in the Macedon Ranges cocktail club and the Melbourne Passport club. A new satellite club in the Southbank Orbit and a new Melbourne e- Rotaract club. There are also 2 new provisional clubs in Northside and Eynesbury that were due to charter in the last few months but are now waiting for an opportunity when they can charter face to face.

We have supported many club projects through our Foundation District Designated Funds (DDF) with 33 District projects allocating \$135k with a project value of around \$520k, as well as 9 Global grants and 14 Year 11-12 scholarships. This has been an outstanding effort and thanks must go to the **District Foundation Grants team of PDG Murray Verso**, **Richard Blakeman and Katrina Flinn**.





Under Murray's guidance as District Foundation chair we have also supported two Global scholars and recommended three Peace fellows. Lets hope one or all 3 are accepted to maintain our unbroken record of at least one successful applicant in every year of the program. We are the only district in the world to hold this honour. We also donated \$25k to the Rotary Peace programs maintaining our status as a Peace building District and \$48,000 to the End Polio campaign.

Currently club and individual donations to The Rotary Foundation are down on previous years so if possible, we need to turn this around. Please if you or your club hasn't already done so then donate ASAP to the Rotary Foundation.

The District Conference in Bendigo on 27-29 March 2020 would have been entertaining, innovative, inspiring and informative with new and exciting entertainment and events to keep everyone entertained. The conference team were wonderful and worked extremely hard for 2 years so were deflated to have to cancel. We succeeded in providing full refunds for all registrants and we are now only \$800 short of breaking even and looking to be in the positive with the sale of our remaining keep cups. This result also includes a transfer of \$5,000 sponsorship for next years District conference. So overall a brilliant result. All the committee deserve recognition but I know they will agree with me singling out Conference Secretary Alison Bacon who took on a lot of work and was crucial in the support of bookings, refunds to registrants, managing our refunds from speakers and venues and so much more.

Jane has been on w 2-3-year journey as secretary and was always friendly and helpful taking on extra tasks and supporting not just me as DG but everyone in the district.

Finally, I would like to thank Melissa who has been with me every step of the way on this experience. Her support has been wonderful and I cannot thank her enough for everything she has done, but beyond that she has forged her own friendships and special connections with so many people across the district and beyond.

Never forget that Rotarians are People of Action and We Change Lives. This is true for the lives of the many of people we help around the world but Rotary also changes our lives. We are enriched by the friends we make, the things we do, and the people and communities we help.

Despite some challenges in the last couple of months it has been wonderful to see Rotary clubs staying connected and supporting our communities. There is still a way to go before we will see a return to more traditional meetings and events but I know all Rotarians are sensible and will do the right thing to lead the way and be an example to the community. Most importantly stay safe and stay well.

VALE Sir Clem Renouf



Sir Clem Renouf, OAM, the second Australian born Rotary International President, and the man who inspired Rotary's polio eradication efforts has died age 99 in Queensland. He was the 1978-1979 Rotary International president who helped propel Rotary toward its top goal of eradicating polio worldwide.

Sir Clem was a member of the **Rotary Club of Nambour**, **Queensland**, for 70 years and served as a Rotary International director, Foundation trustee, District Governor, RI committee member and chair and International Assembly discussion leader.

In early 1979, on a flight home from the Philippines, Renouf read a magazine story about the eradication of smallpox. He wondered if Rotary's new **Health**, **Hunger and Humanities (3-H) Grants** could be used to eliminate another disease. They, for the first time, allowed Rotary projects to be taken on by more than just one club or district.

Renouf consulted with a friend, John Sever, who was a District Governor in Maryland, USA, and chief of infectious diseases at the United States National Institutes of Health. Sever happened to be friends with Jonas Salk and Albert Sabin, who developed polio vaccines in the 1950s and 1960s. After doing some research, Sever said that polio would be the best disease for Rotary to work on.

"Clem then set his sights on polio eradication as a Rotary worldwide project," wrote Ray Klinginsmith, 2010-2011 Rotary International President, in a tribute to Renouf. In November 1979, the RI Board agreed to set the eradication of polio as a primary goal of the 3-H program.

Renouf was instrumental in raising funds for the early effort. "In order to raise money, Clem asked all the clubs to contribute some cash, which was about \$15 per member, for service projects, and the appeal raised the surprising amount of \$7 million," Klinginsmith wrote. "Part of that money was then used to fund the first polio immunization project in the Philippines. The success was real"

In 1985, Rotary launched the PolioPlus program, and it later spearheaded the Global Polio Eradication Initiative with its partners: national governments, the World Health Organization, U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and UNICEF. The GPEI continues to pursue worldwide eradication of polio.

Renouf served in the Royal Australian Air Force during World War II. After the war, he was an accountant and partner in the firm of Renouf and Clarke. He was an associate of the Chartered Institute of Secretaries and Administrators and a fellow of the Australian Society of CPAs, later called CPA Australia. He was also a founder of Sundale Garden Village for the elderly.

Rotary honoured Renouf with the PolioPlus Pioneer Award for his extraordinary service to PolioPlus, as well as the Service Above Self Award, Rotary Foundation Citation for Meritorious Service, and Rotary Foundation Distinguished Service Award. He was a Rotary Foundation Benefactor and Major Donor and a member of the Paul Harris Society and the Bequest Society.

Klinginsmith described Renouf as quiet but a natural leader.

"Clem was always kind and supportive of younger Rotarians, and he is the one who gave me a chance to travel the Rotary Road," Klinginsmith wrote. "Rotary would not be at the high point it is today without the improvements made by Clem and his team."

This award was created to honour the amazing work done by Bob Fels for Rotary Peace Scholarships over the decades. It was awarded to Bob Fels himself. As the committee said: "No discussion will be entered into."

The citation read in part ... This award recognises the service by Robert M Fels, or Bob as we all know him, to Rotary District 9800, The Rotary Foundation and Rotary International. Bob is uniquely qualified for this special recognition to acknowledge his service and achievements in relation to the Rotary Peace Centers and the personal assistance extended in the development of individual Peace Fellows. His contribution covers support and leadership from Club level to District and national level and to international participation and impact.

Built on Bob's leadership, District 9800 is the only district in Rotary to have successfully nominated at least one candidate every year from the very first intake in 2002. More than that, has been the ongoing commitment of many of the Fellows back to Rotary and the program over the years since their nomination, which demonstrates the special bond that has been established through Bob's efforts. Bob has also encouraged our District to be a Peacebuilder district.

Participants received a clear and detailed explanation of:

- how the Rotary Foundation is funded,
- how to apply for the different grants and their criteria
- the resources available to clubs
- the 3 year cycle of donations to available funds
- determining the type of grant
- stewardship and accountability of grant funds

The presentation is available on the <u>District website</u> and is an excellent resource for all Committee Chairs intending on applying for a Foundation Grant.

NOTE: your club must have attended one of the seminars to be eligible to apply for grants in the coming year.





Bicycle rescue project for Yiyili Aboriginal Community School

<u>The Yiyila Aboriginal Community School</u> is a very poor school between Fitzroy Crossing and Halls Creek in the Kimberley Region in the north of Western Australia. Our Club was delighted to be able to complete our first indigenous project in this very remote part of Australia. Vocational training is a very important part of the education of these students and this program, which was completed in March 2020, will certainly aid their transition into community life.

The Yiyili community is based on the Louisa Downs Station. They have 60 students from Kindergarten to Year 10 and six teaching staff including one Indigenous Language teacher. They have an innovative vocational service program where the students are taught to dismantle and re-assemble bicycles. <u>BikeRescue</u> is an award-winning accredited program that uses bike mechanics as a vehicle for outreach, engagement and mentoring. The company that presents the project, Dismantle Inc. recently won the WA Youth Awards "Youth Organisation of the Year" in recognition of the achievements of their BikeRescue program.

The tasks undertaken and the dynamic workshop environment provided unique experiences that assist teachers and students to overcome behavioural and emotional challenges that can be presented by at-risk youth. As with most Vocational training programs the skills acquired and the improved attitude to work will be of great benefit to these students. They will also use the skills gained to start a small business enterprise in the repair of broken bicycles in their Community.

BikeRescue Certificate Presentation

Our Community Service committee initiated this project and participated in the planning and completion of the project.

- (a) Our members liaised with the Principal of <u>Yiyili Aboriginal Community School</u>, Lewis Mulvey, to determine which one of six suggested projects would be most beneficial to their school students and most worthy of our support.
- (b) Once the <u>BikeRescue</u> project was selected we again liaised with the Principal to determine which services and equipment would most enhance their project.

Our Club donated \$2500 to the project and we applied for and were successful in gaining a <u>District Rotary Foundation Local Grant</u> for another \$2500.

Two <u>BikeRescue</u> instructors from Perth flew to Broome and then drove 565 km to Yiyili, where they conducted the 4-day program for nine students and one teacher. One teacher was included as a participant in the program to ensure that the project will be sustainable in the future.

The Next Step Program

The Rotary Club of Richmond has been serving the Richmond community for over 54 years. working with local groups, businesses and government to support people in the community in need.

The **Next Step Project** is one of the Club's signature projects and was designed **to** support, guide and prepare disadvantaged young people living and attending school in the City of Yarra for a career matching their interests and capabilities.

An experienced Youth Worker is employed to work with the Collingwood College and Fitzroy High Schools. The youth worker builds a relationship lasting two or three years, helping identify a career direction that matches the participants interests and capabilities using donated career guidance testing.

Using our City of Yarra wide and Rotary Club network, we identify matching work experience. We develop job application/interviewing skills with business volunteer support. We provide interview clothes, teach how to communicate effectively and how to manage money. We help participants get employment and further education with Try Mentoring providing individual mentoring support. Our success rate is 70% of participants completing the program, commencing a career and/or further education.

The Club holds an annual fundraising event in support of the Next Step Project: the 'Celebrate Inspiring Women' event has won a District Award and was nominated for a City of Yarra Community Award. This event provides the Club with an opportunity to network with community groups, strengthen relationships and to be able to describe the project and provide examples of its success.

Morning Tea with the DG

On Saturday 6 June, I had the pleasure of attending the zoom meeting for our regular Saturday morning catch-up with DG Grant and to listen to his special guest, Eric Wright talk about Fight Cancer Foundation and Rotary House (formerly BMDI House – Bone Marrow Donor Institute) located on Blackwood Street in North Melbourne.

Rotary House was established with the support and leadership of District Governor Gordon McKern (RC Eaglehawk), RCMS Past President Rob Dunne and many other clubs and districts raising more than \$4 million initially for the Bone Marrow institute with BMDI Rotary House opening in 2003.

Catering for families of all ages, the building features 13 fully self-contained one and two bedroom apartments. Each apartment is equipped with internet, television, DVD player, microwave, hotplates, refrigerator, iron & board, toaster, kettle, crockery and a range of cooking utensils and cleaning equipment. The building's amenities include a communal lounge, gym, library, children's playroom and teen retreat.

Rotary House primarily caters for patients post bone marrow transplants. The average stay is about 5 months, though there are also short-term stays for those people coming back for check-ups. Rotary House hosts about 75 families on average a year and has hosted over 900 families since it opened.

Rotary House is currently in lockdown due to COVID but this suits the current patients living there. Eric updated us that the Fight Cancer Foundation is looking to sell the existing building given it's prime location in North Melbourne and build something new within Melbourne which is purpose built. The vision is for 30 apartments with plans currently being drawn. This will comprise 15 @ 1-bedroom apartments and 15 @ 2-bedroom apartments which will be connected to be able to create larger rooms. It will also encompass communal areas like a gym, library, lounge, and playgroup for children. There is also talk of a coffee shop and retail area on the ground floor. It is hoped to complete the new building within 2 to 3 years and will cost about \$25 million dollars, needing about \$12 -13 million to raise.

Fight Cancer Foundation also has accommodation in Albury Wodonga and Hobart. The Albury Wodonga building (Hilltop Accommodation Centre) was built with funds raised from FCF, RC Albury, Lions and Zonta with \$5.5 million dollars raised. Stage 1 has been built and an extension for an additional 10 rooms is being progressed. COVID has put a hiatus on fundraising but Eric is looking at a virtual Red Ball and you can still donate through the website.

After the meeting, I also looked up RCMS' 60 Years of Service booklet and found a small article about BMDI – see an extract below.

Logos

The Masterbrand Signature is our official logo and combines the wheel with the word "Rotary" (Rotary's wordmark) to the left for visibility and recognition.

Our logo can't be altered in any way. The wheel and the wordmark must always appear together. Because the word "Rotary" is a wordmark and not a font, it can't be replaced with a font. Only the colors shown on this page may be used in the logo.

Both the Masterbrand Signature and the Masterbrand Signature Simplified can be used on all print and digital applications. We recommend using the simplified version if the logo will be smaller than 1.25 cm (0.5 inches) or will be embroidered.





Clear space is the space surrounding the Masterbrand Signature that needs to remain empty. It is equal to the height of the capital "R" in the Rotary wordmark.

When using the Mark of Excellence, we encourage you to use the Masterbrand Signature near it for clarity and recognition. The words "Rotary International" must always appear in the wheel.





There is no maximum height for the Mark of Excellence, the minimum size should be approximately 3x height of the wheel in the nearby Masterbrand Signature (see layout and sizing examples above).

The dub name, district, and zone always appear on the same side as the wordmark, it should right-align with the "y" in Rotary. The positioning and the size relationship between the wordmark and the wheel can't be altered.
