

September Area of Focus: Basic Education and Literacy



Be a gift to the world



There is a Chinese Proverb that says: Learning is a treasure that will follow its owner everywhere.

All around the Rotary world there is a focus on Basic Education and Literacy in this month of September. As I move around the clubs in our District and read the weekly Club Bulletins I am delighted to learn about the books being provided to children in need, and the programs that are supporting early childhood and school facilities, both locally and internationally. Whilst driving home from Bendigo I listened with interest to an initiative where books and letters were sent to children in Detention Centres, and then of course the support given by many clubs to assist the literacy development of our indigenous children is impressive. There are so many ways that we can provide assistance to facilitate literacy and numeracy skills that are the foundation for all future learning.

So let me introduce to you a group of people who will make a difference in **Cambodia**. In this year of being A Gift to the World we have a second District Vocational Training Team that will provide training in early literacy to over 160 teachers who work in remote village schools around Siem Reap and Phnom Penh in January 2016. This group of dedicated and experienced teachers from both government and independent schools have received guidance from Teachers across Borders and are busy planning the program that they will de-

liver. It is exciting to note that four Cambodian teachers, two from the Future Light Orphanage of Worldmate and two from the Cambodia First International School will also join the group for the training program.

Bronwyn Stephens' involvement with Cambodian Rotary projects goes back to 2010 and she is the Vocational Training Team Tour leader. As chair of District Managed project "World of Difference" she has led over 10 tours in Cambodia, coordinated 3 District International Grants and been active in project work for a multi club Global Grant

Audrey Bugeja is the Teaching Tour Leader and is teacher at Baden Powell College, and has actively supported the College Interact and Earlyact Programs. She has also worked as a volunteer and teacher abroad in the slums of India, ghettos of Kenya and villages of Bolivia.

Gary Moller has over 35 years' experience as a primary school teacher and is currently working as an Education Consultant in the Butha Buthe District Lesotho, where he conducts Professional Development programs for teachers and has introduced a Levelled Reading program.

Bronwen Foley went to Istanbul as a young teacher where she taught English as a Second language, science and mathematics and whilst in Australia she has also taught programs for disadvantaged and disengaged youth. Recently Bronwen encouraged and organised eighteen students from her school to go to Cambodia on a World of Difference Tour.

Maria Silber has worked as a Primary teacher, Teaching English as a Second Language and the Reading Recovery Program working with year one children who were at risk in the area of literacy. She has visited Vietnam and helped develop an exchange program with a sister school in Nha Trang and accompanied the first exchange participants.

Rosemary Brown is a primary school teacher and has done significant work with special needs children. Rosemary travelled to Cambodia in 2014 and 2015 with Teachers across Borders, assisting in organizing workshops to help local teachers improve their teaching strategies and higher order thinking skills. Rosemary will be in Cambodia as a volunteer for Teachers across Borders and will join the team for part of the program.

Having been to the remote villages in Cambodia I know that literacy and in particular the teaching of English is a means to better life for children and I am looking forward to seeing the outcome of this **Vocational Training Team** initiative and will share the success story upon their return.

The Generosity of Australians

From Rotary Down Under

Philip Archer, Membership Director D9800, describes how the public opened their hearts through giving to a family in distress.

Sharon Chan was 36 weeks pregnant with her third child. Life was a struggle after her second son, Oliver, was born with Downs Syndrome. Now five years old, Ollie also has leukaemia. Sharon's husband Rob drove Ollie from their home in the little town of Gunning near Canberra to a Sydney hospital for his chemotherapy on a regular basis. Then, tragedy struck again when Rob suddenly died of a heart attack. Rob was Sharon's rock.

Left alone with a mortgage and two children, one very ill and needing support for the rest of his life, and due to have her third child at any moment, Sharon was devastated.

Channel 9's A Current Affair was alerted about this sad situation and immediately contacted Rotary to set up an appeal through RAWCS.

After the story aired on ACA, the public swung into action, opening their hearts and wallets to support Sharon. The response was simply overwhelming. Donations poured in and an amazing sum of over \$1 million was raised within a few days.

While money will never replace the loss of her husband, Sharon and her children are now at least secure.

In Rotary we have so many great resources to help in our community. In this case, we called upon RAWCS, in particular the Rotary Australian Benevolent Society (RABS). This allowed us to quickly establish a tax deductible trust that offered the public the best vehicle through which to direct donations.

With over 15,000 donations in cash and gifts received, the Rotarians and staff at the hub of this project have been working hard to handle the enquiries and the many conversations. They have been buoyed by the spirit of the donors. Mike Whitehouse, the national Treasurer for RAWCS, has fielded many of the calls personally. A Rotarian of 40 years, Mike said: "I have never seen anything like this. It is truly amazing."

Belinda Griffen and Pauline Lane from RAWCS have been at the epicentre. They have had numerous conversations via email, the phone and face-to-face with members of the public.

"We've been inspired by the sheer volume and consistency of donations since this story first went to air," said RAWCS National Administrator Belinda. "It's great to be working on such an inspiring project."

It is clear to those involved in this project just how many people there are who, like Rotarians, have the sense of Service Above Self, and who give unreservedly to support those in need. Let's look out for them and invite them to join Rotary. Many of these people have, in fact, wanted more information about Rotary and how they can be involved. They have been encouraged to join a club near them.

Sharon Chan's story has been remarkable and heartfelt. The Australian public has demonstrated the true meaning of "being a gift to the world".

Thank you to the many Rotarians from around Australia, particularly the RAWCS team who have been a big help with this project and the members of the Rotary Club of Southbank who were the project managers. Without your collective efforts we could not achieve what we did.



CBD Men's Shed needs members and projects

Anyone like to join the newly-opened Men's Shed in the Federation Square car park? Chairman Alan Seale says men's shed members, like Rotarians, are all volunteers and the more members the shed has, the easier it is to welcome newcomers, show them the ropes and ensure safe working. "We have 35 members today and are aiming for 100," Alan says.

As well, the excellent woodworking tools are an opportunity for Rotary Community Service committees to get things made for their local charities, such as outdoor furniture for a women's refuge, toys for the Royal Children's Hospital or repairs or renovations to wooden items.

The shed has spent more than \$75,000 of State and city grants on good premises and tools, with further funding for the next five years. The shed caters for members with disabilities while maintaining safety standards.

Networker visited the shed in late August. It is particularly difficult to find, being tucked into a couple of rooms on the lowest level of the car park to the east of Fed Square, opposite the car park lift.

Half a dozen men and one woman were busy constructing wooden aeroplanes and trucks for the Children's Hospital, using top-class drills, thickeners, bandsaws and sawdust extractors. They recently renovated an antique red cedar washstand for a nearby resident as a fund raiser, using the profit to finance consumables.

The shed has taken two years to bring to fruition, partly because of legal complexities between the city and its lessee Fed Square. Currently the shed opens Monday mornings (when the main activity is a guided walk to places like the Botanical Gardens) and Tuesday mornings for carpentry. Hot meals will be served every second Monday from the brand new highly equipped shed kitchen.

The shed now has links with the Heart Foundation and health service providers.

Members pay a \$30 joining fee and \$55 per annum.

Member Richard Nicholson 75, an ex-engineering lecturer, says it's great for learning skills on tools. "It's good to meet other blokes here and relax a bit," he says. "We've been making toys for boys and right now we're trying to work out what toys for girls we can make."

Member Tamir Mirza 47, a freelance photographer, is working with Richard on projects. "On Mondays our group goes out on a walk to places like the Botanic Garden, and on Tuesdays we work with the tools," he says. "Everyone's friendly and I'm re-learning carpentry skills that I forgot when I left high school. There's also lots of new things to learn because the tools here are so up-to-date."

Rotary Success Conference

What did District 9800 participants take out of the Conference in Canberra?

Over the weekend of 5-6th September, Rotarians from around the nation descended upon the most apolitical city in the country to partake in the Australian Rotary Success conference and inaugural youth summit.

District 9800 was well represented at the conference, not only hosting an induction on the main stage, but also by providing the Saturday night's dinner entertainment by way of RC Southbank's very own Jonthan Welch.

My Rotary

Members of the Rotary E-Club of Melbourne are available to come and present to clubs on My Rotary, Rotary International's website.

This is a vocational project of the E-Club and is strongly supported by District in an effort to reach and educate as many Rotarians as possible about the amazing tools and resources on My Rotary that any Rotarian can access.

The overview presentation is about a 45 minutes presentation on My Rotary and 5 minutes on the E-Club, rather than the 20mins traditional guest speaking slots, which should be taken into account. Shortening the presentation further is not possible. To assist the E-Club presenter is happy to forgo any meal in order to begin speaking while your club meal is being served.

The presentation is in the form of a PowerPoint consisting of screenshots of the pertinent pages of My Rotary and is therefore not in real time. This limits the risk of internet connection delays and going "off piste" with queries.

Rotarians are provided with a one page handout of the My Rotary "Dashboard" with relevant key learning objectives that Rotarians can take away/be sent by email following the meeting to guide them in using My Rotary at their own leisure.

Highlights include:

- How to update your profile and join discussion groups
- **Rotary Showcase** - show off your projects and see projects other clubs have done
- **Rotary Ideas** - fundraise using RI's own free crowdfunding platform
- **Document and Learning Centers** - find Rotary resources and view webinars
- **Brand Center** - create business cards, brochures and presentations using the free templates and logos. Find and use professional videos and promotional materials.
- **Rotary Club Central** - track and monitor club goals.

Your E-Club presenter can either attend in person, or alternatively, present via GoToMeeting (online video conferencing). This may best suit some of the rural clubs. All that is required is a projector and screen, laptop and good WiFi connection. The Rotarian who is organising the meeting is then sent a GoToMeeting website link to click and it connects you straight to the online meeting and the presenter at the relevant time. The audience then sees on the projector screen the presenter and the corresponding PowerPoint presentation at the same time. A practice run at the time of confirming the speaker time and arrangements is recommended.

In lieu of any speaker gift a donation made to the E-Club for its service projects is appreciated. The E-Club's My Rotary presentation is a vocational project delivered in the convenience of clubs' normal meetings. This is instead of holding a District seminar on a weekend or evening, for which each attendee is typically charged a fee. The E-Club set no minimum fee and it is up to the discretion of clubs as to how much, if anything, they wish to donate."

Australian Honours

"Service Above Self" is second nature to Rotarians. But we all know fellow members who go "above and beyond" in service to their community – and indeed our nation. They seek no reward beyond mere satisfaction that they have made a difference in the lives of individuals or society in general. We recognise their commitment by Clubs contributing to our Rotary Foundation or by a District or sometimes an RI Award.

But while many Rotarians have also been honoured by our Nation through the *Order of Australia*, certainly there are others well deserving of recognition – but have never been nominated – or sometimes unsuccessfully. How often have you searched the Australia Day and Queens Birthday Honours List to identify recognised Rotarians? Even for those Rotarians receiving awards, how often do you see the word 'Rotary' mentioned?

That's why an "*Australian Honours Advisory Panel*" has been established under the aegis of the Rotary Institute to "*Encourage the nomination of worthy Australian men and women for the Order of Australia recognition*".


The Panel will alert, facilitate and advise on the ready availability of *Order of Australia* Honours information – how to access nomination criteria and forms and tips for their effective submission to the Honours Secretariat, and the importance of selecting the most effective referees, in order to assist in maximising potential success - and the level of award.

The Panel has set up a new "*Australian Honours*" web page <https://rotaryaustralianhonours.wordpress.com/> or, with appreciation to RDU, an access link from their website. The Panel's web page includes links to the Honours Secretariat official "*It's An Honour*" web site; Eligibility and How to Nominate; Honours Lists; where to seek discrete and confidential advice from Panel members and, where available, from Liaison Members in participating Districts, which have also established a link back to the Panel's site.

The Convenor, PDG Len Goodman, having given service to the *Order of Australia Association* as ACT Branch Chairman and as a member of the National Board, now has an appreciation of Honours procedures and has received invitations to attend Investitures – where one listens in awe to the citations of Australian men and women who give of themselves in voluntary, community service. But there remain many more deserving of such recognition. Here's an opportunity to make that possible.

The procedure for nominating is, at first glance, daunting but should not be a barrier to acknowledging deserving service. Only a percentage are successful, so wording needs to be succinct and point scoring, and time from lodging an application to successful announcement can take 18 months to two years, so planning is critical. Nominations should be kept confidential, and at no stage should the nominee be alerted. Any Rotarian or Club that is considering nominating a Rotarian, or a worthy person recognised by Rotary, should first access the website and then if assistance is required, contact the D9800 Correspondence Liaison Person Bob Slater.



The Rhythm of the Trees

The Manchester City Art Gallery received over 1000 entries for its 1993 Academy of Fine Arts Exhibition. Of these, a six-member panel of judges chose 150 works for inclusion in the show.

One of the paintings selected was "Rhythm of the Trees," which the judges praised for its "color balance, composition, and technical skill."

But after gaining a place, the painting's creator was revealed to be Carly Johnson, a 4-year-old girl from Chorley, Lancashire. The judges had been unaware of her age.

Carly had painted the picture while playing in the studio of her grandfather, David Sandrill. He had pinned the picture on the wall and had titled it.

When Sandrill submitted some of his own work for the Manchester exhibition, Carly's mother, Helen, slipped Carly's painting in as well "just for the heck of it."

Carly's mother described the painting as "shapeless blobs" (Carly herself modestly said it was "just a little pattern") and told the BBC, "We could not believe it when we heard the judges had decided to show it... It proves anybody can do modern art."



The revelation of Carly's age made headlines throughout the world. The British press, in particular, mocked the Gallery for displaying toddler art. The Daily Mail presented its readers with three abstract works by leading adult artists and three works by children from Strawberry Fields nursery school in West London, and challenged its readers to tell the difference between the "modernist school" and the "play school."

However, the Manchester Academy was unrepentant and insisted it had no plans to remove the painting from the exhibition. Its president, Glenys Latham, noted that, "often technical skill can get in the way of instinctive response. Remember that the art of children often has an innocence, an unplotted quality, which adults often strive to gain. So I don't feel in the least embarrassed."

And on the very first day of the exhibition, the gallery received six offers to buy Carly's painting. The work sold for £295 to the first caller, Barnaby Blacker, owner of an art gallery in County Cork, Ireland.

Carly completed one follow-up painting, of a pirate with an eye-patch, in anticipation of an interview on GMTV. It took her ten minutes to complete. Viewers were given a chance to bid for it.

This collection of e-mails reminds me of James Thurber's sketch, "File and Forget".

The sketch consists of Thurber dictating a series of letters in a vain attempt to keep one of his publishers from sending him books he did not order, and the escalating confusion of the replies. Thurber, who was completely blind at the time and nearing the end of his life, played himself in later performances of the show. The original casual appeared in the New Yorker on January 8, 1949, and was reprinted in Thurber Country: (Simon and Schuster, 1953).

Dear PP Michael and DIK PP Laurie

hal am most pleased to advise yourself and RC of Prahran that your donation for hospital aid to Quezon Medical Center has now been released from Customs and delivered by freight 5 hours Manila to Quezon.

The delay was due to reallocation of the consignee from the Dept of Social Welfare- DSWD to the Dept of Health, who conducted the final detailed review with Bureau of Customs. All cartons/beds were accounted for by RCLC, per the distribution list provided. It was unfortunate that the delays caused RC of Lucena Central \$6,200 in Port storage and demurrage fees, which fortunately Customs agreed an instalment payment; just so RCLC can turnover to the needy.

However, RC of LC noted that this joint effort contributed to 3 areas of service: Medical Aid,

Literacy/Basic Education and Maternal Health

Above will result to: setting up a new community library, construction and refurbishment of the Rotary Hall, Quezon Memorial Center with the beds and medical supplies for RCLC's progressive medical mission in isolated rural areas (held 2x/month).

A full report will be provided by RC of Lucena Central PP Hector Balanak to you. How easily do we lose track of friends when they move away or leave Rotary? One of our regular contributors to "The Networker" over recent years was the larger than life figure of Annie Wysham: many of you will recall her recitation at the 2013 District Conference in Albury, "Rotary's got Talent!" section.

I recently e-mailed Annie to ask how she was going, and to say how much I missed her contributions. She replied:

..... I'm presently ensconced in a Nursing home in Heathmont for respite care following major surgery. I had a left foot reconstruction on the 7 aug at St V's private in East Melbourne & was transferred after 5 days to Brunswick Private for 2 weeks - now here for 9 weeks as I can't weight bear at all. It's a lesson in patience that's for sure, but will all be worth it to be able to eventually walk without pain. I was in shell shock when I first arrived on Wed as the patients/residents are very old & We've already had 2 deaths since my arrival & one moved by ambulance to hospital!

It's confronting seeing real old age up close every day but I'm trying to turn the experience to a positive by getting them to talk about their early memories & they light up, albeit often just for a brief moment or two! I read familiar Banjo Paterson poems for approx 30 minutes last Friday afternoon during 'Happy Hour' from a book I found on the bookshelf. It went down very well as their booked entertainer had cancelled. Meanwhile there's books & Tv & courtyard sunshine for me!

I was delighted to receive your email & wish you well as the 'ever ready Edifying Editor'!




